MUSINGS FROM THE DG

Here we are at the end of another week. I cannot believe just how fast the time goes. It seems like only yesterday that PDG Phil Hafey pinned that badge on me and said "Your it". This week I visited New England Rotaract members at the home of AG Zahoor Ahmed. I would like to take this opportunity of thanking Zahoor for opening his home to us and to his wife Najjia for their hospitality. Fund raising has been extremely difficult for them the same as other clubs in our district. New England Rotaract have offered their services to other clubs in their cluster. What a great opportunity for the other clubs, especially when your labour force can be dwindling. Clubs have enjoyed the company and help of these younger people and listened to their ideas, thoughts and suggestions around Rotary and Rotaract in exchange for financial reward for helping. MUSINGS FROM DG DEBBIE CONT.

We have some great speakers lined up including our after-dinner speaker on the Saturday night, my good friend and fellow DG Andy Rajapakse, who has done an amazing job with membership of all ages, all types of clubs on the Gold Coast. We have presentations from our clubs on some very special projects that really are inspiring and innovative.

Dave Pearson will be joining us to talk about Rotary Australia World Community Service and its programs, and scope of the organisation. Dave is the National Vice Chair and I can assure you his knowledge extends far beyond Rotarians Against Malaria for which we have known him in the past. Many clubs have enjoyed distributing cash cards to people in crisis, many of whom still require major assistance until they can support themselves as in earlier times when things were better. I met a new Rotarian only a couple of weeks ago who told me the reason he wanted to join Rotary and give back was because he was a recipient of these cards. This really does reinforce those three key areas of focus, Public Image, membership and Foundation. Getting the message out there, taking Rotary to the community is the best way of increasing public awareness. The public are where you derive members from. Great clubs require great membership, and without them we cannot support our service projects and Foundation or anything else that is your passion. It is not OK to provide service in the community and have Rotary signage absent. The general public are generally aware of laws in respect of fundraising. In Rotary clubs have a charitable fundraising licence and because of our great branding and credibility we have enjoyed consumer confidence for decades.

Please check your signage and ensure that it is current. As you are probably aware, the Governors of 2019-20 set up a disaster relief fund through RAWCS in response to the catastrophic bushfires in December and January 11 months ago. Nine districts have been affected by the bushfires and through the RABS we have been able to distribute approximately \$1.5 million of donations received to these affected Rotary districts via district projects or club projects.

The committee set up by the immediate past governors to manage the funds received through RARF met on the weekend. They have approximately \$140,000 which will be made available with matching grants to projects proposed by the affected districts or clubs in the affected districts on a one-for-one basis. The criteria for application are that the project must assist in the rehabilitation of areas affected by the bushfires or help fund projects to assist in futureproofing against wildfires in the future. We will be receiving applications up to 15 December and hope to be up to distribute these funds by Christmas. Funds for projects approved by the committee can be paid to your district bushfire RAWCS project or if clubs wish they can set up their own project with a RAWCS project number.

JOINT ROTARY PROJECT TO TIWI ISLAND

On Monday 2 November a RAAF C27 Spartan aircraft from 35SQN Amberley arrived at Taree airport to collect 20 boxes of bed linen as part of a joint project between the Rotary Clubs of Taree, Taree North and Lower MidCoast which has been supported by Valley Industries to help the Tiwi Island people on both Bathurst and Melville Islands.

The supplies were flown to Darwin where they will be forwarded onto Bathurst Island on Monday the 30 November by the RAAF.

The President of the Rotary Club of Taree, David Denning and myself will travel to Darwin and then onto Bathurst Island to present these goods to the Tiwi people.

Rotary's partnership with the RAAF in this project is an important step to assisting another Remote aboriginal community in Australia.

Whilst many local Rotary clubs have been involved in overseas aid projects in the past, some of our clubs are now focusing on More on shore based projects to assist remote communities, particularly in the area of Health.





BOOK FAIR BONANZA!

With 2020 being the year of uncertainty for many due to Covid, the Armidale Central Rotary Club's annual Book Fair normally held in May, was postponed. Fast forward 6 months and the Club was able to replace the Book Fair with an Outdoor General Book Market and an Indoor Book Collectibles Book Market.

The split was to ensure Covid Safe environments given space constraints and the need to ensure social distancing etc. The exercise required much planning and its success, as a result of which just under \$40,000 was raised, was due not only to much hard work by the team who work in our Book Shed, led by lan Garske and Simon McMillan, but also the valuable contributions made, in other ways, by many other club members. Several members of the local Rotaract Club also pitched in, which was much appreciated. We were also helped by good weather after a wet Friday morning! The Club was very grateful for the great support from the Armidale and surrounding communities and it was wonderful to see that reading for all ages is going strong. The Club volunteers had a good time as did our customers. It was great to see so many smiling faces!

The Club will now be in a position to support many local causes where donations were delayed by the postponement of the Book Fair. The funds raised are mainly distributed in the New England Region so, in effect, the community is helping the community while Club members and their customers have a great time along the way! COLLABORATION WITH COMMUNITY
