Friday, April 25 – L. A. Love Academic Support Services for Tech Athletics



The Texas Tech Athletics website tells us that "Dr. Love returned to his home state of Texas in August 2011 to join the Texas Tech Red Raider family as the Assistant Director for Athletic Academic & Support Services. Dr. Love's responsibilities in this role include but are not limited to coordinating all aspects of academics for the sports of Men's & Women's Basketball and Women's Volleyball; assisting and advising student-athletes with degree completion requirements while complying with NCAA, Big 12 Conference, and University academic eligibility and graduation requirements; working directly with the Director of Initial Eligibility and Assistant Director of Continuing Eligibility in completing academic and eligibility evaluations for prospective and returning student-athletes; and developing and implementing continued departmental assessment for the continual improvement and enhancement of Athletic Academic & Support Services through strategic planning.

Dr. Love's previous experience includes stops at the University of Arkansas where he served as the Academic Coordinator for the Men's & Women's Track & Field and Cross Country teams, and the Men's Golf team from 2008 to 2011. Prior to Arkansas Dr. Love served as an assistant in the Center for Student Athlete Services at Texas A&M University from 2007 to 2008. While with the Aggies, Dr. Love assisted with academic services for football and was the Athletic Academic Advisor for the Men's Swimming and Diving team, handling initial NCAA eligibility projections, monitoring continuing eligibility, while also coordinating and teaching the Champs Life Skills course for all student-athletes. Prior to joining Aggie Athletics, Dr. Love was the Player Services Associate with IMG now Creative Artists Agency (CAA) Football Division. In his role at CAA, Dr. Love coordinated and directed the day to day operations and requests for over 80 NFL clients, while also administering event arrangements for clients while assisting with marketing and recruiting.

As a football student-athlete at the University of Massachusetts, Dr. Love was an outstanding student and role model and received numerous awards. Dr. Love's life story of outstanding achievement and perseverance was featured nationally on Fox Sports Networks across America. While at UMASS, Dr. Love earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree in Economics, Master of Science Degree in Sports Management, and Professional Master of Business Administration from the Isenberg School of Management. Dr. Love later received his Doctor of Education in Higher Education Administration from the University of Arkansas.

Dr. Love and his beautiful bride, Tiffany, reside in Lubbock with their three precious princesses: Jasmine, Anessyah, and Oliviyah."

Friday, April 18th – Club Assembly and Jennifer Hughes Classification Talk



New Metro Rotary member, Jennifer Hughes, gave her classification talk at breakfast on Friday, April 18. She grew up on a farm in Lanark in northwestern Illinois and came here by way of Northwestern University and Denver. She now is the Director of the Office Planning and Assessment at Texas Tech University and her husband teaches in Communications Studies. Jennifer is a PhD student in Higher Education in research and had many positive things to say about Lubbock in spite of our dust and wind (which she said is better that scraping ice from windshields). Jennifer and her husband Pat have three children, one of

whom, Mary Kate, accompanied Jennifer at the District Rotary Foundation dinner in Midland a few weeks ago. After Jennifer's talk we discussed fundraising possibilities for Metro Rotary.

Friday, April 4th – Amy Johnson-Rubio March of Dimes

Amy Johnson-Rubio, MPA, the Director of Program Services with the March of Dimes provided us with the program on April 4, 2014. March of Dimes was founded in 1938 under FDR to fight polio, but since that medical problem has been conquered in the U.S., their efforts have been focused on providing community service. Amy told us about the



programs she was working with; mainly studies concerning premature births and insuring stronger, healthier babies. Premature births increased to reach an all-time high in 2006, but have been declining since. Many questions about premature births have not been answered but they are working to educate moms, provide services for pregnant women and supporting parents.

Friday, April 11th – Chicken Express Owner Robert Kollman

Chicken Express owner Robert Kollman gave us an interesting program at breakfast on April 11, 2014. He told us about his experiences in Rotary at Plainview and Lubbock (Greater Southwest Rotary Club where he is program director) and his experiences with Chicken Express. Rotary was an important part of his life where he was president in Plainview and assistant district governor in that area. He grew up in Taylor and went to A&M, but his wife went to Texas Tech before they moved from Austin to Plainview then to Shallowater, and he now has three restaurants in Lubbock as well as the one in Plainview. He had many positive things to say about Lubbock and considers his business a ministry. He employs 150 people in his restaurants and talked about the minimum wage level and changes in Plainview.







How to Propose a New Member


- 1. Talk with someone you'd like to invite to join Metro. Let them know about expectations of attendance at all but at least half of the club meetings, initiation fee of \$50, and quarterly dues and meals of \$180.
- 2. When he or she expresses an interest, fill out Part A of the "Membership Proposal Form" found at http://www.rotary.org/RIdocuments/en_pdf/254en.pdf (shown to the right). It's only a couple questions long.
- 3. Give the completed form to Linda McMurry, Metro's Secretary.
- 4. After the Metro Board approves the proposed member, the Board will arrange to talk with the proposed member about membership in the club and ask her or him to fill out Part B of the "Membership Proposal Form."
- 5. Information about the proposed member will be published to club members; and if no objections are raised, after seven days the proposed member will become a member of Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary and the club secretary will report their membership to Rotary International.



6. The club president will arrange a formal induction ASAP at a club meeting.

April 21st – Battle of San Jacinto

The Battle of San Jacinto, fought on April 21, 1836, in present-day Harris County, Texas, was the decisive battle of the Texas Revolution. Led by General Sam Houston, the Texan Army engaged and defeated General Antonio López de Santa Anna's Mexican army in a fight that lasted just 18 minutes.



More on Metro Monday

Of course, sooner is better; but anyone interested in checking out this new Rotary opportunity can start any Monday.

The Monday group will meet each week just as other Rotary groups meet on a weekly basis. Meetings won't include meals, so dues will be limited to an anticipated \$75 per quarter.



Similar groups in other cities have had a regular club meeting one week, a meeting focused on their service project the next week, a meeting dedicated to classification talks the next week, and so forth.

Once initiated, the Monday group will be regular members of Metro but their usual meeting time will be on Monday, although they can attend the Friday meeting as a make-up. Our current Friday group and anyone who joins the Friday group will generally continue to meet on Fridays, although make-ups can be done on Monday.

In short, we will be one club; but some members will be "Friday members" and some will be "Monday members." At some time in the future the Monday group may choose to cut their Metro ties and go on their own as the 4th Rotary club in Lubbock.


