Sacramento CASA Program

The CASA Program is an organization of trained community volunteers who help children within the dependency ("CPS") system. They give these children personal attention, and essentially assist them in many ways inside and outside of the court system. The Sacramento CASA Program was established in 1991. Now, the organization has had 800+ volunteers, assisted 2000 children, and has over 100,000 man-hours served.

CASA itself began in 1977, when a Seattle Superior Court Judge was concerned about trying to make decisions on behalf of abused and neglected children without enough information. Up sprung the idea of appointing community volunteers to speak up for the best interests of these children in court. 50 citizens responded, and that was the start of the CASA movement.

A Few Facts

There are over 200 volunteers involved with the Sacramento CASA program. Juvenile dependency records are typically sealed and confidential, but due to the nature of their training and work, CASA Volunteers are permitted to see the child's records. The CASA Volunteer is the ONLY person with the "whole picture" of the child's situation that is NOT a part of the court system.

In Sacramento County alone, there are approximately 3000 children in the foster care system. **CASA** attempts to serve 10% of these children, which requires 200 volunteers. All **CASA** volunteers need to go through training, and currently 150 children are waiting for assignment to a **CASA** volunteer.



Challenges

The CASA Program faces challenges, so every bit of help is needed. Funding, volunteers, training and oversight in general are in short supply, and always needed. Furthermore, there is a growing need for volunteers because many kids don't exit the system – they "age out". Supervisors are limited to supervising no more than 40 volunteers.

Recently, foster care services are being extended to the age of 19, and will more than likely continue to be extended. **CASA** stresses the importance of a safe transition out of the system and into a successful adulthood.





What it Costs

CASA is an independent, non-profit 501 (c)(3). They are contracted by the state for some funding, but have a \$700K budget. Due to the cost of this program, additional monies come by way of fundraising and private donations.

CASA partners with notable area companies to hold fundraisers such as the "Walk-N-Rock" Event with Hope Productions, and a golf tournament sponsored by Deloitte Consulting. \$70K was raised thanks to a Crab Feed event.

It costs **CASA** roughly \$1500 per child per year for this program. Children in foster care are given a clothing allowance of only \$200-\$300 per year – so they have many additional material needs.

CASA Placements

Finding quality homes for placements can be challenging. Many volunteers are tremendous people but there can be tough placements for the children. A **CASA** Volunteer's personal information is protected to the extent possible. Only the name of the Volunteer is given to the court. No personal contact information beyond that is given, as all contact is done through **CASA**. Volunteers are also trained on safety measures. The majority of CASA Volunteers are full-time workers with families of their own!

Statistics

The US Department of Justice has these statistics to present:

- 95% of children under CASA do not languish in the system!
- 90% of children under CASA who leave do not re-enter the system!
