

The recipients were camped across a large field a fair distance from the distribution point. A girl, eager to get to her new mode of transport, started walking across the large field on her hands, since her legs no longer worked. On her hands she wore a pair of flip-flops. When she got to her new hand-pedaled bike she was so happy to have a new mode of transportation that she flung her flip-flops away!!!

Janet announced that tomorrow an Interfaith Group based at the

United Methodist Church, located on the corner of Palm and Lemon, is hosting their monthly breakfast for the homeless in the area. While there, the homeless can get free haircuts and showers. They do this breakfast on the last weekend of the month. They encourage volunteers to come help serve. If too many volunteers show up then just have breakfast and sit and visit with one or two of the participants. There, but for the grace of God go you! They are down on their luck for various reasons and they need friendship, help and encouragement. There is a need for useable clothing to give out to those who've worn out what they have. There is always a special need for men's clothing in various sizes. Warm jackets are appreciated. They also could use towels for the people showering.







Max thanked our club for supporting the Transitional Living Center. He has a close friend who suddenly has found herself needing their assistance and were it not for their existence she would not have a place to go. The Transitional Living Center, has a need for bed linens, blankets, and towels. We discussed that if we have those kinds of things donated, we can donate them there. They don't sell well at garage sales.

Speaker: Joy Prowse "Rotary Peace Fellowships"



Clara introduced her friend and fellow Peace Chair, Joy Prowse. Joy and her husband Stan co-run their Law Firm in Carlsbad. She has had a career that included working for IBM and another large corporation. She says it was Rotary, however, that made her come alive. She is a member of the Carlsbad High Noon club of which her husband is currently the President. Joy is the District Rotary Peace

Fellowship Chair. Her duties include soliciting qualified applicants for the Rotary Peace Fellowship Program.





This program, I must point out, is different from our District's Peace Ambassadorial Program where we bring one student from another country to USD's Peace and Justice program to earn a Master's in Peace and Justice in one year's time. (maybe 14 months) The Fellowship Program is a Rotary International Fellowship that offers a Master's degree program or a Professional development program of 3 month's length. The Master's degree program is a 15- 24-month program requiring a 2-3-month self-designed applied field experience plus a final thesis. The Professional Development

Certificate is a 3-month program offering an intensive interdisciplinary coursework with expert lecturers and domestic and international field studies.

The eligibility qualifications are stringent. A bachelor's degree or equivalent is required for the Master's degree, plus three year of full-time related work experience. For the Certificate program you need a strong academic background, plus five years of full-time related work experience.

You need to be fluent in two languages, and three are preferable, and be fluent in English. You also need strong leadership skills. You must apply by May 31, and contact the Rotary District for endorsement that includes an interview. The endorsement is due to Rotary International by 1 July. Once selected you must apply separately for university admission. The only peace center in our country is Duke University. Normally, you would apply to the university that is closest to the country where you work. There are six Rotary Peace Center University Partners. One in Australia, England, Japan, Sweden, Thailand, and USA. Peace Fellow alumni serve as leaders in government, nongovernmental organizations, the military, law enforcement, education, humanitarian action, restorative justice, and international organizations.

Our most recent Peace Fellow was a man in his late 30's who is in the Border Patrol. He is married and has a family. His Master's degree will allow him to get a leadership position there. Joy told us that we should always be on the look-out for people who are natural leaders, smart, at least bilingual, with a bachelors or equivalent college credits. They should be recommended to receive this Fellowship. The Fellowship provides tuition and fees, room and board, Round-trip transportation, and Internship/field study expenses.
