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Rotary Charters Palestinian Club

More than 150 Rotarians and guests, including RI President John Kenny and RI Director Phil Silvers, gathered on 30 May to celebrate the charter of the Rotary Club of Ramallah, the first club in Palestine in three decades.

The new club, admitted by the RI Board on 18 May, adds another location to the Rotary map, which covers more than 200 countries and geographical areas. The club is in District 2450, which includes parts of the Middle East, North Africa, and Europe.

The last Ramallah club was officially terminated in 1980.

"The chartering of a new Rotary club is always an occasion for celebration," Kenny said in Ramallah. "It means that one more community in our world will benefit from Rotary service."

Over the next two days, Kenny and Silvers also attended events in honor of the newly chartered Rotary clubs of Gedera Habiluim, Israel, and Amman Ammon, Jordan.

Club's path to charter

Among the guests at the three celebrations were Ted Beckett and Jeffrey Behr, members of the Rotary Club of Colorado Springs, Colorado, USA, which cosponsored the Ramallah club's charter with the Rotary Club of Amman-Petra, Jordan.

Beckett, chair of the Center for Environmental Diplomacy, asked his district about extending Rotary into Ramallah after attending a club meeting in Jordan in January 2009.

By February, Behr, the center's chief executive officer, had begun recruiting a group of Rotarians to facilitate the formation of the new club. Hashem Shawwa, of the



Amman-Petra club, helped by leading multiple clinics on Rotary for potential members.

Silvers became involved in the charter effort after the Colorado Springs club asked for his assistance. He spent five days in Ramallah last November to conduct training sessions with potential club members. He also met with the Rotary Club of Jerusalem and Palestinian Prime

Minister Salam Fayyad.

"The Ramallah club members have a good understanding of what the responsibilities are of Rotarians and their clubs," says Silvers. "They have a vision of the positive impact Rotary can have on the community of Ramallah."

Silvers also credits Uri Zeiger, governor of District 2490, and Jerusalem club president Mark Zober with helping to establish the new club.

The admission of the Ramallah club follows earlier attempts by Jordanian Rotarians, District 2490, and the Rotary Club of Nazareth, Israel, to have a Palestinian club chartered.

Beginning of Service Above Self

The 34 new members of the Ramallah club held their first official meeting on 25 May and have already initiated projects, including a winter clothing bank. Members are also working with District 2450 to develop community parks, including several for children.

"Our theme is 'The Future of Palestine Is in the Hands of Its Children,'" says Ramallah club president Nader Dajani, whose uncle was president of the Jerusalem club in 1944-45.

The Center for Environmental Diplomacy will help the club identify community needs, Behr says.

"I am optimistic about and look forward to our Israeli clubs partnering with the Ramallah club and other clubs throughout the Middle East on Rotary Foundation Matching Grants, Friendship Exchanges, and other collaborative efforts," Zober says.

The Ramallah club will sponsor additional Palestinian clubs in the coming year, says Dajani.

Going To New Heights For The Annual Programs Fund

Hiking to the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro in 2009 for Big Brothers Big Sisters gave District Governor Tanya Wolff a creative idea for raising money for The Rotary Foundation's Annual Programs Fund.

Wolff decided to organize a similar trip to the base camp of Mount Everest and

challenge the Rotarians she met during her club visits in District 6330 (parts of Ontario, Canada, and Michigan, USA) to either join her or pony up donations for the Foundation.

On 17 April, Wolff; Karlis Graubics, governor of District 7600 (Virginia, USA); Eric Robinson, president-elect of the Rotary Club of Wiarton, Ontario; and his cousin Doug Robinson reached the base camp at 17,500 feet, having raised more than US\$50,000 in pledges for the Annual Programs Fund through their website, www.everesttrek.org.

"It's an absolutely beautiful experience," recalls Graubics, 70, who underwent 11 weeks of endurance training to prepare. "At the same time, when I talk about the experience, I stay away from saying I had a ball. I did not have a ball. Nobody on that trip had a ball. It's something you determine to do, pace yourself, and do it."

Graubics, who says he is not a thrill-seeker, got on board after he and his wife hosted Wolff at their home so she could attend a training institute nearby. At first, Graubics wanted nothing to do with the idea.

