Guest Speakers: Lisa Berlanga and Ivy Blumberg



Lisa Berlanga presented for us, about <u>Learn 4 Life</u>, which has separate charters for separate schools. Learn for life acts like a school district. They have 80 school charters in California. Most of the charters have multiple learning centers, like the school our club has assisted at College and El Cajon Blvd. Lisa was just promoted to be principle to 4 locations, for which we all congratulated her. The students are all independent study. The school wants students under age 18 to come to the school twice a week. For students over age 18, they want then to come in one time a week. Students can work with Diego Hills until age 24. Most are age 17-22 years old. DH early on tries to determine what path they should be on: community college, miliatary, career.

They do a lot of college counseling, visiting campuses, enrollment visits by Grossmont CC admissions, etc. Military recruiters visit the campus, and DH does career technology classes. DH is a Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act Partnership participant. DH does actually issue high school diplomas, not just GED's. DH has a number of "camps" where students go to see, do things. DH does have choir and band. They do have some sports teams. Last year, they did graduate 100 students, 100 people that most likely would not have gotten high school diplomas without this system. Fern and Jeff have come many times to test eyes, and over 30 of the students were provided needed glasses. DH does provide the textbooks. Many of their students are First in their family to graduate high school; about 20% of the kids who come to DH get caught up in their acedemics, and go back to their normal high school. About 40% of the people who come to DH do graduate through DH. About 12-15% are on "IEP" special ed system, which is about normal percent, but it is also the case that ALL DH

students have individual studies. Our club foundation has donated \$2,000 toward scholarships for 4 graduating students going on to further education.

DH is in the process of remodeling a building at 54th and El Cajon, which are twice as many rooms as they currently have at College & El Cajon Blvd. They are excited about more space for more of the various things that they provide to the students. They are a non-profit organization. They are state funded, funded per student, not paid per attendance, but per student work product since thier whole system is not based on attendance. The school is WOSC accredited, which does allow thier students to enter directly into a 4 year university.

Ivy stood and said that after many years in education, this job has been her best job ever. That these kids really benefit from the Diego Hills system.
