

Past President

"This Rotarian and some friends (in his college days), ran out of gas while crossing the Rockies. He ran a few miles in the snow over "the Great Divide" with shirt and sandals on. It was not T.J. Neff, so Suzanne is looking for a joke. The final clue was for Keith Axtell. "This Rotarian was brave enough to hitchhike all the way across Canada on his way to California. He got into a very big truck with a gentleman and offered to drive that big truck. While driving at night, he almost hit a moose. Keith's guess of "Who's that Rotarian?" has him looking for his joke book. After several penalty free guesses by various members, we got one final clue. "It's pretty amazing that this guy ran under 10 seconds when he could barely walk a couple weeks ago." The correct answer was Moses Jacob.

### Getting to know you

**Pres. Tom** encouraged members to share personal stories to help everyone get to know each other better. **Jeff Slavitz** recounted how he met **Nancy** on St. Patrick's Day in 1988 at Harrington's Bar in San Francisco and got here business card. **Jeff** had read that he had 48 hours to call for a date or he would be forgotten. He called the next day, which **Nancy** took as extreme interest. That first date lead to a successful 34-year marriage and two children. **Phil D.** then, shared his story of meeting his wife, **Lori**. They had known each other as children, reconnected after 20 years, married 34 years ago and have two daughters. **Phil** noted the contrast of **Jeff** having 48hrs to call and **Phil** waiting 20 years.

### **People of Action**

**President Tom** had **Rene** show a couple of short Rotary videos. The messages were: "Leaders volunteer their skills, expertise, and resources to solve issues and address community needs. We are people of action." "Join us, and together we can make an even greater impact. Find out how you can get involved at rotary.org/action."

### The Program

**President Tom** introduced our Speaker. College of Marin **President Jonathan Eldridge, Ed.D.** He's been with the college for 11 years as vice president, and he works with his faculty and staff, as well as community partners, to create a truly coherent and integrated educational program for students. **President Tom** read an extensive resume, and with "Without further ado", introduced **Dr. Jonathan Eldridge**. **Dr. Eldridge** thanked us for having him talk to our Club. He acknowledged his successor in the vice president role, **Dr. Dana Emerson**, who just joined the college 20 days ago.

**Dr. Eldridge** noted the significant impact the College of Marin has had on the community. **Dr. Eldridge** shared a story of a former student who, after taking ESL classes in 1987, went on to become a realtor and now has children attending the college. This story exemplifies the long-lasting, generational influence the college has on the community.

**Dr. Eldridge** emphasized COM's role as the primary public higher education institution in Marin County. The college's success is largely due to its partnerships with local organizations and agencies. He mentioned an upcoming meeting at the Jonas Center in October with over 100 partners to discuss ways to improve student outcomes in areas such as basic needs, health, and educational opportunities. **Dr. Eldridge** also highlighted the importance of the partnership with the Rotary Club of Novato, which helped establish the Jonas Center, a very popular event space in Marin County.

The College of Marin boasts the highest UC transfer rate among Northern California community colleges. **Dr. Eldridge** underscored the affordability of community college and the opportunities it provides for students to save money before transferring to four-year school. He also discussed the college's commitment to workforce development, particularly through programs like ESL, construction training, and the Certified Nursing Assistant program.

**Dr. Eldridge** addressed barriers faced by low-income, firstgeneration students of color in Marin County, noting that only about 40% of these students complete the A to G requirements necessary for entry into four-year institutions. The College of Marin, which is more diverse than the county itself, plays a crucial role in providing access to higher education for these students. The college's Compass Program, for example, begins working with these students as early as ninth grade to support their academic success and college enrollment. About 70% of Compass students complete the A to G requirements. Additionally, learning communities and the Summer Bridge Program play vital roles in ensuring that students are well-prepared and supported, giving them equitable opportunities to achieve their goals.

**Dr. Eldridge** highlighted COM's athletic programs. He pointed out the new Miwok Aquatic and Fitness Center which hosts water polo, swimming, and diving. There are various other sports offered including baseball and soccer. The college's athletic teams offer students the chance to compete, develop important life skills, and enjoy the experience, but students must have a full academic load. He noted that oldest person with a connection to COM is 100 year old **Art Shallock**, who is living in Sonoma. Art played baseball at College of Marin where he got his associate's degree and pitched for the Yankees in the 1953 World Series.

Efforts to increase student and community involvement on the IVC campus have been bolstered by new facilities such as the Jonas Center, Miwok Aquatic Center, the organic farm, and the Nugget Markets demonstration kitchen. The college is also negotiating with the Marin Fire Service to build housing for the Fire Foundry Program, aiming to diversify the fire service and provide more opportunities for students. This initiative will include housing for seasonal fire workers and facilities for education, equipment maintenance and training, further enhancing the campus education environment.

The college is strengthening its partnerships with NUSD and exploring a middle college model, where high school students spend their entire day on the college campus, taking both high school and college courses. This would provide students with a more direct path to entering the workforce or transferring to a four-year institution. **Dr. Eldridge** also talked about the college's third campus in Bolinas, which is being rebuilt as a field station for teaching and research, in partnership with UC Berkeley and other institutions. This facility will be crucial in addressing climate change and other pressing issues.

As the college approaches its 100th year, **Dr. Eldridge** spoke of the importance of honoring its past and defining its future. The college community, including faculty, staff, students, and alumni, is encouraged to share their stories and contributions. He feels the responsibility of being stewards of the college, focusing on how to make the college the best place to study, work, and drive positive change in the community. The Center for Student Success, set to open during the centennial, is highlighted as a capstone project that will further enhance the college's educational infrastructure.

After **Dr. Eldridge** answered questions from the audience, President Tom thanked our speaker. Then he reminded us of the upcoming calendar, asked us to help clean up the tables and to get our t-shirts.


