

Former Scholar Keeps Vaccine Pipeline Running In Pakistan, Afghanistan

Once an Ambassadorial Scholar, Farrukh Jamal Syed today plays a key role in the battle to end polio. His Pakistan-based company manufactures vitally needed

vaccine carriers that are being provided through a PolioPlus Partners grant. Substantial funding for the grant came from Dan Holzapfel, of the Rotary Club of Cleveland, Queensland, Australia.

The Pakistan PolioPlus Committee saved around US\$40,000, thanks to the involvement of this former Rotary Foundation Scholar, says committee chair Abdul Haiy Khan of Syed's contribution to the polio eradication effort. Khan adds that other carriers cost at least three times more than the ones produced by Simcon.

Khan had approached Syed with the committee's need for an easily transportable carrier that would keep vaccines safe in temperatures as high as 115 degrees Farenheit (46 degrees centigrade). Syed was up to the task: His firm, Simcon International, specializes in industrial product design, development, and manufacturing.



Since 2006, Simcon has produced approximately 100,000 carriers. "It is a nice feeling of satisfaction and great achievement

> [to work] for humanity and The Rotary Foundation," Syed says. "Work for the Rotary name has great importance in my life."

> Syed has maintained ties with Rotary ever since he studied computer-assisted design and manufacturing as a 1989-90 Ambassadorial Scholar in England. He later joined his

sponsor Rotary Club of Islamabad (Metropolitan), but was unable to maintain membership in Rotary after moving his company to a remote area. He has since relocated his business to downtown Karachi and says he would like to rejoin the organization that helped launch his career.

"The experience I gained from the scholarship directly helped me in building the concept for Simcon," he says, adding that it also helped shape his worldview. "Generally, people from any part of the world have the same feelings and the same needs. What matters is how quickly we can understand each other by establishing good communication and giving respect."

Making Fitness A Daily Habit

An emergency room nurse, Diane Froelich was on the road to a possible medical emergency herself: By her own description, she was out of shape and overweight. What's more, she was convinced she didn't have time to exercise.

"My [resting] heartbeat was 117, and I got winded just climbing one flight of stairs," says Froelich, 57.

So she signed up for Fit 2007, a six-month fitness challenge sponsored by District 6360 (Michigan, USA) and local community groups and government agencies. The program, aimed at helping participants develop lifelong exercise habits, not only improved Froelich's health but also helped her realize that she wasn't too busy to take regular walks.

"Now my heart rate is in the mid-60s, and I can climb stairs without getting out of breath," Froelich said during a group walk in Kalamazoo in October, cheerfully keeping up a brisk pace despite a steady rain and puddles on the sidewalk. She lost 20 pounds



during the challenge but noted, "I'm more excited about the fact that

l'm fit."

Starting in April, Froelich and about 1,800 others in southwest Michigan committed themselves to physical activities such as walking, mowing the lawn, and biking for at least 30 minutes a day, five days a week.

Participants recorded the number of minutes they exercised each day on the

Fit 2007 Web site (www.fit2007.org), which also featured tips for increasing activity levels and inspirational stories from exercisers. About 1,000 of the people who signed up recorded more than 4.7 million minutes for an estimated 236,500 miles, according to the program's Webmaster, Bob Brown, who divided the minutes by 20 to calculate the approximate mileage. In a survey conducted after the program ended, about a third of the participants reported improved fitness habits, said Brown, a member of the Rotary Club of Kalamazoo.

Past District Governor Karl Sandelin launched the program in 2006 as a 90-day project. During Fit 2007, Sandelin, 79, logged 750 miles as a member of a team at a retirement center that included a 100-year-old participant.

Historic Moments – Rotary Convention History In Los Angeles

Rotary International News - 30 May 2008 In 1922, Los Angeles hosted its first Rotary convention and General Secretary Charles R. Perry stood before a group of Rotarians at the RI Convention in Los Angeles and read α message from President **Emeritus Paul Harris:**

"It is a wonderful thing to have friends, many good, staunch, and loyal friends. They warm the heart and brighten up life's pathway. . . . Rotary is the door to friendship. Let us throw it open to every people."

The message was received with prolonged applause.

Approximately 6,000 Rotarians and guests attended the annual gathering that year. They enjoyed a trip to Long Beach Pike and a gathering at the Hollywood Bowl, among other activities.

Along with fellowship, attendees accomplished Rotary business as well, changing the organization's name from the International Association of Rotary Clubs to its current moniker and unanimously adopting the RI Constitution and Bylaws.



In 1962, Los Angeles hosted more than 22,000 registrants at its second RI Convention. California Governor Edmund G. Brown, the first speaker, recalled the

expansion of Rotary in his the state since 1922 convention. "I hope that you continue your great work, not only here in the United States but throughout the world," Brown concluded.

Though decades have passed between the first L.A. convention and this year's, how Rotarians feel about fellowship and service hasn't changed. Rotarians share a bond of working together toward a brighter future. From 15 to 18 June. Rotarians are back in L.A. for the 2008 RI Convention.

Dr. Mouzon Biggs Jr. Rotary Shares Closing Plenary Session • Wednesday, 18 June, 15:30 and 19:00

Dr. Mouzon Biggs Jr. is in his 27th year as senior minister of the 8,000-member Boston Avenue United Methodist Church in Tulsa, Oklahoma, USA. Biggs holds a divinity doctorate from Texas Wesleyan University and a humane letters doctorate from Oklahoma City University. He has received various renowned awards for his work in interfaith and interracial relations. Biggs is a member and past president of the Rotary Club of Tulsa and a Paul Harris Fellow.

