The Doctor Is In

Hours after a massive earthquake hit Haiti in January 2010, Claude Surena, a physician, turned his home into a makeshift triage center, sheltering more than 100 injured people.

Using the limited supplies of medicine and food that Rotarians had managed to collect, Surena, his wife, and other volunteers cared for victims, many of whom were in critical condition. The capital city of Port-au-Prince was damaged extensively, making communication almost impossible and resources scarce.

"It was difficult to witness so many people suffering and not have the capacity to give them the help they needed," says Surena, president of the Haitian Medical Association. "I wanted to give as many people as I could some level of comfort."

Three days after the quake, Haitian President René Préval appointed Surena the country's coordinator of earthquake response, in charge of overseeing the recovery and redevelopment of the public and private health sectors.

A Rotarian since 1983, Surena is also head of District 7020's Haiti Task Force, which works with local clubs on long-term recovery projects.

"Haitian Rotarians lost family and friends," he says.
"To see them still able to serve their neighbors and communities under those circumstances made me feel proud to be a Rotarian."

Rotarians Play Key Role In Pakistan's Strategy To End Polio

Rotarians are in the forefront of the drive to implement Pakistan's National Emergency Action Plan for Polio Eradication 2011. The government launched the plan in January, in response to a sharp increase in polio cases in the country in 2010.

Turning the tide against the disease in Pakistan is pivotal to the success of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Pakistan was the only one of the world's four polio-endemic countries – the others are Afghanistan, India, and Nigeria – to see an increase in cases last year: 144 compared with 89 in 2009.

Rotarians assigned by the Pakistan PolioPlus Committee are mobilizing Rotary clubs to provide support in the country's four provinces. Rotarians are helping to immunize children against polio and to raise public awareness of the disease.

Club members are working "to cover every nook and corner of the country," says Aziz Memon, chair of the committee. "We are committed to a polio-free Pakistan."

Rotarians are also advocating for polio eradication among officials at all levels of government, as well as religious leaders and others.

"Aziz Memon is a participant in meetings with the president, regional governors, and health advisers,"

said Bill Gates at the 2011 RI Convention in May. "Rotary's in the room when decisions are made in Pakistan." Gates is cochair of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, which has awarded US\$355 million in challenge grants to Rotary for polio eradication efforts.

Global Grant Scholar Focuses On Human Rights

Claire Achmad of New Zealand is passionate about improving the quality of people's lives by working as an advocate for human rights.

Achmad is studying international public law as a 2010-11 Rotary Foundation Global Grant scholar at the University of

Leiden in the Netherlands. She is also interning with UNICEF's Child Advocacy and Rights Unit in the Netherlands and helping organize a juvenile justice course at the university. Her scholarship is aligned with Rotary's peace and conflict prevention/resolution area of focus.

"My mind has been stretched, challenged, expanded, and enriched in many ways, and I have had the privilege to be taught by some fantastic teachers and experts in the field of peace, justice, and development," says Achmad, whose scholarship is sponsored by District 9940 (New Zealand) and the Rotary Club of De Rottemeren in District 1600 (The Netherlands). "I am not only learning a lot and reaping a lot of knowledge through my study, but I am giving back through my other commitments in the community."

Before her scholarship, Achmad worked as an attorney with the Ministry of Social Development in Wellington. She was also honored as young corporate lawyer of the year in 2010 by the Corporate Lawyers Association of New Zealand.

District 9940 and host District 1600, both Future Vision pilot districts, have brought together considerable

experience to help ensure Achmad's scholarship works smoothly. District 1600 has hosted several Rotary Scholars from District 9940. In addition, District 9940 has sponsored five Rotary Peace Fellows.

To overcome an initial lack of awareness about global grant scholarships among its member clubs, District 9940 featured the scholarships in Future Vision pilot

workshops and at the district assembly, presidents-elect training seminars, and the district conference, says Past District Governor Antony Fryer.

"To ensure continuity in the district's scholarship program, the membership of the previous Ambassadorial Scholarships committee continued into the Future Vision pilot scholarships committee, in addition to the appointment of new members," Fryer says.

In May, Achmad addressed a UNESCO European regional forum in Tuscany, Italy, on the topic of

children's rights. After her scholarship, she would like to work with a nongovernmental or intergovernmental organization and eventually with a United Nations agency.

"My education at Leiden will be a crucial stepping stone to developing my career, allowing me to make the contribution I aspire to, addressing [humanitarian] needs on a long-term basis through sustained work," she says. "I feel a sense of deep gratitude towards Rotary and the support of The Rotary Foundation, District 9940, and Harbour City [Wellington] Rotary Club."

Innovation & Flexibility Pilot Program

Rotary Club of Kalimpong of RI District 3240, chartered 1993, as a part of its Innovation & Flexibility Pilot Program, has resolved the following, with an eye for making the club more effective:

(2.1) Shift focus from meeting attendance to member engagement.

A Questionnaire would be sent to each member, the contents of which would be stored in a data bank. Strengths and weaknesses of members would be assessed and their interests and talents channeled in the right direction.

(2.2) Update Rotary terminology to current language.

Acronyms and abbreviations would be discouraged and Rotary jargon kept to a bare minimum.

(2.3) Use social media to engage and involve members.

Rotarians would be encouraged to use social networking sites like Face book for group discussions, taking cue from e-clubs. Administrators of such sites would ensure secrecy and take cognizance of any unethical practices. Rotarians not familiar with Internet and online processes would be partnered with Internet savvy Rotarians to learn the system. 90% of our membership already use the Internet regularly.

(2.4) Try out different meeting logistics (time, date, location, use of social media, club event or social activity, etc).

To change Weekly Regular Meeting schedule to Fortnightly Regular Meetings (every 2nd and 4th. Thursday of the month). Members on various Committees to meet on 1st and 3rd and 5th, Thursdays (when a month had 5 Thursdays), to maintain regular housekeeping of the club. All members are encouraged to attend such committee meetings regardless of their being members of such committees or not and also to make-up through the social media set-up.

(2.5) Make Subscription of "Rotary News" optional.

Except for new members who would be required to take a one year subscription. One or two copies would be ordered for the Rotary Club of Kalimpong library. Members would be encouraged to read the magazine online to avoid unnecessary use of paper, thereby demonstrating environmental conservation to the new generation.

(2.6) Declare additional Holidays.

Based on membership representation of different religious and ethnic communities in our club, additional holidays shall be declared to facilitate members to celebrate their religious and ethnic festivals. Holiday dates to be decided and published at the beginning of every new Rotary year. Committee meetings would, however, be held as scheduled to carry on smooth functioning of club activities.

(2.7) Have Board Meetings continue as at present.

In response to our Resolution 2.5 above, we've received an email dated 23rd July 2011:

"Through a review of pilot program rules, Rotary's constitution and bylaws, it has been determined that it is not permitted to opt out of the Rotary News subscription."-Rotary International

While we agree with RI's decision, our club would like to suggest that our India's regional rotary magazine Rotary News also be made optionally available on-line in digital format at a nominal price as has been done for The Rotarian which has been made available @ \$12 per year starting from July 2011 issue. This format is far more convenient, futuristic AND will go a long way to saving the fast dwindling forests worldwide.
