## Understanding Affordable Housing



Tricia Tasto Levien has more than two decades of experience in housing programs, government relations and project management, with expertise in legislative activities and supportive housing development and operations.

Tricia Tasto Levien is the Vice President of Operations for Wakeland Housing & Development Corporation and she presented a program, on August 29th, about the work her organization is doing to bring affordable housing to low income households in San Diego County.

Wakeland Housing & Development Corporation was founded in 1998 as a nonprofit corporation. With its for-profit and nonprofit partners, Wakeland has developed, acquired and rehabilitated 7,900 units of affordable housing over

the years, emerging as a leader in affordable housing communities in San Diego and throughout California. Some 39,000 people have received housing in 57 separate communities.

Low income is defined by the term Area Median Income (AMI). In 2023, the Area Median Income (AMI) for San Diego County is \$116,800. Low income residents will not be expected to pay more than 30% of their monthly income towards rent. An example is a family with an income of \$2000 per month would be expected to pay \$700.

Wakeland also offers supportive housing where residents have access to a wide range of onsite and offsite supportive services that address the complex needs of people who have experienced homelessness, with the goal of helping them thrive in their homes for the long term. At Wakeland's supportive housing properties, the annual housing attrition rate is just 8 percent, with 92 percent of residents remaining stably housed. A new project is the conversion of the Riverwalk Golf Course in Mission Valley to a new residential community of 930 apartments. 430 of the units will be allocated for low income rentals.

More than 350 struggling households will soon move into affordable homes in San Diego and Riverside counties thanks to \$68 million awarded to Wakeland from the State of California's Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD).

A common fear among the public is that low income housing will bring in crime. chaos and other

problems to their neighborhoods. Matt Risi noted that the Stratton Apartments and the new Ivy senior living apartment project in Clairemont blend right into the neighborhood.

Our members were very engaged by the program and there were many questions. Our members demonstrated that there is clearly a lack of understanding among the general public on how affordable housing works.
