Art Pratt Grant San Diego Air and Space Museum

The Art Pratt Foundation of Old Mission Rotary presented a grant of \$8000 to the San Diego Air and Space Museum on January 9th. The San Diego Air & Space Museum is an aviation and space exploration museum in Balboa Park and is housed in the former Ford Building. The museum is divided into many galleries with exhibits emphasizing the contributions San Diego has made to aviation. Sections include the Theodore Gildred Rotunda, Special Exhibit area, World War I Gallery, Golden Age of Flight Gallery, World War II Gallery, and Modern Jet & Space Age Gallery, and the Edwin D. McKeller Pavilion of Flight.

The funds from the Art Pratt grant will be used to remodel the storage and restoration area in the basement of the museum.

The Legal Minute Net Neutrality



Retired Attorney Bob Self presented a "Legal Minute" on the topic of Net Neutrality.

Net neutrality is the principle that Internet service providers must treat all data on the Internet the same, and not discriminate or charge differently by user, content, website, platform, application, type of attached equipment, or method of communication. On January 9th, retired attorney Bob Self presented a "Legal Minute" on this confusing and controversial topic.

This standard was made law by the FCC under the Obama administration but was just recently reversed under the leadership of the new Trump FCC chairman Agit Pai. The country is now holding its breath to see if internet service providers take advantage of the deregulation to manipulate internet speeds and content to their financial advantage. Bob even read a statement from his former employer, Cox Communication: "Today's vote by the FCC to remove the Title II section of the Net Neutrality rules does not impact our commitment to Net Neutrality. We do not block, throttle or otherwise interfere with consumers' desire to go where they want on the Internet. Cox has always been committed to providing an open Internet experience for our customers." We shall see!

Tuberculosis in San Diego!



Dr. Kevin Glynn has redirected his energy and expertise into educating the public about the alarming rise of Tuberculosis cases in San Diego.

Dr. Kevin Glynn is a Pulmonologist and retired as Medical Director of Scripps Health after a 32 year career. He is the author of a recently published book "Gasping for Air: How Breathing Is Killing Us and What We Can Do about It." Kevin is passionate about public health and has also been a member of the Rotary District 5340 "Don't Wait Vaccinate" committee and was involved in Rotary support for the film "The Invisible Threat." On January 2nd, Kevin delivered a fascinating and disturbing talk to Old Mission Rotary on the rise of Tuberculosis in San Diego. Once rare in developed countries, tuberculosis infections began increasing in 1985, partly because of the emergence of HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. HIV weakens a person's immune system so it can't fight the TB germs. In the United States, because of stronger control programs, tuberculosis began to decrease again in 1993, but remains a concern. TB worldwide strikes over nine million people and results in 1.5 million deaths each year.

San Diego has a higher than average rate of TB than the rest of the USA; 57 per 100,000 persons as opposed to 3 per 100,000 persons. This is due to our position along the Mexican border. The Tijuana hospital Memorias Albergue has shifted it's focus from HIV to TB as this disease is making a resurgence. Tuberculosis is caused by bacteria that spread from person to person through microscopic droplets released into the air. This can happen when someone with the untreated, active form of tuberculosis coughs, speaks, sneezes, spits, laughs or sings. The good news is that very effective drug treatments are available and inexpensive. Once rare in developed countries, tuberculosis infections began increasing in 1985, partly because of the emergence of HIV, the virus that causes AIDS. HIV weakens a person's immune system so it can't fight the TB germs. In the United States, because of stronger control programs, tuberculosis began to decrease again in 1993, but remains a concern. Dr. Kevin Glynn has made it a personal priority to increase awareness of the new TB problem and is even offering to present a program at other Rotary Clubs.

Stock Market Report 2018 Wrap Up



Brian Dempsey is a past president of Old Mission Rotary and delivers are almost weekly "Stock Market Report" at our meetings. He is a retired Naval Aviator and has been a financial adviser for Edward Jones for 25 years.

