Foundation Presentation

President Peian introduced **Carrie Chinn**, Rotary District 5150 "Every Rotarian Every Year" Coordinator and "**Paul Harris** Society" Chair. **Carrie** gave a history of Paul Harris, Rotary and the **Paul Harris** Fellowship. It may come as a surprise,

Paul Harris had a rough childhood. Because of financial difficulties, he and his brother were sent to live with his grandparents, when Paul was three years old. Paul Harris liked "to play pranks and hooky". He was expelled from multiple schools, even military school. Eventually, he was able to follow through on a promise to his grandmother, to make something of himself. Paul apprenticed at a law firm and earned a Bachelor of Laws from the University of Iowa, moving to Chicago to practice law. Paul did value friendship and found himself feeling isolated in Chicago. He decided to set up regular meetings with three friends, rotating from office to office learning about each other's business. In 1905 the first Rotary Club was born. Within a couple of years the organization grew and the focus began to turn to Community Service. Shortly afterwards, the second Rotary Club was established in SF, followed by the third in Oakland. Rotary's influence grew globally (Rotary has held a non-voting seat in the UN since its inception). After Paul Harris died in 1947, people donated to RI in Paul's name, which led to the Paul Harris Fellowship.

EREY District 5150 Coordinator, Carrie presented **President Peian** with two banners for our Club's participation in 2021-22. One banner was for 100% member participation in EREY, only 3,900 of 46,000 clubs receive this banner. The other banner was for total funds donated, our District ranked 2nd in the world in total funds donated and our Club was ranked 7th in the District. This is a clear indication of how generous and supportive our members are, very well done Rotary Club of Novato! **Peian** was also presented with a certificate of award for her annual donations and becoming a member of the **Paul Harris** Society.

threat to both health and extreme weather. Lisa wants to reduce the impacts on future generations. After volunteering at her children's school on waste reduction, she recognized many ways to reduce greenhouse gas emissions from schools. Lisa founded Sustainable Marin Schools, a nonprofit, to aid schools in meeting climate action goals from City through State levels. She is partnering with NUSD on a Zero Waste and de-carbonization pilot program, with the goal of making Novato Schools the model for sustainability in the State and beyond and prepare students to advocate for their future and be leaders in the green economy.

Schools produce about 530,000 tons of food waste per year (about 65% from lunch programs). The average elementary produces about 20,000 lbs per year (Novato schools make double that). Food wastes produce 8% of all greenhouse gases, which includes Methane (28 times more potent than CO2). A mandatory state law, SB1383, requires reduction and composting of food waste. According to the EPA, schools waste 25% of their energy, caused by lights left on during recess, poor temperature control, etc.

Leadership in sustainability at the district and county level is needed. The current programs are at the school level, relying on teachers and volunteers, with little funding or expertise to make a significant impact on emissions. Sustainable Marin Schools will provide four Zero-Waste and Energy experts to create and carry out a Climate Action plan at zero cost to schools. The experts will establish Sustainability Committees at the County, district and school levels, monitor energy and water use, and help to get funding for upgrades to reduce greenhouse emissions.

The Rotary Club of Novato Climate Action Committee supported two pilot programs in Novato, one at Rancho Elementary and one at Novato High School. When the pilot program began in November 2022, Rancho Elementary was sending 80% of its recycling and compost to the landfill. As of June 2023, by establishing the proper training, providing the proper supplies, tools, signage and monitoring, Rancho had diverted 85-95% of recycling and compost to the correct waste stream, making it SB1383 compliant. In February 2023, SMS helped NHS establish a Sustainability Club. NHS used only trash cans and recycle bins, both types of receptacles were contaminated with improper waste. With the help of SMS, the Sustainability Club created signage, color coded receptacles, and educated teachers and students. Next year, there will be a broader program, similar to the one used at Rancho. NHS will also offer

training for green jobs in the lunch program, maintenance and operations and demonstrate that sustainable programs can impact the environment, career and future.

City of Novato and Novato Proud nominated SMS for "Sustainability Superstar" for its work with NUSD. SMS plans to expand to more schools in NUSD and work with the NUSD Food and Nutrition Program to reduce waste. SMS will also provide Environmental Literacy and greening of campuses. The CA Climate Action Corps will be providing SMS funding for four Energy and Zero-Waste Experts. Lisa concluded by taking a few questions.

Peian thanked our speaker for an informative program. Peian then thanked the membership for the opportunity to lead our Club this year. She looks forward to seeing others step up and take a turn. Thank you Peian!

"Grant in A Box" **Update**

Mobile Emergency Clinics -UKRAINE-



THE PROJECT



In late 2022, members of the RC of Lviv International, and 2 Rotarians, one in Italy and one in the US, developed a global grant project that could be replicated by interested Rotary clubs and districts.

Ukraine's Ministry of Health had identified a need for medical clinics to be placed along the border of the war zone and provide medical services to towns and villages where medical facilities had been destroyed.

OUR PROGRESS

As of mid-June 2023, there are 40 units committed for a total of \$1.6M USD. This total includes 1 disaster grant for 2 units, 6 units from a US charity, and 31 units through TRF global grants program. There are 24 Rotary clubs and districts involved as international sponsors (from 4 counties) and 7 clubs as host sponsors. Service Ukraine is the vendor who is building all the units. To date, there are 15 mobile medical clinics that have been deployed and are in service in Ukraine. There are well over 100 individuals and club donors.
