# **MUSINGS FROM DG DEBBIE CONT.**

Well done everyone for keeping the meeting going, the club for the food and drinks flowing. The evening was hosted by President Craig Spencer and I was delighted to present to him and the Club, on behalf of PDG Phil Hafey, a Platinum Rotary Citation gained for last year. Craig had a very interesting vision for a new project - Remote Rescue Tubes. This originally a project of the Rotary Hawaii and has come to Australia. Please read the article below whereby a trial is in place at Sawtell in partnership with Coffs Harbour City Council. The tubes are approximately \$600. I think this could be something Rotary can adopt and utilise throughout Australia. Saving lives in the water is something dear to all our hearts.

#### Remote Rescue Tube Trial (Sawtell Beach area)



Council's Lifeguard Service is conducting a project in the Sawtell beach area from late November 2019 to March 2020 to trial the provision of remote rescue tubes for public use.

The purpose of the trial is to test and validate the use of this equipment in reducing bystander drownings, determine if this approach should be continued/expanded to other locations and to gain a greater understanding on how it might be operationalised, incl. potential costs and project/program partners (e.g. local Surf Life Saving Clubs).

Rescue tubes are specially designed flotation devices, normally used by lifeguards or lifesavers to assist in water rescues, and can help support the victim's and rescuer's weight to make a rescue easier.

Unfortunately a number of drownings which occur involve bystanders who get into trouble themselves when attempting a

rescue. Having a purpose designed flotation device is considered a critical success factor for bystander rescuers in these

The Sawtell Beach area has been selected for the trial as it is a popular beach location within the LGA, with patrol services provided by Coffs Harbour City Council Lifeguards and Sawtell Surf Lifesaving Club (SLSC) over the surf season. Sawtell SLSC has expressed an interest in pursuing this initiative and agreed to partner with Council in conducting this trial.

Council always recommends to swim between the red and yellow flags on patrolled beaches. Remember ... NO FLAGS = NO SWIM!

Based on the results of the trial and any recommendations within the post-trial report, Council will determine the next steps for this initiative. This may include; not taking the trial any further, extending the trial or conducting further testing or pilot programs, or undertake planning for a phased implementation of these devices in other locations within the LGA, dependent on an approved resourcing plan and operating model.

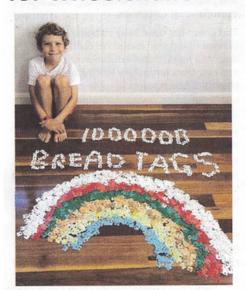

# Rotary Club of Great Lakes: Bread tags for wheelchairs



The Adelaide University Rotaract Club, Rotary District 9500 South Australia has set itself the ambitious goal of collecting 200kg of used bread tags over four months.

The tags are then sold to Robe thermoplastic recycling company Transmutation - Reduce, Reuse and Recycle, which turns the tags into homewares for sale. Funds raised from the tags will allow the club to buy a wheelchair for a disabled child in South Africa, through Aussie Bread Tags for Wheelchairs.

Bread tags will be collected by the Rotary Club Of Great Lakes and will be sent to Adelaide to support the purchasing of wheelchairs for the needy in Africa. COLLECTION POINTS are Forster private hospital, Laverty pathology: Forster and Pacific Palms, Xray department at Forster, Great Lakes College, Wallis Lake Co-op, Nuggets discount store Tuncurry, Beaches International Forster, Taree Railway Station and I Gym Taree.

Apart from helping those in need in Africa this project fulfils a Rotary area of focus 'Supporting the Environment'. Bread tags are not usually recycled - ending up in general waste. This project assists in the recycling of these plastics.

With less than a week to go before District grant applications close clubs interested should go to the district website Documents Library to complete an application for funding of up to AUD4,000 for a project.

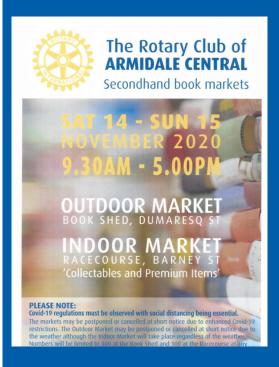

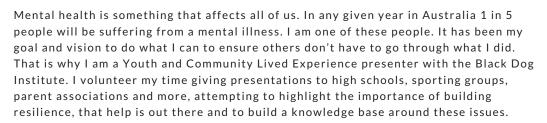

October is Rotary Mental Health Month Elliot Waters - 2014 RYLArian spreading the word..



Although large campaigns by government agencies and other large entities are good, I do believe speaking with and embedding one within our communities is vital in driving change from the bottom up. I hold the belief that improving mental health outcomes across our communities starts with the individual, and it is these individuals I try to connect with when I set off to give a speech. Although I attempt to convey a message which will educate and spur action, it is often myself who appears to learn the most from the event. Every person has a story and embedded within I have found numerous examples of strength and resolve in the face of adversity. I feel a sense of privilege and pride when others let me in on their own struggles and triumphs. Our stories may be unique, but we all share common themes and it is important we use this to lessen each other's burdens.

When I attended the RYLA camp in 2014 I met people from all walks of life. But during one eventful afternoon where each of us opened our hearts to each other and poured out our feelings and emotions, not only did it prove to be one of the most moving experiences of my life, it was incredible to learn that we are all shouldering our own stories yet together we formed a safety net of sorts for each other, to the difficulties of our lives. It is this fostering of togetherness and belonging that I try to create with my audiences and I owe RYLA a big debt of gratitude for illuminating this truism to me.

Talking about mental illness doesn't have to be a traumatic experience. Often just knowing those around you are willing to listen when required is enough to push forward with making the changes to one's life that is needed. This is certainly true for me and continues to be. Together we are stronger, and the first step is to start the conversation. You never know what you might learn about yourself or those around you, the strength and resilience that lies within and the experiences we share.
