Speaker: Dick Fisher 'Living on Alcatraz'



Dick Fisher had truncated his talk about living on Alcatraz as a child so fit our short schedule so we skipped a long introduction. He divided his time into three parts. Alcatraz history, Escape attempts, and personal experiences.

Alcatraz was not only a prison. He was there when it was a Federal Prison because his father was a correctional officer. They lived there in building 64, an apartment building for employees and their families. It was situated on a low part of the island facing San Francisco and just above the docks. It was about 13 stories below the prisoner housing. You had to hike a

steep zig-zag road up to the prison part. Because of the slope you could access the third story where he lived directly from the road, as well as the 2nd story and the first story. Dick remarked that you could say they were the first gated community ever.

Alcatraz History

- 1769 4 engineers traveled the west coast, hunting for the perfect place for a lighthouse. They chose Alcatraz but it wasn't built until much later
- 1776 It was seen as a perfect place to protect the entrance to San Francisco Bay. The gold rush had started and its military value superseded its value as a lighthouse. It helped protect the gold rush influx.
- 1854The lighthouse was added.
- 1907The military began to use it as a military prison.The parade ground was added.

- 1934 The place was turned into a Federal Prison.
- 1963 It was closed as a prison because it was 3 times more expensive to run than any other Federal Prison.
- 1969 The was the 19 month long Indian Occupation that ultimately prompted the US Government to forcibly remove them, but it established the right of the Indians to demand their civil rights.
- 1971 It was turned into a National Park.

Escapes/ Attempts: While a prison there were 14 escape attempts and they involved 36 inmates.

- 1936 Prisoner number 210 escaped. At first prisoners were never called by name, Only by number.
- 1937 Two prisoners tried to swim and drowned.
- 1938 Three attempted escape.
- 1939 Fourteen attempted escape
- 1943 Four more tried.
- 1945 John K.Giles attempted, passing himself off dressed as a man in the military. He'd worked in the laundry for over a year. While there he stole the makings of a full military uniform, piece by piece, assembled it, right down to a belt and shoes. He put it on under his prisoner

garb and since he was also someone was trusted to load stuff onto the boats, he shed his prison garb down under the dock and walked onto the boat and made it to Angel Island where there were authorities waiting to pick him up and return him to the prison.

- 1946 The **Battle** of **Alcatraz**, which lasted from May 2 to 4, 1946, was the result of an unsuccessful escape attempt **Alcatraz** Federal Penitentiary.Two corrections officers—William A. Miller and Harold Stites—were killed along with three of the inmates.
- 1958 Two inmates try.

1962 Two men, Parker & Scott, tried to swim to San Francisco. One made it as far as a little out-cropping of rocks called Little Alcatraz. The other made it to the southern-most support of the Golden Gate Bridge, unconscious and pulled from the water by someone who pulled him out and called authorities. After a few days in the hospital to recover from hypothermia, he was returned to prison. A movie was made of this called "Escape from Alcatraz."

Personal Experiences: When Dick lived on Alcatraz, he enjoyed the company of other children from other families who also had a member working on the island. This was in the time before TV, cell phones, and computers so they had to make up games and things to do to entertain themselves. The

parade ground was a place to roller-skate with the old clampon style roller-skates that you tightened the skates with a key. He shared his last pair of skates and he even still had the key, which one had to wear on a shoe-lace around your neck so it didn't get lost. You always needed to adjust the tightness with that key. He even still had the key! Since he was right-handed, he was right footed as well and that skate wore out faster. When that happened, the children learned that you threw away the broken skate, took the wheels off the other and attached them to a board you got from the prison's carpenter shop. He likes to think they invented the first skateboard. You really couldn't do curves too well, so they sat on the board and



coasted down the first part of that long zig-zag road from the top to the first long curve. If you weren't careful you'd end up smashing into a chain-link fence. Another game they made up was to stand on that foot-bridge that went from the road to the third floor and spit down to the first level. If you could spit through the chain link fence, you got a point. The most points he ever got in that game was 8. There was no school on the island, but there was a regular ferry. That ran from San Francisco to their dock and back on schedule. It took about 15 minutes to make the trip. When they got to San Francisco the High School was about 2 blocks away. College was a bit further. Sherman Elementary School was about 7 blocks. Since he had asthma and San Francisco weather plays havoc with
