Rotary Peace Fellowships Speaker: Luke Brothers

Our speaker was **Luke Brothers**. He is a Rotary Peace Fellow. He completed his fellowship and Master's Degree in 2006 at the University of Bradford in England, and immediately went on to work as an Afghan Analyst at NATO headquarters in Brussels, Belgium. Today he is a Project Manager with UnitedHealth Group's technology arm, Optum. Luke has been to all four Rotary Peace Symposiums that occurred before International Conventions - in Salt Lake City, Birmingham (England), Bangkok, and Sao Paulo.

Luke completed his undergrad at UC Santa Barbara in Global and worked for several years after graduation at the Nuclear Age Peace Foundation, where they advocated for nuclear disarmament, against missile defense and nuclear energy, and against the war in Iraq. That is where the Rotary Club of Goleta Noontime recruited him for the Rotary Peace Fellowship. After receiving the Rotary World Peace Fellowship in 2006, Luke rode his bicycle across the US from Seattle to Washington DC. He loves cars and motorcycles but recently ended a 15-year stint as a motorcyclist, figuring his luck was due to run out.

As a graduate of the Rotary World Peace Fellowship, Luke Brothers gave us an overview of the Peace Fellowship and of his experiences as a Peace Fellow.

Luke's graduated from UC Santa Barbara in Global Studies, then was selected by Rotary International to receive a fully-funded academic fellowship at Rotary Peace Center at the University of Bradford in England. The program includes an Applied Field Experience (AFE) where the student selects a location to study and work. Luke's AFE was in Brussels, Belgium at the NATO Headquarters Press Department researching the Afghanistan War. From there he was sent to NATO's Afghanistan Headquarters in Kabul during a period of high civilian deaths in 2009. Not long after Luke arrived in Afghanistan, there was a car bomb explosion at the entrance to the Headquarters that totaled a colleague's car, killed 7 individuals, injured 91 and left a very large crater, which Luke showed pictures of. Luke's experience there has made him aware that everyone is a potential target, that in war there are collateral deaths, and that there's a need to build friendships and reduce enemies.

Since completing his Fellowship, Luke has become one of 900 graduates who serve as spokespersons and recruiters for the Fellowship. There are, for example, graduate symposia held in conjunction with RI Conventions. These symposia focus on specific world issues, such as local peace and on-the-job burnout of Rotary Peace Fellows. In Luke's case, the terrorist bomb at NATO's Afghanistan Headquarters resulted in PTSD symptom severe enough to cause Luke seek a more conventional job.

Luke noted that candidates for a Peace Fellowship should be interested in conflict resolution have leadership skills. Each candidate must have a Rotary club and a district sponsor and not be a Rotarian, Rotary employee or Rotary spouse. Luke and Rotary International welcome inquiries from potential candidates for the program.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION ROTARY PEACE FELLOWS AND ROTARY PEACE CENTERS

The spike in regional and local conflicts around the world has underscored the need for professionals skilled in creating peace. Rotary created the Rotary Peace Centers in 2002 to identify and train highly qualified professionals to become agents of peace. Six Rotary Peace Centers at prestigious universities throughout the world offer Rotary Peace Fellows a rigorous program of study and applied field experience in areas relating to peace and conflict resolution.

Each year, Rotary selects up to 100 individuals from around the world to receive fully funded academic fellowships at one of the six Rotary Peace Centers. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses. Two types of peace fellowships are available: a master's degree and a professional development certificate.

Rotary Peace Fellows work in various non-governmental organizations and various fields, as water health, refugees, law enforcement and intelligence. They are committed to the advancement of peace, serving as leaders in a range of international, national, and local organizations. They promote national and international cooperation, peace, and the successful resolution of conflict in their lives, in their careers, and through their service activities.

CHILDREN'S RECEIVING HOME of SACRAMENTO

Every year the club provides gifts for the children at the Children's Receiving Home. This is a description taken from their website:

The Children's Receiving Home is the safety net for the area's abused and neglected children between the ages of 1 and 17. This is the only emergency shelter of its kind in Sacramento County, in effect acting as the "front door" of the child protective system. With a daily capacity of 98, they serve more than 2,000 children each year. The Receiving Home is the first link in the County's early intervention system. Abused children are first cared for at the Receiving Home before moving on to foster care. It is now holding 102 children.

No kids in Sacramento need gifts more than these kids.

Maggie Hoy is once again handling sign ups. According to Maggie:

- You don't have to buy every gift on the list for the child that you will be gifting
- Do not wrap your gifts wrapped gifts will be unwrapped and inspected
- Deliver your gifts to Maggie up until the Christmas party. Thereafter, you must deliver them yourself
