"Who Am I?" by Max Scrivens



Last week Ron nominated Max to be our lucky 'Who Am I' person. Max, forgetting about it, delivered a nice extemporaneous recap of his life. He emphasized that he and his wife of 29 years are grateful to be "where they are today" (a comfortable life style with 2 healthy grown children) but, it was a struggle at times getting there. He spent his growing up years as the youngest of 8 children living in a trailer park. He's a vet and has worked since his service years at a variety of jobs, including General Dynamics, where a friend advised him to find something more permanent, not long before they went out of business. He applied for and got a job as a handyman at a mortuary, and the

owner suggested he become a mortician. He went to "mortuary science school" and has worked as a "post-mortem surgeon" (sounds better than a mortician) for 28 years. He loves Rotary because it has allowed him to give back to the community. He likes the freedom to choose the causes that interest him. He admires the fact that Rotary is world-wide, but that it is local too, is more important to him. He sees Bill Pogue as his mentor and ideal to work to become more like. He started out as a member of the Torrey Pines club and met Ivan there, but he loves this club because of the friendly atmosphere that has made him feel so welcome.

Max wanted to get back at Ron who nominated him for this gig (speaking to us), but he couldn't tag him because he'd already spoken, so he tagged John Stremlau for speaking next week.

Speaker Presentation on "Upcoming 2020 Census", by Alejandro Aguilar, Partnership Specialist for US Census Bureau



Jeff introduced our speaker, Alejandro Aguilar, here to talk about the upcoming 2020 Census. Alejandro is a Partnership Specialist for the US Census Bureau with the Department of Commerce. He previously worked for the National Labor board as a language Specialist where he helped the bilingual community. He is a graduate of Northern Arizona University and is a veteran of the US Armed forces where he served as a paratrooper. He has a passion for flying helicopters and has a private pilot license from Quantum Helicopters.

Alejandro told us how very important the results of the Census are. Article 1, section 2 of our United States
Constitution demands a Census of the populations every ten years. It is

from the results of the census that determines how money is apportioned to the states right down to cities within the states. The 2010 census was not all that accurate, and many localities didn't get the money that should rightfully have been theirs. He used La Mesa as an example. It is estimated that the population of La Mesa was undercounted by 1000 people. That translated into a 2 million dollar loss of funds each year for ten years. The populations most likely to be under-



counted are those of color, children under 5, LGBTQ, undocumented immigrants (yes, they need to respond and no they don't have to identify themselves as here illegally), non-English speakers, homeless, tribal groups, rural residents & disabled.

To help mitigate this under-counting they are using more methods of reporting and offering more education on the process. You will now be able to report online, by phone, mail, and face to face response, and kiosks.

What's at stake? There will be \$675 Billion to be distributed. \$70 Billion will go to the state and that translates to about \$2000 per year per person; distributed to schools, Medicare, Medi-Cal, Medicaid and so on. Undercounting could also result in a loss of a seat in the House of Representatives, where a lot of decisions are made or approved.
