We are in consultation with districts in India to decide the next urgent requirement. More to come about this shortly.

WORLD LEADERS TAG 2023 FOR THE LAST CASE OF POLIO!

The END POLIO NOW 'end game' is under way ...

Exciting news is that senior leaders with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and the World Health Organisation have agreed that our world should see the last case of wild polio virus by the end of 2023.

Then, with the completion of the required three-year polio free period, our world should be declared 'polio free' by the end of 2026!

This rationalisation is the start of the planning process by GPEI, based on current facts and figures and what our leaders learn behind the scenes.

RI Past Vice President Mike McGovern, Chair of Rotary International's PolioPlus Committee, told a zoom meeting of RI END POLIO NOW Zone Coordinators on May 11 he had never been more 'optimistic' about the ultimate success of our 45 years plus campaign.

'All the signs are there,' he said.

MUSINGS FROM DG DEBBIE CONT.

'For the first time, recent sampling along the Pakistan/Afghanistan border (60 sites) has found no trace of the wild polio virus. It has been 14 weeks since the last case of the wild polio virus was reported – and only two cases this year.'

Chair Mike said his optimism was still tinged with caution, given we were close to zero cases a couple of years ago, but emphasised 'all the signs were encouraging'.

Given that good news, RI Past President and Rotary Foundation Chairman Elect John Germ, brought the meeting back to reality with the warning that end of Rotary year fund raising was vitally important for Rotary teams to maintain the pressure in 2021/22.

'We will need every cent of the Gates Foundation US\$100 million matching grant to continue funding every aspect of our campaign. To quality, RI must raise US\$50 million by June 30 and, at this time, we are lagging by US\$4,482,000 compared to the same period last year,' he said.

'Some 26 of our 41 regions are down on Polio giving and only 128 Districts (less than half have donated 20% of their DDF to Rotary's priority project.'

Past President John urged EPN team leaders to go back to their coordinators and urge them to work with RI Directors and TRF Trustees in their Regions to stir fundraising support.

'Challenge your own fellow Zone Coordinators, District Governors and other senior leaders to join the cause and give personally as an example to Districts and Clubs.

'Encourage your teams to lean on the non-givers' he urged.

'There are still too many Rotarians who have never given personally to END POLIO NOW,' he concluded.

ARH News

Introducing "Ask the Experts" ARH asked one of their experts, Dr Maria Di Biase: "Where do voices in the head come from? Turns out the answer is quite an interesting one.

This is a good question, the answer to which is not straightforward. In fact, after more than 200 years of research, the picture is still far from complete. One long standing theory is that auditory hallucinations – voices in the head – come from inner thoughts and speech that someone incorrectly attributes to a source outside their own body. Why does this happen? The basis of auditory hallucinations is neurobiological, that is, there is an event or multiple events that take place in the brain and this manifests s the experience of hearing voices. For example, altered electrical activity in the brain can disrupt the way that brain regions communicate with each other. This 'disconnection' may result in spontaneous inner speech that is misperceived as coming from the outside world. Dr Maria Di Biase ARH Researcher 2014-2017

40 years ago, Australian Rotary Health (ARH) was established as a charitable fund by Rotarian PP Ian Scott and the Rotary Club of Mornington, Victoria, to research the mystery of Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).

Since those early days, our work has continued to expand and has made an impact not only across the country, but also internationally. With the support of Rotary Clubs and Districts in Australia, we are so proud to be a part of creating better health for all Australians. Research and advancements in knowledge funded by ARH provide both preventative and curative solutions for a broad range of health conditions.

Since 2000, our research focus has been on mental health. In 2012, this focus narrowed to the Mental Health of Young Australians (Aged 0-25), and in 2013, projects focussing on the Prevention of Mental Illness were included. Programs such as Cool Kids and Mental Health First Aid are just a couple of examples of our funding leading to positive outcomes.

Lift the Lid on Mental Illness is our national campaign for mental health research and awareness, and every year on World Mental Health Day (October 10) we celebrate Hat Day to raise funds for vital research into mental health.

We also provide scholarships for rural medical and nursing students and Indigenous health scholars; ensuring that the next generation of Australians have access to vital health services and information.

In just 40 years, we have achieved so much. We are inviting you to help us mark this milestone year and invest in the future by supporting our work today.
