#### PROGRAM: CAL FIRE DIVISION CHIEF, NICK SCHULER "LILAC FIRE RECAP"

**Mike Davis** introduced Nick Schuler, Division Chief at Cal Fire. He has been on the incident management team for the last 12 years and has responded to many different types of emergency situations. He is the Operations Chief for ground and air resources. Nick and his wife, Shelby, live in Carlsbad and have three children.

December 7, 2017, weather patterns indicated there would be a fire that day. Schuler said that Cal Fire works very closely with meteorologists to determine the probability of a fire happening on any given day, based on conditions. That day, there was little-to-no-precipitation and the drought-stricken vegetation made conditions perfect for a very dangerous fire. Because of the awareness of the dangers regarding conditions, staffing had been increased in preparation for a potential disaster.



RESOURCES AVAILABLE: 31 engines,3 bulldozers,11 hand crews, 2 fixed wing air tankers and 4 rotary winged helicopters.

By 11:15 that morning, there was a report of a brush fire and because of the conditions, Schuler was dispatched to the fire near Bonsall. The fire had already burned 2-3 acres and as soon as the wind picked it up, it spread. Structures were immediately threatened, roads were closed, as well as mandatory evacuation. At that point, additional resources were requested.

The Rancho Monserate Country Club was engulfed in flames and 50-60 mobile homes burned to the ground within minutes of the fire starting. All lives were saved but the winds were very difficult and moved the fire to additional locations. Schuler explained that wildfires require a lot of movement by the firefighters and that the engines are usually supplying the water, as opposed to a fire hydrant.

As a result of the strong wind there were fires starting a mile ahead of the Lilac fire. There were 400 firefighters on location the day of the Lilac fire. Firefighters being "on ready" and the ability to locate fire engines closest to the fires were helpful for immediate responses. Schuler also explained that all evacuations are challenging, but this one had particular issues because of the large animal evacuation. The horse facility's barns were catching on fire and the horses ran out and back in which put both the animals and the firefighters at risk. He learned that large animal evacuations are very difficult, particularly with only 50 percent of horse-owners having a horse trailer.

MORE STATS: 99,000+ people were advised to evacuate or to be ready to evacuate; 4,000+ acres burned; 92,000+ gallons of retardant dropped; 360,000+ gallons of water; 163 engines responded; and 221 structures damaged or destroyed.

Schuler explained that repopulation requires SDGE, law enforcement and fire to collaborate and work together to ensure the safety of the people and infrastructure integrity prior to allowing citizens to return to their properties.

President David spoke about how Carlsbad handled the evacuees. Thankfully, Carlsbad was not directly impacted by the fires, which allowed Carlsbad residents and others to respond with information regarding temporary evacuation points and facilities which housed displaced individuals. Carlsbad's emergency operations center (EOC) notified evacuees of the temporary evacuation locations, like The Forum in Carlsbad. Over 300 evacuees were sheltered and 800 meals were provided, thanks to the generosity of local eateries. Tina Ray was recognized for being instrumental in relaying information to residents, and evacuees. Mike Davis recognized President David's hard work in professionally handling and flawlessly executing the plan under his leadership. Mike Davis also recognized how Schuler handled the first responders, many of whom were deployed for over 200 days.
