

















Interested in Going to Iquitos?

Almost exactly a year ago, our club had assembled a group of fourteen clubs from District 5180 to participate in a Matching Grant project to deliver 176 RoughRider wheelchairs, designed by Whirlwind Wheelchair International at San Francisco State University and manufactured in Indonesia, to Peru.

The grant was approved for a total project cost of \$37,650, and miraculously survived a change of host clubs. Our partner in Peru is the Rotary Club of Iquitos, which is celebrating the 80th anniversary of its chartering in 1932.

Well, the chairs are in Peru and making their way to Iquitos, so it's time to start thinking of the distribution, which looks like it will occur in November.

Marc Krizack, the executive director of Whirlwind, advises that we should plan on two hours for one trained person to fit and adjust one chair to one recipient, so each "distributor" can do about four chairs a day. So this is not going to be a mammoth two day affair, but



rather may involve several groups assisting the Iquitos Rotarians over a period of a few weeks.

Those interested in doing something like this should be:

- flexible, because plans are in the infant stage;
- able to make the trip to Iquitos, currently running about \$1,250 round trip;
- willing to attend a training session about the RoughRider.





Featured Speaker

Fred introduced tonight's speaker, **Jim Field**, a Senior Project Manager and longtime employee of SMUD. Explaining that while Jim had spend many years working on the decommissioning of the Rancho Seco Nuclear Generating Station, he was with us this evening to talk about the Solano Wind Project.



To help us understand his detailed presentation he began with a simple terminology lesson, explaining that "windmills" look like the photo to the left, and what SUMD had been busy

installing at Solano are Wind Turbines which look the photo below.



Of course that didn't stop the first person who asked as question from referring to the Turbines as windmills!

Jim walked us through 30-40 slides that explained everything from how the blades, Nacelle, and tower components are selected to the final inspection by SMUD personnel before they are put into production.

The presentation highlighted the many different factors that go into the decision to build additional wind farms, explaining both the government programs that mandate percentages for renewable power as well as SMUD's goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions.



He talked about how a competitive bidding process was used to arrive at a very low build and operate contract and why SMUD sold the project so Federal money could be used to lower the overall costs.

While the winning bidder is from Denmark, the fabrication of the blades and many other components used in the construction of the Solano Wind Project are made in the United States.

SMUD first tried wind power in 1999 with a demonstration project and this most recent addition is actually the third phase of wind turbines to be installed.

Jim was kind enough to forward the summary slides on the next page which provide much more detail on the project as well as many facts regarding the power being generated at Solano.

A couple of interesting facts that Jim shared in response to questions were West Coast off-shore Wind Turbines would probably need to be placed on floats as the ocean floor drops off much more rapidly here than it does on the East Coast; and that the average effective efficiency of a wind farm is about 35% because the wind simply doesn't blow 24x7.

SMUD Solano Wind Project

The Solano Wind Project is under development by the Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD). This project is being developed in the Collinsville-Montezuma Hills Wind Resource Area (WRA) of Solano County.

This overview provides information on:

- · Background and history of the Solano Wind Project
- · Project evolution addressing changes in technology
- Project status

The Solano Wind Project has been developed in several phases. These phases reflect SMUD's efforts to increase its renewable resource portfolio and maximize wind energy harvest with improved technology while maintaining traditional land use practices.

The Solano Wind Project is currently rated at 102 megawatts (MW). However, an expansion project is currently underway that will more than double the capacity.

This level of carbon-free sustainable generation is an essential component to achieve SMUD's Renewable Portfolio Standard goal of 33% renewable power by 2020.

Background

The SMUD Board of Directors is committed to meeting customer needs by expanding the use of renewable energy resources.

When the Collinsville-Montezuma Hills are of Solano County was identified as a WRA that offered a potential location for the future development of wind energy, SMUD purchased property in the area and initiated the Solano Wind Project. The project is now a key component of SMUD's long-range resource plan.

The Solano Wind Project is on a portion of a 5,400-acre SMUD-owned property approximately 15 miles southeast of Fairfield and Suisun and 5 miles southwest of Rio Vista. The project site is bounded on the south by the Sacramento River.

Currently, 23 wind turbines generators (WTGs) produce 15 MW of wind power (Phase 1) on the portion of the site north of Montezuma Hills Road, and 29 WTGs produce 87 MW (phase 2) on a portion south of the road. The remaining land can support an additional 150 MW of wind power. An additional 128 MW (phase 3) is currently being developed and will be generating power by March 2012.

SMUD has committed to reducing its long-term greenhouse gas emissions from generation of electricity to 10% of its 1990 CO2 emission levels by 2050. The Phase 3 Wind Project is significant in reaching that goal.

Fast Facts about the Solano Wind Project

The Wind Plant Resource

- 5,500 acreas of SMUD-owned land in the Collinsville Montezuma Hills WRA
- With wind speed of more than 20 miles per hour at 80-meter WTG hub height, it is one of the best wind resources in California
- Existing ancillary facilities include four meteorological towers, generation step-up transformers interconnected to the Birds Landing Switching Station, operations and maintenance (O&M) building
- 250 MW of wind resource potential

Phase 0 Project

- Demonstration Unit installed (V-47) in 1999
- · First modern generation WTG in the WRA

Phase 1 Project

- 15 WTGs installed in 2003 (660 kilowatts (kW) each at 50-meter hub height
- 7 WTGs added in 2004 (660 kW each) at 65-meter hub height
- Total Phase 1 capacity: 15 MW

Phase 2 Project

- Phase 2A: 8 WTGs commissioned May '06 (24 MW)
- Phase 2B: 21 WTGs commissioned December '07 (63 MW)
- Total Phase 2 capacity: 87 MW

Total Project Capacity to Date

- 102 MW of wind power
- 52 WTGs on a 2,100-acre project site

Phase 3 (planned operation March 2012)

- Site area of 3,000 acres
- Adds 128 MW of generation, more than doubling project capacity to 230 MW
- 31 1.8 MW WTGs and 24 3 MW WTGs
- Hybrid design with micro siting of WTGs for improved annual yield
- Additional collection system and generation step-up transformer installed
- Higher collection system voltage to minimize losses

One of the 3 MW wind turbines can produce enough energy to power more than 1,000 single-family homes.
