We were fortunate to have David Weaver come to our breakfast on Friday morning, May 9th to give us a very interesting program about activities of the South Plains Food Bank. For 17 years David has been the CEO of the Food Bank, where they feed the hungry and give hope and enrich lives to those in need. He told us about his youth, his education and how he got started at the Food Bank. Recently the Food Bank celebrated thirty years since its founding and broke



ground for a new building near their orchard, started by Rotary and Dr. George Elle, Susan Brints' father. David discussed some of the situations that changed people's lives and brought them to the Food Bank. The Food Bank gets food from grocery stores and donations from people in Lubbock and the surrounding areas. They send food out to rural communities in about 20 counties where it is distributed through churches and other agencies. They also provide school lunches for kids that are hungry. At their farm, they help educate at-risk children and teach them work and life skills.




Installation Dinner – Thursday, June 26th




We Can't Stop Now – We're <u>This Close</u> to Eradicating Polio

The following story about polio by Donald G. McNeil appeared on May 5 in the *New York Times*.

Alarmed by the spread of polio to several fragile countries, the World Health Organization declared a global health emergency on Monday for only the second time since regulations permitting it to do so were adopted in 2007.

Just two years ago — after a 25-year campaign that vaccinated billions of children — the paralyzing virus was near eradication; now health officials say that goal could evaporate if swift action is not taken.



Pakistan, Syria and Cameroon have recently allowed the virus to spread — to Afghanistan, Iraq and Equatorial Guinea, respectively — and should take extraordinary measures to stop it, the health organization said.

"Things are going in the wrong direction and have to get back on track before something terrible happens," said Gregory Hartl, a W.H.O. spokesman. "So we're saying to the Pakistanis, the Syrians and the Cameroonians, 'You've really got to get your acts together.'"

The declaration, which effectively imposes travel restrictions on the three countries, represented a newly aggressive stance by the health organization. In the past, it has often bent to pressure from member states demanding no consequences even as epidemics raged inside their borders and sometimes slipped over them.

"This is a fundamental shift in the program," said Dr. Bruce Aylward, the organization's chief of polio eradication. "This is the countries of the world signaling that they will no longer tolerate the spread of the virus from the countries that aren't finished."

The emergency was declared though the total number of known cases this year is still relatively small: 68 as of April 30, compared with 24 by that date last year.

What most alarmed experts, Mr. Hartl said, was that the virus was on the move during what is normally the low transmission season from January to April.

"What we don't want is cases moving into places like the Central African Republic, South Sudan or the Ukraine," said Rebecca M. Martin, director of global immunization for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which has provided money and expertise to the eradication campaign since it began in 1988.







How to Propose a New Member

- 1. Talk with someone you'd like to invite to join Metro. Let them know about expectations of attendance at all but at least half of the club meetings, initiation fee of \$50, and quarterly dues and meals of \$180.
- 2. When he or she expresses an interest, fill out Part A of the "Membership Proposal Form" found at http://www.rotary.org/RIdocuments/en_pdf/254en.pdf (shown to the right). It's only a couple questions long.
- 3. Give the completed form to Linda McMurry, Metro's Secretary.
- 4. After the Metro Board approves the proposed member, the Board will arrange to talk with the proposed member about membership in the club and ask her or him to fill out Part B of the "Membership Proposal Form."
- 5. Information about the proposed member will be published to club members; and if no objections are raised, after seven days the proposed member will become a member of Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary and the club secretary will report their membership to Rotary International.



6. The club president will arrange a formal induction ASAP at a club meeting.



- 2. Trombone is the French word for paperclip, according to 1,227 Quite Interesting Facts to Blow Your Socks Off.
- 3. The trombone evolved into existence in the early 15th century. The paper clip was patented by Johan Vaaler in 1899 and 1901. According to Wikipedia, "The word trombone derives from Italian *tromba* (trumpet) and *-one* (a suffix meaning "large"), so the name means "large trumpet." The word trombone was around for a while and then was applied by the French to the paperclip when the paperclip came into existence.
- 4. The word gasoline comes from Cazeline which was based on John Cassell who was the first to sell gas commercially.
- 5. The food storage can was invented in 1810, but the can opener wasn't invented until 1858, another 48 years. Until 1858 the can was opened with a hammer and chisel.
- 6. The answer to which came first, the screw or the screwdriver, depends on your definition of a screw. According to about.com, "around the first century, screw shaped tools became common, however, historians do not know who invented the first. Early screws were made from wood and were used in wine presses, olive oil presses, and for pressing clothes."

"Metal screws and nuts used to fasten two objects together first appeared in the fifteenth century." Between 1770 and 1798 several people improved means for mass producing screws.
