We're Just This Close – But Are We Slipping?

296 new cases of polio have been reported so far this year. Last year as of this date there had been 171 new cases and in all of 2012 there were 223 cases.



Said another way, 2013 has experienced 73% more cases than in 2012. Scary.

These figures come from the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, which is a public-private partnership led by national governments and spearheaded by the



Polio continues, although at a lower level, in Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan, but new cases popped up in Niger and Chad in 2012, but not 2013. This year Ethiopia, Somalia, South Sudan and Kenya experienced new cases. See the table on the next page. The good news is that there are fewer cases in the endemic countries (Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan).

This Friday's Program will be Held at Meals on Wheels, 2304 34th Street

Learn more about Lubbock Meals on Wheels; and if you have not been trained to be a Meals on Wheels driver, you can take part in training on Friday.

"In 1971, Lubbock Meals on Wheels was incorporated, and 29 people received meals on the first day of service. Since that time, the organization has undergone many changes that have improved the service to Lubbock's homebound community. Lubbock Meals on Wheels is a private non-profit agency that does not receive any government funds and is not a United Way funded agency. The organization relies solely on contributions from fundraisers, individuals, civic clubs, churches, businesses, schools, foundations, and grants.

In 1991, a building was purchased to house the office facilities. In 1995, services were extended to include Idalou. In 1997, a kitchen and volunteer center were added, and a contract with the Adult Day Activity Center was initiated. Then in 1998, a greenhouse project was funded; the Wolfforth Meals on Wheels' contract was started, and the final phase of the building renovation was completed. In the past several years, many additional programs and services have been added. So far this year, several new contracts have begun. We now provide meals for Abernathy Meals on Wheels. Currently, over 550 meals are prepared and delivered daily (over 150,000 meals in 2011) by a volunteer force of over 1200 people. Volunteers from local businesses are also involved with the agency.

A Corporate Volunteer Program, established in 2000, includes over 30 businesses such as City Bank, Lubbock National Bank, United Supermarkets, and Calvert Home Health Care. Recipients can now receive weekend meals, frozen meals for holidays, and emergency meals when severe weather prohibits regular meal delivery. Other special benefits include: fresh flowers on Fridays, reading materials, birthday cakes, plants, various treats during the holidays, senior food boxes, and a Pet Food Program." This Institute is part of the Honors Collage of Texas Tech University and seeks to provide conferences, publications, a website and online networks linking scholars and students at every academic level.




