VOCATIONAL SERVICES

Vocational Service Director **Rick Grove** gave a rundown of that area of service and highlighting some of the ways the club works in the vocational arena, including hosting the Four-Way Speech Contest, sponsoring the Carlsbad High School Interact Club, hosting the AVID youth seminar and sending students to the annual Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) weekend conference. PROGRAM: CANINE COMPANIONS for INDEPENDENCE

SPEAKER: Kathleen King

Kathleen King was one of two women representing Canine Companions for Independence, and each had a dog with her. King's dog was Leola, a golden retriever who will be graduating in November; Donna Fipps was there with Resse, a black lab who will be graduating in February. King and Fipps are puppy raisers: someone who gets a potential service dog when the puppy is about eight weeks old and shares her home with and works with that puppy for almost two years, teaching some 30 commands. Everywhere she goes, the puppy goes with her in an effort to socialize the



puppy. From there, the dog goes into professional training to become a forever assistant to someone who needs help (mobility, seeing or hearing impaired). After being



professionally trained in a specific assistance area, the dog graduates and is then given to its new "forever best friend." There is no charge to that person, and once the dog

gets to retirement age, it spends the rest of its life with a loving and responsible caretaker—sometimes even the trainer or the puppy raiser. King and Fipps encouraged anyone interested in learning more about becoming a puppy raiser to contact info@cci.org or to visit the cci.org website. Puppy raisers are vetted, and their homes inspected. They get training and must promise to return the dog when the puppy-raising period has been completed.
