

SPEAKER OF THE WEEK

Stephanie Allen, Literacy Coordinator, Sacramento Public Library

Stephanie Allen, Literacy Coordinator for the Sacramento Public Library spoke about the program, which is part of a statewide network and is celebrating its 30th year.



Currently, there are 400 active tutor-learner pairs who are working on basic literacy, English as a Second Language, GED prep, or math skills. It is estimated that 150,000 people in Sacramento County are functioning with below basic literacy skills. Having a literate parent/caregiver is a better indicator of a child's literacy than income level, quality of school, and marital status of the adults in the home. There has been a recent partnership with American River College to have tutors there to help students because ARC is open to anyone who can benefit from taking coursework there.

Stephanie shared that community colleges are reporting that 70% of students need remedial math, and 42% need remedial English. Stephanie also shared the story of Steve Tafoya, and she encouraged the club to have Steve come out and speak. (See a video about Steve here: http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=RExT47zLtRw) Steve was in the Armed Forces, a single father, and functionally illiterate. He left the Army after 13 years and reaching the rank of sergeant. He started talking to the staff at the Southgate branch of the library, and he was referred to the Literacy program.

Stephanie also handed out a document "How Your Members Can Support Literacy in Your Community". **President Jessica Mang** said it would be posted to our website.


