

SPEAKER OF THE WEEK

BloodSource®

Debbie Milios, Director of Operations at BloodSource, California's second largest not-forprofit blood center and fellow Rotarian.



Blood Source started in 1948 and has been at its present location in Rancho Cordova since 2008. They seek compatible donors to give blood products

and they also help match blood marrow donors to those who are in need. Debbie said they need 750 donors to walk through their doors every day in order to meet the need, and 13 tests are performed on every unit of blood donated. The safety of the blood supply is paramount! Plasma can also be isolated and used to go into lifesaving medicines (for example, those needed by hemophiliacs). Whole blood can be donated every 8 weeks and has a 42 day shelf life.

Platelets, on the other hand, can be donated every 5 days, but it also has a shelf life of 5 days

Blood Source does a lot of international work, as well. Doctors travel to Africa to teach best blood bank practices. They have also built three wells in Sudan and donated mosquito netting to reduce malaria. They also do local work projects, such as the Great American River Cleanup.



Debbie discussed the District 5180 Blood

Drive Challenge going from April 28, 2014, to April 17, 2015. Rotarians, family, and friends tell the Blood Source folks that they are with Citrus Heights Rotary, and the club will get 1 Rotary Point for a

donation of whole blood and 2 Rotary points for an Automated donation (platelets, plasma, etc).

Debbie noted that she has needed blood transfusions herself in the past, and she shared the touching story of her daughter's fight for life, including multiple transfusions, after giving birth. Luckily, it ended well, and Debbie is expecting another grandchild in February.







Rich Hale reminded us to remember all the good things we are doing in the community with our mini-grants and more every time we are being asked to sell something or donate something.











A Boy and His Bike

No act of kindness, no matter how small, is ever wasted. AESOP

In a suburb of Dallas known as Richardson, a small, bright-eyed gentleman named Jim Hoyt manages his own bike store. The mom-and-pop shop, Richardson Bike Mart, is known throughout the community as a strong sponsor of bike racers, and Hoyt maintains a personal passion to help kids get started in the sport.

Keeping an eye on the street front, Jim noticed a young woman who faithfully took her son to a nearby shop for fresh doughnuts each week. He began talking to the woman, discovered she was a single mom, and instinctively knew she was struggling to get by. Jim took an interest in the small family and decided to give the woman a discount on a bicycle: a Schwinn Mag Scrambler. The mom accepted the offer, and through the kind act of a stranger, seven-year-old Lance Armstrong



was introduced to the world of biking. Describing the bike, Armstrong writes, "It was an ugly brown with yellow wheels, but I loved it. Why does any kid love a bike? It's liberation and independence, your first set of wheels."

Armstrong would go on to set an unprecedented record of winning the gruesome tour de France multiple times, and in 1996 he established the Lance Armstrong Foundation, a charity to aid the fight against cancer.
