

Friday, March 21st – Chris Atkinson, LCDC Substance Abuse Never Takes a Day Off



The program Friday morning was given by Chris Atkinson who is a Licensed Chemical Dependency Counselor working in the state of Texas for over the past 20 years. He has worked in Residential Treatment, Adult Outpatient Programs, Adolescent Outpatient Programs, and Supportive Residential Treatment Centers and has been the Director of the Community Recovery Center in Post, Texas, since 2009. Among his many other activities, Chris is also the president of the Post Rotary Club and will serve as Assistant District Governor for District 5730 this next year. One thing he told us is that substance abuse does not take a

day off and recovery can only succeed if the abuser is willing to make a true effort to recover. He has worked with more people than he can count and there has been a lot more heartache than celebration in what he does. There is no cost to the clients except the initial screening fee. They deal with the Twelve Step Program and many other programs to help clients who are getting younger every year. Their services include aftercare support, counseling, substance abuse awareness, life skills, anger management, parenting and many others. He sees his job as helping people find ways to recover from their addictions and his reward is seeing people change their lives.

How to Propose a New Member

- 1. Talk with someone you'd like to invite to join Metro. Let them know about expectations of attendance at all but at least half of the club meetings, initiation fee of \$50, and quarterly dues and meals of \$180.
- 2. When he or she expresses an interest, fill out Part A of the "Membership Proposal Form" found at http://www.rotary.org/RIdocuments/en_pdf/254en.pdf (shown to the right). It's only a couple questions long.
- 3. Give the completed form to Linda McMurry, Metro's Secretary.
- 4. After the Metro Board approves the proposed member, the Board will arrange to talk with the proposed member about membership in the club and ask her or him to fill out Part B of the "Membership Proposal Form."
- 5. Information about the proposed member will be published to club members; and if no objections are raised, after seven days the proposed member will become a member of Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary and the club secretary will report their membership to Rotary International.



6. The club president will arrange a formal induction ASAP at a club meeting.



In 1905, 37 Year Old Attorney Paul Harris Changed the World

Paul P. Harris, the founder of Rotary, was born in Racine, Wisconsin, on April 19, 1868, and spent his early years in Wallingford, Vermont, prior to attending the University of Vermont, Princeton University and the University of Iowa. Following his graduation from the law school of the University of Iowa in 1891 he spent the next five years seeing the world and coming to know his fellow man before settling down to practice law in Chicago.




In 1896, Paul Harris went to Chicago to practice law. One day in 1900 he dined with a lawyer friend in Rogers Park, a residential section of Chicago. After dinner they took a walk and he was impressed by the fact that his friend stopped at several stores and shops in the neighborhood and introduced him to the proprietors, who were his friends. Paul Harris' law clients were business friends, not social friends, but this experience caused him to wonder why he couldn't make social friends out of at least some of his business friends – and he resolved to organize a club which would band together a group of representative business and professional men in friendship and fellowship.


For the next several years he devoted a great deal of time to reflection on conditions of life and business and, by 1905, he had formulated a definite philosophy of business relations. Talking it over with three of his law clients – Silvester Schiele, a coal merchant, Gustavus Loehr, a mining engineer, and Hiram Shorey, a merchant tailor – he decided, with them, to organize the club which he had been planning since 1900. On February 23, 1905, the club's first meeting took place and the nucleus was formed for the thousands of Rotary clubs which were later organized throughout the world. The new club, which Paul Harris named "Rotary" because the members met, in rotation, in their various places of business, met with general approval and club membership grew rapidly. Almost every



member had come to Chicago from a small town and in the Rotary club they found an opportunity for the intimate acquaintanceship of their boyhood days. When Paul Harris became president of the club in its third year he was anxious to extend Rotary to other cities because he was convinced that the Rotary club could be developed into an important service movement.

The second Rotary club was founded in San Francisco in 1908 and then other clubs were organized until in 1910, when there were 16 clubs, it was decided that they should be united into an organization which would extend the movement to other cities and serve as a clearinghouse for the exchange of ideas among the clubs. Representatives from the clubs met in Chicago in August, 1910, and organized the National Association of Rotary Clubs. When clubs were formed in Canada and Great Britain, making the movement international in scope, the name was changed, in 1912, to the International Association of Rotary Clubs, and in 1922 the name was shortened to Rotary International. Paul Harris was the first president of the International Association. When he passed away in January, 1947, he was president





While Paul Harris devoted much of his time to Rotary, he was also prominent in civic and professional work. He was the first chairman of the board of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults in the U.S.A. and of the International Society for Crippled Children. He was a member of the board of managers of the Chicago Bar Association and its representative at the International Congress of Law at The Hague, and he was a committee member of the American Bar Association.

Mr. Harris received the Ph.D. and LL.D. degrees from the University of Vermont and the LL.B. degree from the University of Iowa. The Boy Scouts of America gave him the Silver Buffalo Award and he was decorated by the governments of Brazil, Chile, Dominican Republic, Ecuador, France and Peru.

More on Metro Monday

Of course, sooner is better; but anyone interested in checking out this new Rotary opportunity can start any March Monday. We hope by the first half of April to have the Metro Monday group ready to rock and roll.



The Monday group will meet each week just as other Rotary groups meet on a weekly basis. Meetings won't include meals, so dues will be limited to an anticipated \$75 per quarter.

During their five March meetings the folks who make up the Monday group will make plans for their future, including whatever service projects they want to undertake and the format for their meetings. Similar groups in other cities have had a regular club meeting one week, a meeting focused on their service project the next week, a meeting dedicated to classification talks the next week, and so forth.

We aim for the Monday group to be initiated into Metro on Friday morning, April 18.


Once initiated, the Monday group will be regular members of Metro but their usual meeting time will be on Monday, although they can attend the Friday meeting as a make-up. Our current Friday group and anyone who joins the Friday group will generally continue to meet on Fridays, although make-ups can be done on Monday.

In short, we will be one club; but some members will be "Friday members" and some will be "Monday members." At some time in the future the Monday group may choose to cut their Metro ties and go on their own as the 4th Rotary club in Lubbock.


Answers to Caryl's Questions – March Madness


- 1. Harvard's acceptance rate last year (5.9%) was higher than the percentage (5.6%) that picked them to beat Cincinnati last Thursday.
- 2. Villanova, who won the championship in 1985 as the 8th seed, was the lowest seeded team to win it all.
- 3. In 1988 the Kansas Jayhawks, led by Danny Manning and coached by Larry Brown, beat the Oklahoma Sooners 83-79 in Kansas City. Earlier that year the Sooners had beaten the Jayhawks twice, so they were the odds on favorites. Much to the surprise of Caryl's husband, the 'Hawks started at a furious pace and ended the first half tied 50-50. The game slowed in the second half and the Jayhawks prevailed. What an incredible game. A victory party ensued that night and the next day classes were canceled so the campus could rally in the football stadium. In those days Caryl chaired the "University Events" committee made up of some three dozen people from the police chief to the buildings and grounds director to the Dean of Students (Caryl) that met weekly to coordinate concerts, graduation, move-in day for the residence halls and, yes, national championship events or the welcome home for those who didn't make it all the way.
