Marie-Louise Jean is the president of SEEDS-HAITI, Inc., (SEEDS) an organization based in Washington, D.C., that helps to provide food, shelter and education to homeless children in Haiti. SEEDS' latest project is the construction of an elementary school in Arcahaie, Haiti.

Marie-Louise Jean has lectured and conducted

workshop and seminars on nutrition and health throughout the East Coast. Local venues include The Library of Congress, The University of the District of Columbia, The Art and Drama Therapy Institute, The Marie Reed Learning Center, and The Smithsonian Institute's Folk life Festival featuring Haiti. Our presenter also co-authored a first prize winning Haitian cookbook, entitled, *The Art and Soul of Haitian Cooking*, produced by the Haitian Institute. All proceeds from the sale of the book go toward the organization's reforestation project in Haiti.

Marie-Louise Jean was born in Port-De-Paix, Haiti. At an early age, she migrated with her family to the United States and has been living in the Washington Metropolitan area since. She received a Bachelor of Arts Degree from Howard University and a Master of Science Degree in Human Resource Management from the University of Maryland. Over the years, she developed an interest in nutrition and attended the Institute for Integrative Nutrition in New York and graduated with honors as a Holistic Health Counselor/Nutritionist in 2004. She is also certified as a Master Instructor of the Institute for Human Individuality (MIFHI). She has an active private practice devoted to counseling clients on wellness both in person and over the phone at her office in Kensington, MD. She focuses on helping people improve their health through nutrition and life style changes. Marie-Louise Jean is an Administrative Assistant for the National Petroleum Council and is a member of Women in Energy (Desk and Derrick) Club. Community involvement includes servina as a board member of the Haitian Institute in Washington, D.C. and serves as public relations chairperson and book reading group coordinator for the organization. The Haitian Institute's purpose is to maintain a Haitian cultural presence in the Washington Metropolitan area.

· Create relevant and creative membership qualifications and requirements

· Update Rotary terminology to current language

· Shift the focus from meeting attendance to member engagement

Clubs would be authorized to make changes to the Standard Rotary Club Constitution and to their Rotary Club Bylaws in any area other than RI membership dues requirements.
