Maggie Shao was invited up to tell us about RYLA. District 5150 has been running this camp for 38 years! It was previously called Camp Enterprise and began as one weekend, then grew to 5 days and is now known as RYLA. Novato sponsored 5 students. 193 Campers,

Eliza Roesler shared her own experience at RYLA camp, which she attended as a high school junior. She recalls how the personality assessment confirmed her traits as a "peacock" — talkative and outgoing. Through camp activities, she learned that leadership doesn't always mean being in charge but sometimes involves stepping back to let others lead. This lesson was instrumental in her subsequent involvement in leadership roles within the Interact Club, where she served as a Marin County representative. Eliza emphasized the long-lasting impact of the camp, noting how the experience deepened her commitment to Rotary's youth programs and expressed a desire to return as a counselor to continue contributing to the development of future leaders.

Alan Dunham shared a heartfelt and emotional story about reconnecting with a former Rotary Scholar he and his wife had mentored. Alan recounts how the Rotary Foundation, after World War II, started the Ambassadorial Scholars program to foster international understanding by sending students abroad. Alan and his wife were host counselors for a student from Taiwan, Anita, who studied music at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. Their connection extended beyond her studies, and they visited her in Taiwan in 1989. Recently, after more than three decades, Anita visited them while in California, rekindling their friendship. Alan reflects on how Rotary has expanded his family across the globe, with connections in Russia, Switzerland, the Philippines, Taiwan, and Australia. This story underscores the enduring bonds and global family Rotary creates, transforming lives through its programs.

5 Minute Talk

Marcus Combs introduced himself by sharing his background and personal journey. He grew up in Mill Valley, where his family had settled after migrating from Oklahoma. Marcus attended College of Marin before moving on to San Diego State and later returning to the Bay Area to be with the woman he loved, whom he married 39 years ago. They have two children: a daughter who is graduating from law school in Sacramento and a son, Peter, who has recently embraced his Armenian heritage by changing his last name to Calgen after spending time in Armenia. Peter now lives in Petaluma and works for Sonoma County. Marcus also mentions his granddaughter, who is about to turn one, adding a touching note about the joy of family and the legacy he is building through his involvement in Rotary.

Marcus highlighted his 35-year career with the National Park Service, where he served in various capacities across iconic sites in the San Francisco Bay Area. His work included stints on Alcatraz Island, Ocean Beach, the Cliff House area, the Presidio, Muir Woods, and the Marin Headlands and a brief stint with the Department of Treasury at the Mint. He also supervised volunteer efforts, particularly beach cleanups and other environmental preservation activities. Marcus highlights the National Park Service's mission statement, which resonated deeply with him: "To protect and preserve our national treasures for our generation and generations to come." This mission fueled his dedication throughout his career.

Now in retirement, **Marcus** seeks to continue to embody the spirit of service that defined his professional life, emphasizing that service was not just a job, but a core part of his identity. Thus, he joined the Novato Rotary Club.

SDEAKER

Capt. Sasha D'Amico - Topic: Senior Fraud

President Tom introduced Captain Sasha D'Amico, who has recently taken on a significant role. Sasha started her career as a police officer in the NPD in 2000 and has held various positions over the past 25 years, including field training officer, school resource officer, and crisis negotiator. She was promoted to sergeant in 2011, where her duties involved hiring and training, peer support coordination, and crisis negotiation. In 2019, she was promoted to lieutenant, overseeing responsibilities as a patrol watch commander, SWAT commander, and K-9 program manager. In 2021, she achieved her current rank of captain, where she manages administrative services such as investigations, dispatch, evidence, and training. Besides her

police work, **Sasha** is also pursuing a master's degree in public administration and recently graduated from the California Peace Officer Standards Program. She is active in her community, serving on the advisory board of the San Rafael Salvation Army and volunteering as a tour docent at the Jack London Historical State Park. **Sasha** lives in Sonoma County with her husband, **Jerry**, and their four children.

Captain D'Amico began her presentation by clarifying that while she is not an expert in fraud investigation, her 25 years in the police department have provided her with some knowledge on the subject. Her aim was to provide valuable information on how individuals can protect themselves from fraud. She emphasized the importance of pausing to consider the legitimacy of a situation before acting, as fraud can happen to anyone, even those trained in it. The goal of her presentation was to help prevent us from becoming victims of fraud by teaching us to recognize the signs.

Captain D'Amico outlined four key signs that could indicate a scam: the scammer pretends to be from an organization the victim knows, they create a sense of urgency or present a problem, they pressure the victim to act immediately, and they request payment in an unusual way. She shared examples such as receiving texts from the U.S. Postal Service about failed deliveries or calls from Amazon claiming there is an issue with an account. She also mentioned the government impersonation scam, where someone pretends to be from the sheriff's office, claiming the victim has a warrant and must pay immediately to avoid arrest. She clarified that legal matters like warrants are handled through official notices or in person by law enforcement, not through urgent phone calls demanding payment.

Captain D'Amico provided some excellent advice on how to avoid falling victim to these scams. She stressed the importance of not clicking on suspicious links and instead directly contacting the company or service in question. She also suggested blocking unknown callers on cell phones to avoid scam calls, emphasizing that legitimate businesses will not pressure individuals into immediate action. She also encouraged people to hang up on suspicious calls and to use phone settings to filter unknown senders.

Reporting fraud is another critical aspect discussed. **Captain D'Amico** explained the importance of reporting scams to local authorities to alert the community and prevent others from falling victim. They also mention the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) as a resource for reporting fraud, highlighting its simple online form and the value of contributing to larger investigations. Additionally, the speaker recommends AARP's Watchdog Alerts (www.aarp.org/watchdogalerts) as a resource for staying informed about the latest scams.

Captain D'Amico emphasized the importance, yet again, of pausing and consulting with someone else, such as a trusted family member, banker, or even the police, when unsure about a potential scam. This pause can help individuals recognize fraudulent attempts before any damage is done.

Frank Bruno shared a personal experience about an elderly client whose husband was scammed into spending significant amounts of money on fake sweepstakes. The scam escalated to the point where the scammer arranged for a limousine to take the husband to the bank to withdraw more money. The police were involved, but by then, \$35,000 had already been lost. Frank noted that these scams often involve untraceable cash cards, making it difficult to recover the stolen funds.

Frank concluded with a positive example of local Rite Aid store employees intervening to prevent an elderly woman from wiring money in a suspected scam. Despite the store's closure, **Frank** praises the employees for their vigilance and protective customer service.

Gloria Dunn-Violin shared an experience she had with HP support and feeling like she was being led into a scam via the support chat.

Captain D'Amico reminded us in response that scammers pose as legitimate companies to gain access to computers, and emails that appear to be from trusted companies but are actually attempts to steal personal information.

Rene Prado explained to us that when searching for a legitimate company, skip the "sponsored" advertisements to ensure we're going to their real website and use 2-Factor authentication when possible when logging into apps and websites.

We are also reminded that you can lock your credit reports and pull your credit reports every three months from www. freecreditreport.com.

CLOSING

President Tom thanked our speakers, guests and members for attending, and announced that our speaker next week is **Jonathan Eldridge**, current President of the College of Marin. He also reminded us of our picnic at Miwok Park August 30th at 12:15 and our two September 14th work events, Rise Against Hunger and the Bahia Lagoon project and MAYBE we'll have T-Shirts next week. Maybe.
