

### THE FOUNDING OF THE ROTARY CLUB OF FAIR OAKS AND FAIR OAKS IN 1946

Linda Aseltine delighted the group with a discussion of the charter presentation from 1946, and gave us a brief history of that year. The top highlights: the war had ended and Rotary was fundamental in establishing the United Nations. The latest in ladies' fashion included gloves and hats and vivid lipsticks and nails. For men -- pinstripe suits. Frank Sinatra was the big name in the music business, and girls swooned over him. Families were buying TVs - which was likely a 10 x 12 inch screen in a brown box. People were out and about more: 1946 was one of the first years vehicles were sold as they weren't sold during the war.

An enjoyable memoir of a woman who moved to Fair Oaks in the 40s was read by Alice Rowe, Dianna Cralle, Mary Cate Gustafson, and Ralph Carhart. The memoir discussed the townhouse, which is much different than it was in the past. There was talk of a dam in the American River. Interest payments of failed banks and technocrats were the talk of the town. Technocrats, or those who were technically savvy, were among the elite of the town. A siren was sounded on the last Friday of every month. Elders were concerned with delinquency among the young. The Fair Oaks National Bank began.

The very first Little Genius performed with admirable restraint by fining no one but himself (hopefully). tthe 1947 RI convention was held in San Francisco and attended by some new Rotarians from Fair Oaks.




## Future Event ROTARIANS AT WORK DAY



On September 29<sup>th</sup>, 2008 the County of Sacramento purchased the Camp Fire Day Camp (CFDC) from the Camp Fire USA Sacramento Sierra Council. Consisting of approximately 10 acres The CFDC is located in the River Bend Area of the American River Parkway.

Rotary District 5180 partnered with SaveMart and the Sacramento Coungy Parks Department on a multi-year project to rehabilitate the Camp Fire Day Camp.
