If you came to a District Assembly or read my letter to Presidents you would already know that Youth Insearch is the program I wish to see championed across our District this coming year (and beyond). EOI - RAWCS BUSHFIRE RELIEF FUNDS

As a result of the devastating bushfires on the eastern and central areas of Australia in late 2019 – early 2020, Rotary Australia World Community Service established a national bushfire appeal fund which resulted in over \$1.2 million being received from the generosity of the community and corporate organisations. There are currently some of these funds still available within this bushfire relief appeal for distribution.

Expressions of interest are being now being invited for relief and recovery projects within localities affected by these bushfires where Rotary Districts or Rotary Clubs have registered RAWCS Bushfire Relief projects.

Eligibility and Project Criteria:

- Applicants must submit a Project Brief / Proposal for RARF Funding Distribution as to the nature, rationale and purpose of the project:
- Projects must align to the designated relief effort associated with the Bushfire Relief.
- The project must have benevolent relief as its main purpose, and that relief must be provided to people in need.
- Time is of the essence; the project plan and activities need to demonstrate a timely response to the relief situation.
- The expected beneficiaries, which community or individual will be the target for the aid.
- The proposal is realistic and achievable within the requested budget and time frame.
