Unsung Heroes Award Ceremony – Awesome

In the aftermath of the September 11, 2001, tragedy, Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary initiated the Unsung Heroes Award program to honor our local first responders who make our lives safe. The Eleventh Annual Unsung Heroes Award Ceremony made March 6^{th} a night to remember; and an event to make Metro proud. Fox News Anchorman Kurt Kiser started with the Chick-fil-a song, the whole thing – had you ever heard it; I hadn't – and segued into a both thoughtful and entertaining speech based on the word H-E-R-O. Then:

- Director Chris Teague of the UMC Lubbock EMS introduced their unsung hero Jason Cook.
- Chief Mike Kemp of the Lubbock Fire Department introduced their unsung hero Jimmy Bacon.
- Chief Roger Ellis of the Lubbock Police Department introduced their unsung hero Curtis Wadkins, and
- Sheriff Kelly Rowe of the Lubbock Country Sheriff's Department introduced Rolando Ponce, their unsung hero.

Each of the recipients came forward to a standing ovation to receive their trophy; but as the audience stood and applauded, Rolando Ponce didn't appear. Sheriff Rowe explained that Ponce is an undercover agent, so he couldn't "blow his cover" by coming forward.

The EMS trophy was provided by the University Medical Center and the Lubbock Fire Department trophy was supplied by William G. Morris, CPA (our "Bill"). The Lubbock Avalanche Journal supplied the Fire Department trophy and Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary provided the Sheriff Department's trophy.

While Metro hosts the event, each of the Unsung Heroes is selected by their respective organizations. Veteran viewers of Unsung Heroes thought the attendance was the most ever. We're pleased that

Friday, March 14th – South Plains Honor Flight



The Honor Flight Network is a non-profit organization created solely to honor America's veterans for all their service and sacrifices. These veterans are transported to Washington, D.C. to visit and reflect at their memorials built in their honor. Top priority is given to the senior veterans – World War II survivors, along with those other veterans who may be terminally ill. The Texas South Plains Honor Flight is one of over 120 organizations across the country which are

dedicated to accomplish this mission at NO COST to the veteran. Of all of the wars in recent memory, it was World War II that truly threatened our very existence as a nation – and as a culturally diverse, free society. According to the Department of Veterans Affairs, an estimated 640 WWII veterans die each day. Our time to express our thanks to these brave men and women is running out.

Friday's presenters will be:

- Myron Hargrove American Airlines retiree where responsibilities included the administration of pension and savings/401(k) plan. He became a member to the Texas South Plains Honor Flight committee in July 2012 and currently serves as Treasurer.
- Howard Mercer WWII veteran who served in the South Pacific 1944-1946. He was on the inaugural Honor Flight from Lubbock in October 2012. He served as Rotary 5730 District Governor in 2003-2004.

Friday, March 7th – David Vroonland Frenship ISD Superintendent

The program at our meeting on March 7th was given by David Vroonland, Frenship ISD Superintendent. He spoke about the upcoming Frenship ISD tax levy vote and

the growth of the Frenship independent school district. Dr. Vroonland discussed the continuing growth and emphasized their vision statement of "Seek Perfection, Capture Excellence." Since 2001 the FIDS has had an enrollment growth of more than 3,000 students and they have opened four new campuses since 2006. The high school has almost reached capacity and a new ninth grade center and elementary school campus is planned. Not only has their school enrollment grown, there has been a rapid growth in housing and business development in the area. On May 10, Frenship ISD will vote on an \$85.2 million bond authorization package. In addition to the expansion in schools, they will be able to upgrade technology and security in the Frenship ISD if the bond vote passes.





How to Propose a New Member

- Talk with someone you'd like to invite to join Metro. Let them know about expectations of attendance at all but at least half of the club meetings, initiation fee of \$50, and quarterly dues and meals of \$180.
- When he or she expresses an interest, fill out Part A of the "Membership Proposal Form" found at <u>http://www.rotary.org/</u> <u>RIdocuments/en_pdf/254en.pdf</u> (shown to the right). It's only a couple questions long.
- 3. Give the completed form to Linda McMurry, Metro's Secretary.
- 4. After the Metro Board approves the proposed member, the Board will arrange to talk with the proposed member about membership in the club and ask her or him to fill out Part B of the "Membership Proposal Form."
- 5. Information about the proposed member will be published to club members; and if no objections are raised, after seven days the proposed member will become a member of Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary and the club secretary will report their membership to Rotary International.



6. The club president will arrange a formal induction ASAP at a club meeting.

Answers to Caryl's Questions

We read the answers on the Internet, so they must be right. Right? Sure, right.


- 1. Julius Caesar was murdered in the Roman Senate on the Ides of March in 44 BCE.
- 2. In the ancient Roman calendar ides was a day falling roughly in the middle of each month. It fell on the 15th day of March, May, July, and October, and the 13th of other shorter months.



- 3. "Beware the Ides of March," ancient Rome's most famous prediction, was a warning given Julius Caesar by the "haruspex" Titus Vestricius Spurinna, perhaps a month before Caesar's assassination in the assembly hall of Pompey's theater where the Roman senate was meeting that day. Since a haruspex, who read the future in the innards of animals, did not normally make precisely dated predictions, the modern consensus is that Spurinna was also an astrologer (sort of an astronomer).
- 4. The Romans did not number days of a month sequentially from the first through the last day. (I guess they weren't any better than us at bigger numbers like XXIX.). Instead, they counted back from three fixed points of the month: the Nones (5th or 7th, depending on the length of the month), the Ides (13th or 15th), and the Kalends (1st) of the following month.

Reflecting the lunar origin of the Roman calendar, the Ides were supposed to be determined by the full moon. On the earliest Roman calendar, the Ides of March would have been the first full moon of the new year. (With March being the first month, where does that put Janus looking forward and back?)

More on Metro Monday

Of course, sooner is better; but anyone interested in checking out this new Rotary opportunity can start any March Monday. We hope by the first half of April to have to group ready to rock and roll.



The Monday group will meet each week just as other Rotary groups meet on a weekly basis. Meetings won't include meals, so dues will be limited to an anticipated \$75 per quarter.

During their five March meetings the folks who make up the Monday group will make plans for their future, including whatever service projects they want to undertake and the format for their meetings. Similar groups in other cities have had a regular club meeting one week, a meeting focused on their service project the next week, a meeting dedicated to classification talks the next week, and so forth.

Once initiated, the Monday group will be regular members of Metro but their usual meeting time will be on Monday, although they can attend the Friday meeting as a make-up. In short, we will be one club; but some members will be "Friday members" and some will be "Monday members." At some time in the future the Monday group may choose to cut their Metro ties and go on their own as the 4th Rotary club in Lubbock.