Brian Dempsey presented a very memorable Stock Market Report as he summarized the spectacular gains in the stock market in 2017. The Dow was 25% higher in 2017 as it approached the 25,000 point mark. The broader S&P 500 increased 19% and the technology heavy Nasdaq was up an impressive 28%. Even crude oil recovered and is now trading around \$60 per barrel. It was the best year for the markets since 2013. Of course, the markets have suffered a dramatic correction in late January. Now we know from the Eagles victory in Super Bowl LII that 2018 will be a Bull Market! The Super Bowl Indicator is a superstition that states that if a team from the American Football Conference (AFC) wins, then it will be a bear market (or down market), but if a team from the National Football Conference (NFC) or a team that was in the NFL before the NFL/ AFL merger wins, it will be a bull market (up market).

The Legal Minute Legalized Marijuana

January Flash President, Eric Benink, introduced the **Legal Minute** to our club meetings! On January 2nd, Lee Kaminetz discussed the new California law that legalizes recreational cannabis. The new law is particularly interesting as it defies the federal policy that classifies Marijuana as a narcotic. The Trump Administration has responded by reversing an Obama Administration policy of looking the other way on legalized pot.

Lee also discussed the rise of the minimum wage to \$10.50 per hour and the new regulations prohibiting employers from asking about previous wages and criminal history at job interviews.

He remembers the raucous days in the 60s and 70s when 100 Rotarians would crowd the meeting room for lunch. Among the crowd were a great many very interesting characters!

There was a very quiet and unassuming dairy farmer who stood up at a meeting one day in the mid 1960s to announce that he had sold his farm and that the city was going to build a football stadium on the property!

Member Frank Wood was Grant Wood's brother; the American painter best known for his paintings

He started a career in the restaurant business with the Jolly Ox in 1967 and experienced major success with his Hungry Hunter chain. One notable flop was Tortilla Flats that served the worst Mexican food in San Diego! He remembers his Food and Beverage Director explaining to him that Americans will never eat carnitas! In addition to Africa, Mike and his wife Sheryl also love to travel to Europe and Sheryl is particularly fond of Paris!

In the Shadows of Kilimanjaro.



Heather Rogers presented a fascinating talk on her experiences working at a school in the East African nation of Tanzania. Kilimanjaro is a snow-covered mountain 19,710 feet high, and is said to be the highest mountain in Africa. Its western summit is called the Masai "Ngaje Ngai," the House of God. Close to the western summit there is the dried and frozen carcass of a leopard. No one has explained what the leopard was seeking at that altitude...

And so it was, like the leopard in Hemingway's novel, Heather Rogers, was drawn to serve for six months with the Good Hope Project in the magical East African nation of Tanzania. Heather was first introduced to the dark Continent on a family safari arranged by her grandfather, Old Mission Rotarian Mike Rogers.

Tanzania is Jamhuri ya Muungano wa Tanzania in Swahili. It is a sovereign state in eastern Africa within the African Great Lakes region. It borders the Indian Ocean to the east.

The population of the country is estimated at 55.57 million. and speaks over 100 different languages!

European colonialism began in mainland Tanzania during the late

19th century by Germany and then the British following World War I. The mainland of Tanganyika, was eventually merged with the Zanzibar Island Archipelago following independence in the early 1960s. Heather grew up in Poway and studied Environmental Engineering at Cal Poly San Luis Obispo. She took time to travel the world and was starting an exciting professional career in San Francisco when Africa called.

In Tanzania, Heather served with the Good Hope Support organization with the mission "To provide education, skills, knowledge, support, comfort, safety and love to children infected or affected with HIV/AIDS, orphans, people suffering from illness, and the disadvantaged, in order to help them create an empowering life of hope." Heather thrived and made wonderful friends with children at the school. She even became a sister to three Masai warriors who looked out for her. Everyone was anxious to teach her Swahili. She was so dedicated that when her three month visa expired she traveled 20 hours over hot and dusty roads in an ancient bus to Kampala Uganda so that she could extend her visa another three months! Every member of the club was truly impressed with Heather's humanitarian spirit and sense of adventure. It was only fitting that she ended her presentation with a Swahili thank you...
