The club has been at the forefront of drought relief for the community in the past year and continues to explore every avenue of funding.

Barraba club has been at the centre of drought relief, and manages projects including the recycling of batteries, running the camp draught and other fundraising opportunities in the area. Thursday saw me at Gunnedah 2380 for lunch. Hosted by pat Walls and attended by AG Rod Browne. Again, a small club but rising to the challenge with an annual fun run which has been going for 43 years, a pop-up restaurant, wine and cheese evenings and a strong youth commitment they really support the local community.

That evening I was hosted by Gunnedah West and President Nataniel Gomes and was attended by the Community Service Director Kel Walls It was a lively evening and one of the president's goals for this year was social integration, more hands on projects. The club recently restored a historical grave belonging to the first mayor of Gunnedah, and hosted the Motorhome Fellowship, providing two meals a day for a week.

The last meeting of the week was at Tamworth Sunrise, hosted by President Adam Green and attended by AG Simon Guest. The club-chartered club 10 years ago and boasts a membership of 55. These are great projects that benefit the local community and visitors to the area. They support juvenile diabetes, Foundation and ARH.


