July 2 Meeting Report

President Elect Jason Hamel gave an illustrated presentation on climbing Mount Rainier. Jason had partially ascended the mountain last year and is going back later this month on his second attempt to reach the summit. He also told of his work with the Big City Mountaineers organization



that provides underprivileged youth with characterbuilding wilderness experiences. When Jason arrived at Mount Rainier last July there had been four feet of



snow falling on the mountain in one day. The starting point for the ascent is Paradise and his group included ten people accompanied by three guides. The first day was a leisurely walk up a

glacier requiring abundant refreshment (one half liter of water per hour; 100 to 300 calories per stop). They reached a camp hut and went to bed at 6pm. At 11:30pm it was breakfast time and they departed at

midnight. As illustrated on the accompanying map on page 5, they were following the "Disappointment Cleaver" route. Jason strapped on his forty-pound backpack and demonstrated the use of the ice ax to stop a fallen climber from sliding down the ice. As the slope increased, "Disappointment Cleaver" lived up to its reputation and Jason



started to experience physical challenges and had to abandon his climb about an hour and a half short of the summit. Coming down was very difficult and Jason had horrific blisters on his feet. But he's determined to reach the top and will be traveling back to Mount Rainier at the end of the month. We thank Jason for the wonderful presentation of his adventure and wish him good health and success on this month's climb.

New Rotary Club Formed in Urbana with 41 Charter Members

On Monday, July 6, Frederick Rotarians celebrated the birth of the fourth club in the county, The Rotary Club of Southern Frederick County. Gathering at the PB Dye Country Club, Governor Paul Frey and Immediate Past Governor Bette Lewis presented the charter and installed the new members. PDG Bette noted that



members. PDG Bette noted that Rotary is a powerful fellowship with a primary goal of eradicating polio and Southern Frederick County Rotary would be the 33,335th worldwide. She encouraged every member to support the Rotary Foundation as



a sustaining Paul Harris Fellow. PDG Bette shared a touching story of how the Rotarian network was able to accomplish what the US Embassy in Tanzania was unable to do: returning her nephew's body to the US after he died working in a remote area. Governor Paul likened the formation of the club to his business experience of opening a new restaurant, where initially there is great management support and then the team




is left on its own to run the business. He encouraged the officers and members to invest for the next eighteen months, getting started with a community service project and promoting fellowship. Southern Frederick County President Chad Tyler, who has held an earlier membership in Rotary in the Fredericktowne Rotary Club, stated that the 41 charter members boost the number of Rotarians in Frederick County to over 450. Lynn Shanton was given a special award as the organizer for the club and District Extension Chair PDG Ray Streib was recognized for his tremendous effort. Sponsoring Rotary Club President Mary Ford-Niall welcomed the Rotarians and Pastor Erma Dyson gave

the invocation. PDG Ray Streib is giving the club a new banner and Jim Baer, President of the Fredericktowne Rotary Club, is providing a new Four Way Test

Rotary International Convention Highlights

It is always an affirmation of Rotary's service and power throughout the world to attend an International Convention. This year was no exception.

From start to finish, Rotary's outstanding humanitarian work was evident in all regions of the world.

The convention began in the usual manner with the presentation of flags from every country and principality where Rotary exists. President D. K. Lee gave the keynote address and introduced the Secretary General of


the United Nations, Ban Kee Moon, who said upon receiving the Polio Championship Award, "Rotarians are the heart and soul of this effort. You have worked side by side with UNICEF, World Health Organization and the Centers for Disease Control to pursue this." "You have faced barriers and risk to your personal safety to accomplish this." "Two billion children have

been immunized, five million children are walking today because of your efforts. I am with you in this great campaign." Ban Kee Moon received this award in tribute to the volunteer workers killed by bomber suicide in a Afghanistan.

The Right Honorable Douglas Alexander, Secretary of State for International Development, United Kingdom spoke about

Britain's PolioPlus partnership with Rotary and its The United Kingdom has given partners. L100,000,000 so far and has pledged another L500,000. He reminded us that there is such a thing as being "too late."

Clarissa Brocklehurst, UNICEF's chief of water, sanitation, and hygiene, reminded us that the lack of clean water, sanitation and soap are the biggest



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influence on the spread of polio. 1916 marked the first recorded case of polio and New York City and now the world is 99% polio free. The PolioPlus partnership will make a lasting difference to people throughout the world. But we are not through yet because 1.2 billion people are still without access to toilets and proper sanitation, dirty water is still the biggest killer of children after pneumonia, and 5000 children die every day from diarrhea. Polio is a fecal/oral disease.

Tom Henderson, Founder and CEO of Shelter Box, reported that Shelter Boxes have assisted in 51 countries thus far and currently there are over 1 million people living under a Shelter Box roof or a

blanket with a Rotary seal. This is a remarkable accomplishment started by the "dream" of a Rotarian in England.

General Secretary Ed Futa announced a quorum at the convention with 4,155 clubs represented out of 33, 164. There were approximately 22,000 Rotarians registered. Clubs are reminded that if someone from your club is attending an International Convention, you

should make that individual your **HE FUTURE OF ROTARY** official voting delegate. This YOUR HANDS assures that we will have a quorum and may conduct official business.

PRIP Jonathan Majiyagbe reported on The Rotary Foundations efforts for the year. 20,000 filtration wells were installed, 4000 food distributions were make in Africa, 9000 in Nairobi

received a water supply source, twenty-three schools were set up in Sri Lanka serving 20,000 students. The foundation received \$255 million in grants from the Gates Foundation, bringing total commitment to \$555 Jonathan indicated that our PolioPlus million. campaign is getting proper exposure and support from various efforts, such as those on the Iditarod sleds in Alaska. He also indicated that every penny of Challenge money will be directed towards polio

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eradication. He reminded us that there is no moratorium on humanitarian work throughout the world and our contributions to Annual Giving are the lifeblood of TRF.



In my opinion, the most inspirational speaker this year was actress Mia Farrow, who spoke on the devastating conditions in Darfur. Mia Farrow is an Ambassador for UNICEF and can relate effectively to Rotary's polio eradication efforts because she herself spent time in an iron lung as a child. There she saw how fragile our life structure is and how true "ownership" comes only in the moment of giving. We cannot own anything – it is only ours for a while, then moves on to someone else. It is by that which is taken away that we can define ourselves. Integrity with a sense of responsibility

resides above "power." She has been witness to the failure of the peoples of the world to do something about humanitarian violations so evident in Darfur. 2.7 million people have been driven from their villages. She challenged us as human beings who serve above self to do something to serve the displaced person in Darfur.

D K. Lee awarded Membership plaques to ten districts who reached 10% increase in membership and started at least

10 new clubs. District 5000 from the US got an award. Dr. Jane Goodall, spoke on her work on chimpanzees over the last 50 years and ways in which we can and must preserve our environment. Chimpanzees are the animals most related to man and follow a family structure caring for each other much as human beings do. The environment in which chimpanzees live is constantly threatened by the progress made by man. We must join together not only our heads, but also our hearts in order to make a difference in protecting the environment in which we live. Rotarians have the network to get things going in support of a common good.



District Governor Elect Deepa Willingham gave a moving description of poverty and what it means to each of us everywhere. Quoting Aristotle, she described poverty as the parent of revolution and crime. One-half of the human population lives on less than \$2 a day and most of those are in Central and South America. In extreme poverty, children are born sick and hungry. Children do not go to school and girls are sold to go to work, most as prostitutes. 134 million children do not attend school.
