- Janet announced that many of our guests today were from Helix Charter High School. They were here to thank us for sponsoring them to participate



in the Model UN and to report on it's success and value as a learning tool and fun! Lloyd Sabin the teacher who supports this valuable endeavor,



sponsored by Rotary, trains the students who wish to participate, was present. He told us that he has participated for the past 11 years, but the event was actually begun before that. He said he has seen the event grow and improve with each passing year. Students came from a number of countries to participate. Our club sponsored two who came from Costa Rica and the four Helix HS students who participated. Three of those students were here today, Mahamed Abdulahi, Muna Abdulahi, (brother & sister of Sade Abdulahi (pronounced Suad) whom we

have supported in the past and is now in college) and Zoe Kulhlken. The fourth student, Madeleine Denison was unable to be present. Each student described how they participated. Two represented Australia and argued on "Climate Change" from the position of Australia's stance on that subject. The other two argued from the stance that South Korea has maintained on the same subject. All students told us how much fun it was and how much researching effort went into understanding the topic from another country's point-of-view. They each were presented with a certificate from our club



Guest Speaker: Police Chief Vasquez



Janet introduced Police Chief Vasquez, today's speaker. Chief Vasquez, who has spoken to the club before, chose to share with us how much the crime in La Mesa has gone down recently. He had a chart that showed that the crime frequency for 2017 is now equal to that of 1962 down from a peak almost double of that in more recent intervening years. He attributes that to a number of changes in the work of policing the community: The police have worked to build working relationships with people,

businesses, and schools. Slowly, they've rebuilt attitudes of trust and admiration. They now have strong commitment to community involvement and working together. They have benefitted from increasing availability of video technology. Security camera footage and smart phones give people the means to immediately supply footage revealing license numbers and pictures of crimes and the people committing them as they happen. They analyze data continually. They have a young staff of people facile with the available technology and with using Facebook, Twitter, and Next Door. Neighborhood Watch groups are also helpful.

He spent some time telling us how crimes are categorized; violent assault (murder – rape), property, (now at the lowest point in 50 years), robbery (someone takes your valuables using force or threat of force) burglary (entry into a building or cars to take valuables). He defined



prolific criminals as those people with multiple burglaries both in buildings and taking cars. On that note he reminded us that car theft is up so don't leave any valuables in your car, in sight, and always lock your car. He bragged on their 911 team. They are evaluated on how many call answers they have in 15 seconds. They have 95% of the calls are answered in 15 seconds or less, 95% of the time.

One reason he was here was to introduce Officer Michael Chiaverini, an Army veteran who has been with the force for close to 4 years. Michael Chiaverini was selected as La Mesa's Officer of the Year 2017 for many reasons. He treats everyone with respect, he has established good rapport with his fellow officers and with the community members he works with. He engages with the community, pays attention to crime trends, has great computer skills and expertise with the law. He is a superb communicator and had the most arrests in 2017. He turns in great crime reports



showing good attention to detail. He is good at interviewing and asking the right questions. He has had no complaints.

Janet presented Chief Vasquez with a Rotary plaque honoring him for his leadership and a check as a thank you. She also presented Officer Michael Chiaverini with a certificate from our club along with a check for \$250 as a thank you for being an exemplary Officer. The club gave him a standing ovation.