Dr. Margaret Chan The Rotary Advantage in Polio Eradication Plenary Session 3 • Tuesday, 17 June, 09:15

Dr. Margaret Chan, director-general of the World Health Organization, has dedicated her career to preventing the spread of disease and promoting better health. A former WHO assistant director-general for communicable disease, she also served a nine-year term as director of health in Hong Kong, confronting H5N1 avian influenza and effectively managing the SARS outbreak. She is a world leader in fostering health security and implementing improved health practices among disadvantaged and vulnerable groups with little political voice.

Dr. Julie L. Gerberding PolioPlus: A Success Story of Public-Private Partnership Plenary Session 3 • Tuesday, 17 June, 09:15

Dr. Julie Gerberding became the director of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the administrator of the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry in 2002. Before joining the CDC, Gerberding was a faculty member at the University of California at San Francisco and directed the Prevention Epicenter, a multidisciplinary research, training, and clinical service program that focused on preventing infections in patients and their health care providers.

The mission of the CDC is "to promote health and quality of life by preventing and controlling disease, injury, and disability." CDC is committed to achieving true improvements in people's lives by accelerating health impact and reducing health disparities.

Michael Josephson Ethics: A Core Value Plenary Session 2 • Monday, 16 June, 09:15 One of the most respected ethicists in the United States, Michael Josephson developed the nation's most widely used charactereducation program, CHARACTER COUNTS! He is the founder of the nonprofit Josephson Institute of Ethics, through which he has conducted over 1,000 programs for more than 100,000 leaders across nearly every spectrum of society. His commitment to promoting ethical behavior and his engaging oratory have motivated audiences in the government, law, education, military, sports,

and nonprofit fields. He's also an awardwinning radio commentator, with a daily broadcast on ethics and character that airs on KNX-1070 in Los Angeles.

Philip Lader Reflections of a Rotary Scholar Plenary Session 2 • Monday, 16 June, 09:15 Philip Lader, former U.S. ambassador to the Court of St. James's, is chair of WPP Group plc, a worldwide advertising/communications firm; a Charleston, South Carolina, partner in the Nelson, Mullins law firm; and a senior adviser to Morgan Stanley. Lader is also a director of Lloyd's of London, Marathon Oil, RAND and AES Corporations, and the Smithsonian American History Museum. A former Rotary Foundation Ambassadorial Scholar, he was the recipient of Rotary's 2007 Global Alumni Service to Humanity Award.

Stephen Lewis Health Needs in Africa Plenary Session 2 • Monday, 16 June, 09:15

Stephen Lewis is the co-director of AIDS-Free World, an advocacy organization that grew out of his conviction that the AIDS pandemic can be defeated with better leadership and more urgent and effective responses from the United Nations, wealthy nations, and the governments of the most affected countries. Lewis was the United Nations special envoy for HIV/AIDS in Africa from 2001 to 2006. His career in the fields of diplomacy, politics, activism, and humanitarian work has included roles as deputy executive director of UNICEF and Canadian ambassador to the United Nations.

Dalton McGuinty Literacy Today Plenary Session 4 • Wednesday, 18 June, 09:15

Dalton McGuinty was elected premier of Ontario in 2003 and led his party to a historic second straight majority in 2007. McGuinty has represented the riding of Ottawa South since 1990, taking over the seat from his father, Dalton Sr. He believes that education is not only the ladder to opportunity for young people and the basis of a strong economy, but the means to a compassionate and cohesive society.

Ann M. Veneman The Global Legacy of PolioPlus Plenary Session 3 • Tuesday, 17 June, 09:15

Ann M. Veneman is the executive director of UNICEF, a global agency of more than 10,000 staff and annual total resources of about \$3 billion funded entirely by the voluntary contributions of governments, businesses, foundations, and individuals. As the children's agency of the United Nations, UNICEF works on the ground in more than 150 developing and transitional countries to help children survive and thrive. The world's largest provider of vaccines for poor countries, UNICEF works to advance the Millennium Development Goals by supporting child health and nutrition, quality basic education for all boys and girls, access to clean water and sanitation, and the protection of children from violence, exploitation, and AIDS.

Before joining UNICEF, Veneman served as the 27th secretary of the U.S. Department of

Agriculture. She is an honorary member of the Rotary Club of Modesto, California.

Dr. Tadataka Yamada Investing in a Winner Plenary Session 2 • Monday, 16 June, 09:15 As president of the Global Health Program, Dr. Tadataka Yamada leads the Bill & Melinda Foundation's Gates efforts to help develop and deliver low-cost, lifesaving health tools for the developing world. He oversees the foundation's alobal health grant portfolio and Global Health Advocacy.

Before joining the foundation, Yamada served as chairman of research and development at GlaxoSmithKline and was a member of its board of directors. Prior to that, he was chairman of the Department of

Internal Medicine at the University of Michigan Medical School and physician-inchief at the University of Michigan Medical Center. Yamada is a past president of the American Gastroenterological Association and the Association of American Physicians, a master of the American College of Physicians, and a member of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Science in the United States and the Academy of Medical Sciences in the United Kingdom.
