




Friday, May 16th – Wesley Welch Manager, Spade Ranch

At our breakfast on Friday, May 16, Wesley Welch, the manager of the Spade Ranch, told us about modern ranching and some of the problems caused by the drought, input costs, market volatility and globalization. He took over the management of the ranch in 2008. The original founder of the ranch was a seller of barbed wire and bought a ranch to market his barbed wire. The drought has not only affected the grazing of cattle and calves, but had a major effect on corn and feed prices which have raised the costs of his operation. Stocking rates went from about 85% stocked in 2011 to 35% a year later.



With the drought, cattle had to be moved to Wyoming, Colorado and Nebraska to find pastures and some went into hamburgers. Global markets also have had a big effect on cattle prices, export opportunities and income for the Spade Ranch. They have found it less risky to lease ranch land than own it and try to time their calving to when pasture begin to green up. They run cattle suited to the environment and keep constant watch on breakeven costs.


We Can't Stop Now – We're <u>This Close</u> to Eradicating Polio

The following story about polio by Donald G. McNeil appeared on May 5 in the *New York Times*.

Alarmed by the spread of polio to several fragile countries, the World Health Organization declared a global health emergency on Monday for only the second time since regulations permitting it to do so were adopted in 2007.

Just two years ago — after a 25-year campaign that vaccinated billions of children — the paralyzing virus was near eradication;

now health officials say that goal could evaporate if swift action is not taken.

Pakistan, Syria and Cameroon have recently allowed the virus to spread — to Afghanistan, Iraq and Equatorial Guinea, respectively — and should take extraordinary measures to stop it, the health organization said.

"Things are going in the wrong direction and have to get back on track before something terrible happens," said Gregory Hartl, a W.H.O. spokesman. "So we're saying to the Pakistanis, the Syrians and the Cameroonians, 'You've really got to get your acts together.'"

The declaration, which effectively imposes travel restrictions on the three countries, represented a newly aggressive stance by the health organization. In the past, it has often bent to pressure from member states demanding no consequences even as epidemics raged inside their borders and sometimes slipped over them.

"This is a fundamental shift in the program," said Dr. Bruce Aylward, the organization's chief of polio eradication. "This is the countries of the world signaling that they will no longer tolerate the spread of the virus from the countries that aren't finished."

The emergency was declared though the total number of known cases this year is still relatively small: 68 as of April 30, compared with 24 by that date last year.

What most alarmed experts, Mr. Hartl said, was that the virus was on the move during what is normally the low transmission season from January to April.

"What we don't want is cases moving into places like the Central African Republic, South Sudan or the Ukraine," said Rebecca M. Martin, director of global immunization for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which has provided money and expertise to the eradication campaign since it began in 1988.

Please help recruit for the Metro Monday group.


The Monday group will meet each week just as other Rotary groups meet on a weekly basis. Meetings won't include meals, so dues will be limited to an anticipated \$75 per quarter.

Similar groups in other cities have had a regular club meeting one week, a meeting focused on their service project the next week, a meeting dedicated to classification talks the next week, and so forth.





How to Propose a New Member

- Talk with someone you'd like to invite to join Metro. Let them know about expectations of attendance at all but at least half of the club meetings, initiation fee of \$50, and quarterly dues and meals of \$180.
- When he or she expresses an interest, fill out Part A of the "Membership Proposal Form" found at <u>http://www.rotary.org/RIdocuments/en_pdf/254en.pdf</u> (shown to the right). It's only a couple questions long.
- 3. Give the completed form to Linda McMurry, Metro's Secretary.
- 4. After the Metro Board approves the proposed member, the Board will arrange to talk with the proposed member about membership in the club and ask her or him to fill out Part B of the "Membership Proposal Form."
- 5. Information about the proposed member will be published to club members; and if no objections are raised, after seven days the proposed member will become a member of Metropolitan Lubbock Rotary and the club secretary will report their membership to Rotary International.
