END POLIO NOW report – June 2021

Wild Polio Virus summary:

Numbers have not changed since February 24.

The number of wild polio cases on June 2, 2021, remained static at two – one in Pakistan and one in Afghanistan.

Total number of WPV cases in 2020 was 140, with 84 in Pakistan and 56 in Afghanistan.

Total number of WPV cases in 2019 was 176, with 147 in Pakistan and 29 in Afghanistan.

Total number of vaccine derived cases in 2021 stands at 100 – 133 for same period last year. Total number of vaccine derived cases for 2020 was 1088.

Comments:

It is important to note that we are still in 'low' season in Asia, but the overall situation is very encouraging. Rotary International PolioPlus Chair and RI Past Vice President Mike McGovern said at our Coordinators' Zoom meeting last week he is 'quite excited' by the current situation. 'We have never been this close to eradicating polio. There have been NO new cases in Pakistan for 16 weeks and we need to let people know the good news,' he said.

Mike pointed to the fact there were no positive WPV samples from 68 testing sites across Pakistan and two in Afghanistan in the last period as proof of the improving situation.

Of course, nothing is certain whilst the conflict continues along the Pakistan/Afghanistan border, but all the signs are positive.

COVID-19 remains a challenge to our ongoing campaign, but the Global Polio Eradication Initiative remains focused with 440 million children immunised in 2020, compared with 419 million in 2019.

There have been no issues with the successful introduction of the Oral Polio vaccine to the vaccine derived campaign.

And with that, fifty mud-covered youth entered the lake, cleansing themselves in the water. You would've thought it was a baptism. In some ways, it was.

Kia ora from New Zealand! My name is Grace, I am from Rotary District 9920, Auckland and if that first sentence caught your attention, read on for the full story!

In early May I was grateful to take advantage of the trans-Tasman travel bubble and head over the ditch for District 9650's 2021 Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, held at Lake Keepit Sport and Recreation Centre. This came to fruition after meeting the incoming District Governor, David Mayne, through some Rotary connections. That story is quite an eclectic one, but skip the next paragraph if you just want to know about the baptism.

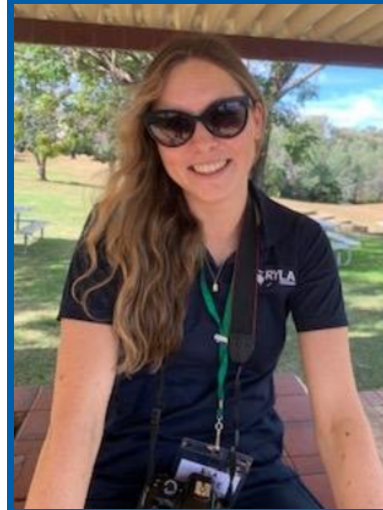
My Rotary journey began on a Rotary Youth Exchange to Denmark in 2016. I then completed RYLA in 2018 at age 20, and have since attended the inaugural RYLA Oceania and led four of my district's RYLA and RYPEN programmes. During COVID, I helped create the world's first online RYPEN programme, which has since been shared across NZ, Australia and India. After David saw me present on this via Zoom, we got chatting about his plans to host the world's first in-person RYLA after COVID. As we know, this was pulled off successfully in August last year. During one of our chats since (he's been coaching me in preparation for my NZ Army Officer Selection Board), David jokingly said "let's get you over here for the next one in May!". To this I replied that there was no way the travel bubble would be open by then, but in true David optimism, he told me to wait and see.

Well, saw we did! A few months later, David's friendly face was greeting me at Tamworth Airport. RYLA 2021 was about to begin and I would be assisting as a "Leaders' Leader". David kicked off the Australian hospitality, which I would experience all week, by showing me around Tamworth. On more than one occasion, he affirmed, the town is famous for liking 'both country AND western!'. Whatever that means. After navigating jetlag, a mouse plague and David's Aussie humour, we arrived at Lake Keepit.

What came next was a spectacle of incredible bonds forming, personal growth and the realising of full potential. Coming from my RYLA cohort of 120 people, I took a lot away from a smaller group of 47, where a uniquely safe space was created. I'm a firm believer that the world is improved by bringing people who wouldn't typically meet into a shared space. For me, I was profoundly impacted by each RYLA participant's unique story and background, with a nod to the boys from the Backtrack programme. The perspective and attitude everyone brought to the week, and to life in general, is something I will carry with me in all my future endeavours.

I was privileged to help guide this wonderful cohort through numerous challenges during RYLA, including one muddy confidence course. If you've waited to the end for the baptism story, sorry to underwhelm, but we were all just getting clean after wading through that course. This is but one example of the countless mental, physical and emotional challenges experienced during RYLA, all intentional and deliberate, producing 47 RYLArians I couldn't be prouder of.

And me? Well, I liked them all so much I've decided to move to Sydney. This is definitely one of the less awe-inspiring revelations to come out of RYLA, but it'd be quicker to fly to NZ than to share all those with you. I hope you have been lucky enough to experience the magic of RYLA, and I salute districts like yourselves for getting behind it. I must conclude by saying an immeasurable thank you to the support District 9650 gave me in getting to RYLA and to promise this won't be the last you'll see of me. People get so much out of RYLA, and they always give it back.