"I said, 'You're 47. I am 70. You go, and tell me about it,'" he remembers. But days later, while listening to club presidents share their enthusiasm for projects at his district conference, "I thought to myself, 'You know, I haven't done anything really exciting this year.' I began thinking, 'Maybe this thing would be a good idea."

Pledges began coming in as soon as Graubics decided

to consider the trek, and let the cat out of the bag. "My little comment started bringing in money. So I said, 'I think I better take a serious look at this."

For her part, Wolff describes herself as a wannabe runner. As a part-time employee of Big Brothers Big Sisters of Sarnia-Lambton, she helped coordinate the hike up Mount Kilimanjaro, during which 23 of the 24 participants made it to the summit "I figured a smaller group might be able to raise between

\$25,000 and \$30,000 for the Foundation," she says. "Most of the members I challenged laughed at the idea of seeing themselves huff and puff to nearly 18,000 feet. But I was determined to go, even if I was going alone."

Wolff selected Adventure Alternative to organize the trip because of its work with nonprofits. She says setting up a website for pledges through GiftTool was also instrumental in the effort's success.

Once the idea was cemented, Wolff contacted Ratna Man Sakya, governor of District 3292 (Nepal), who invited the team to take part in the district's conference. Wolff and Graubics altered their schedule to attend and toured projects that international Rotarians had helped sponsor.

"Being able to attend the district conference while we were there was a big bonus," says Graubics. "When you are in Kathmandu on the street, you see how poor the place is, and you want to help."

He adds that he and Wolff plan to work with the clubs in Kathmandu on projects their districts can sponsor together.

The trip itself has helped energize his district, Graubics says.

"This was so beyond anything that had ever been done in my district. It's like a breath of fresh air," he says. "I cannot be prouder of my district and the way they are really stepping up."

Traveling To The Convention In Style

When District Governor-elect CarolAnn Jeronimo arrives at the RI Convention in Montréal, Québec, Canada, later this month, she is sure to be noticed.

Jeronimo, a member of the Rotary Club of Woodbury Breakfast, New Jersey, USA, and incoming governor of District 7640, has converted her PT Cruiser into a moving billboard for Rotary, covering its exterior with Rotary logos and messages.

She plans to drive the decorated vehicle 460 miles from her home in Logan Township to downtown Montréal for the convention, arriving Saturday, 19 June.

"When the Cruiser is coming toward you, you see the End Polio Now message," explains Jeronimo, who had originally thought about wrapping the whole car in a polio eradication decal but then decided on a more diversified approach. "On the top of the windshield is 'Rotary: Humanity in Motion.' On the side is next year's theme, Building Communities – Bridging Continents. On the back of the trunk are the four Rotary youth programs."

Jeronimo came up with the idea while pondering a PR grant for her term. She first approached TODAYS YOUTH TO MORROW'S LEADERS
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2009-10 District Governor Sam Conte Jr., who owns an auto repair shop, with the idea of applying for a

grant to buy a big truck and decorate it with Rotary messages. "But he thought I was crazy," she recalls. So she turned her attention instead toward her own vehicle.

Standing out

Doug Painter, a member of the Rotary Club of Woodstown and owner of Astro Sign Company, helped Jeronimo make her PT Cruiser stand out. All of the signs and decals are removable, so she can modify the messages as the year progresses.

"It has to go back to the shop next week because we need to add Service Above Self. We also have to make a small change to the Humanity in Motion sign," to conform to proper usage of the Rotary Marks, she says.

Jeronimo has already received many

comments. "Everyone wants to have their photo taken with it," she says. "When I pull into a gas station, people will ask, 'What is Rotary?' So it is a great chance to explain what Rotary is all about. You have to have your elevator speech ready."

Another sign on Jeronimo's PT Cruiser – "Don't Feed the District Governor Feed South Jersey's

Cruiser – "Don't Feed the District Governor, Feed South Jersey's Hungry Instead" – promotes the district project for her term. During her official visits, she will ask clubs to donate the money they would have used for her meals to feed the hungry, and club members to contribute a can or two of food at each district event.

She plans to keep her vehicle decorated throughout her year, changing the signage periodically. Asked if she would recommend this public relations ploy to others, she responds with a laugh: "Only if they're as crazy as I am."
