

ESTATE PLANNING

SPEAKERS: Nancy Regan, Tyler Happe, Kristin Kaminsky & Fred Rowe

The subject of the presentation at Monday night's meeting was estate planning. Our speakers were our own Nancy Regan, Tyler Happe, and Kristin Kaminski, all experts in this area. Fred Rowe also spoke to us about making the Rotary Foundation part of your estate plan.

Kristin began by telling us a bit about probate. Probate is a process by which your assets are legally transferred to your beneficiaries. The process usually takes nine to twelve months, but can drag on for years if there are complications. When appointing an executor (family member or otherwise), think carefully about who you want to appoint. You want this person to be organized, prudent, and responsible, and also to be as neutral as possible to avoid potential conflicts.

A will does not avoid probate, which brings us to Nancy's discussion of trusts. A trust is a technique that avoids probate. As Nancy says, "Before it turns to dust, come to me to do your trust." With a living trust, the grantors are the trustees as well as the beneficiaries during their lifetime. There are successor trustees named in the document. The trust contains instructions to the successor trustee as to how the assets are to be managed if that becomes necessary, and ultimately how they are to distributed.

A trust has three phases. In phase one, the grantors have management. In phase two, the surviving grantor has management, and in phase three, the successor trustee pays the bills, marshals the assets, and transfers them to the beneficiaries.

It is important to put all of your assets into the trust, including real estate, bonds, bank accounts, stocks, and all property.

Tyler talked about when to do estate planning? The answer is NOW. It is important to think not only about what will happen after you die, but who will handle your affairs in the event that you become incapacitated. This is very important for single people to think about. Another thing to think about is that as a parent of a young adult child, you have no ability to speak for them or even know what is going on with them medically in the event of an emergency if you do not have proper paperwork in place.

When should you review your estate plan? Every two years is a good rule, but some other events that might trigger a need for a review are the death of a beneficiary, a marriage, births, transitions such as working to retirement, or when you move. Don't forget to put the new house in the trust! And remember, passing away without an estate plan can be very expensive for your heirs.

Fred wrapped up the presentation by talking to us about some ways that Rotarians can make the Foundation a part of their estate plan, including leaving money in your will, taking out an insurance policy with the Foundation as the beneficiary, or donating stocks, bonds, etc. If you leave anything at all in your estate plan to the Foundation you become a benefactor. If you leave \$10,000 or more you joint the Bequest Society. And if you leave \$25,000 or more, you get to to name the specific fund you want the bequest to go to.

Kristin, Nancy, Tyler and Fred are all available to answer any questions you might have.

Joe Scheimer, our Assistant District Governor, spoke to the club about the Rotary International Foundation and how it funds Global Grants and District Grants. After three years, 50% of the money donated to the RI Foundation is returned to the District for club projects. District 5180 allocates half of the returned money for Global Grant projects and half for District Grant projects (which include scholarships). Joe explained the requirements for submitting grant applications and for getting paid when the project has been completed.

The Rotary Club of Fair Oaks is completing two District Grant projects this year: Bruce Hagel's Little Free Library project and Pete Schroeder's It's Never Too Late music lessons for seniors project. Fred Rowe is working on a big Global Grant project with Save the Rain and other Rotary clubs.

Maggie Hoy announced that there are still three cabins available for the summer campout, which will be held August 5-7 at Lake Francis.






Rotary District 5180 Annual Convention: May 20-22 at the Double Tree in Berkeley.


