
Recommendations: mailbox that locks. send out mail by placing in a big blue mailbox, or at the actual post office. Credit Cards now should have the "chip". with the older magnetic strips, the vendor ends up having your credit card



number. in much of the world, they use of the credit card right at your table, not carry your card away from you. We expect that to happen here sooner. Shred documents like credit card offer checks. Post-Its around your computer with password.

TOR = the onion router is how people access "the dark web", where cocaine etc is sold etc. which has things like the credit card marketplace, like an ebay for stolen credit card numbers. even with yelp like reviews of the sellers. Data Breaches. Be wary of public WiFi. Anything you are sending and receiving is visible to others. Don't do your banking on open WiFi. If you MUST, then use a VPN to send and receive encrypted.

Ransomware is where your data gets encrypted and held for payment. Often it is not really locked, it may just be a message. Threats that



Always check to see if you are on a secure website: lock symbol, color of address bar, and an S in the "https" part of the web address. Use strong unique passwords. think of a passphrase, such as: the charges stink, to help you remember a series of letters: TC\$ or a password manager, lastpass, to store all passwords, now only need to remember the masterpassword. "Passwords are like underwear: don't let people see it, change it very often, and you shouldn't share it with strangers." Chris Pirillo.
