## Options For Youth Charter School Speaker: Jocelyn Baldwin

Successful charter schools are often accused of cherry picking the best students. Our speaker, Jocelyn Baldwin, described the teaching strategies at Options For Youth (OFY) that yield excellent results, even though OFY enrolls many seriously at-risk youth.

#### What is Options for Youth?

Options For Youth (OFY) is a free non-profit charter school open to students in grades 7 – 12. OFY's founders started the program in 1987 to provide at-risk and underserved students an alternative to traditional learning methods and environments. When California's Charter School Law passed in 1992, Options For Youth became the first sanctioned charter school in California. OFY now has 32 campuses in northern and southern California and has helped more than 135,000 students.

OFY has five centers within the San Juan Unified School District (Arden Arcade, Carmichael, Orangevale, Rancho Cordova and North Highlands) with a total of about 1,200 students. The results have been dramatic. Jocelyn described an encounter with an academic who flatly told her that there was no chance that any of her OFY students would ever be accepted at a four-year college. In 2014, one student was accepted at a four-year university and in 2015, the number increased to twentyseven.

#### How is Options for Youth Different from Conventional Public Schools?

The program at Options For Youth includes:

- Independent study
- Small group classes
- Online courses
- Night classes
- One-on-one, single-subject tutoring
- Hands-on experiential activities, trips, and cultural excursions

Some of the components of OFY educational system that you won't find in conventional public schools include:

- Relationship building between teachers and students
- Team building
- High expectations
- Flexibility for example the ability to change curriculum if necessary
- College visits
- Character evaluation
- Core values of mutual respect, integrity, compassion and trust

In her talk, Jocelyn Baldwin described how many new OFY students are sullen and withdrawn, coming from bad homes and difficult situations at their prior schools. They often arrive for their first day at OFY dressed completely in black, hair in their faces, with minimal desire to be social. The staff and teachers at OFY become the only adult friends and good role models they have in the world. Within a few months at OFY, many of their new students, have better social attitudes, dress better, better grooming and, best of all, they are learning, passing tests and getting decent grades.



# The President's Corner Eradicating Polio in Pakistan

Here are the shifts that will finally eradicate polio in Pakistan, and thus, the world!

The president of a Rotary Club in Pakistan was a special guest, along with his wife and son - all doctors - at a club in the Chicago suburbs last week. I happened to be there to support a good friend who was being inducted that night. The Pakistani visitors shared what is now going on in Pakistan regarding the eradication of polio there. There are 3 new aspects to the fight against the disease ...

- 1. Religious leaders are the most respected leaders in the country. So now, religious leaders are accompanying all vaccination teams to "approve" of the work, so the people are cooperating as never before.
- 2. Previous attempts to spread the word about the vaccinations places, times, dates, etc were printed in English (at first) and then in the local language, but it never occurred to anyone that the general population, while hearing and speaking fluently, could not read! Consequently, printed information was largely ineffective. Now, there are audio messages broadcast around the country.
- 3. The eastern end of Pakistan is controlled by the military. After much persuasion, the Pakistani Army not only allows the vaccinations, the soldiers are now the vaccinators!


These major shifts in efforts will be the difference. A drastic reduction in cases should take place because of the new approach.
