Copper Canyon Presentation

Marty Wickenheiser narrated a slide presentation of a World Community Services trip to Copper Canyon in 1998 and the life changing experiences while sharing food, clothing, dental and other services with the Tarahumara, the native inhabitants. This was one of many trips until they were discontinued due to dangers with the drug traffic in the area.

Program

The scheduled speaker canceled so **President Christina** contacted **Fred Anderson** who gave an overview of the History of Orchid Collecting and Cloning. Prior to 1960 orchids were exclusively the purview of the elite. Today orchard collecting is far more egalitarian thanks to improved reproduction and propagation technology including cloning. There are now over 25,000 species.

Fred's wife Jan talked about raising orchids. They have been collecting and raising orchids since 1981. They currently live in Novato and have a greenhouse filled with numerous species. Correct growing, watering and cloning is an ongoing learning process as all orchids originate from areas around the globe with different climates. She did however suggest to "water weakly weekly." She provided a large display of beautiful plants showing the diverse colors, leaves, flowers and sizes.



Hands-On Project for Open Space Saturday, February 19th from 9am – 12Noon

Join us in a volunteer work day to remove invasive french broom and plant native milkweed to improve monarch butterfly habitat. This project will convert broom and blackberry bramble into a much less fire prone area with higher quality habitat. Broom removal and planting are moderately strenuous and involve bending, kneeling on level terrain. It is recommended for volunteers of all ages and skill levels. This is a drop in day with the philosophy of come when you can, leave when you must.

Dress in layers you can get dirty, wear sturdy shoes, and bring water. Please bring gloves if you have them. Snacks, tools, gloves and extra water will be provided.

Rotary Club of Novato members:

Last night I participated in a Zone 26 & 27 ZOOM Polio District Polio Chairs' Meeting and we received a superb update from RI Polio Chair, **Mike McGovern**. Yesterday was the one-year anniversary of the last reported case of Polio in Pakistan. Of course, we had the three cases of wild polio reported from Afghanistan last October. **Mike** told us the World Health Organization (WHO) is promoting 2022 as a very critical year for our long-standing Polio eradication efforts. Individual Rotarians, Clubs, Districts, our Rotary Foundation along with the Polio Plus Societies are doing an excellent job of raising cash donations. There are major efforts to have PolioPlus Societies sanctioned as official - just like the Paul Harris Societies.

Cash donations for Polio Eradication are up worldwide but we are way down with District Designated Funds (DDF) donations. It is important to remember Our Rotary Foundation still matches DDF 50 cents on the dollar and with the two for one match from the Gates Foundations means for each dollar of DDF donated to Polio our dollars are leveraged 4.25 times. This means the \$7,000 our WCS committee just approved from our club's DDF- with Rotary and Gates leverage, will result in another \$31,500 to our worldwide Polio eradication efforts.

This all adds up to our worldwide Rotary \$50 million commitment to qualify for the Gates 100 million dollars. Our award-winning Rotary International Foundation receives the funds at the beginning of each Rotary year. This means Rotary is in charge of distributing the funds worldwide and not some high overhead non-profit.
