
CALL TO ORDER

HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM

President Patrick introduced **Heidi Sanborn. Heidi** was first elected to the SMUD Board of Directors in 2018 and began serving on the SMUD Board in January 2019. She represents Ward 7, which includes North Highlands, Carmichael, Antelope and Foothill Farms.

Heidi currently works for 2 nonprofits dedicated to reducing waste, increasing recycling and advocating for a circular economy. She is the Founder and Executive Director for the National Stewardship Action Council and also serves as Senior Advisor of the California Product Stewardship Council.

In addition to her work, **Heidi** also takes a personal interest in going green. Since purchasing their home in 2001, **Heidi** and her husband have been remodeling their house to include solar hot water, solar panels from SMUD and LED lighting. They're even Greenergy® customers.

Heidi is also active in the community. She served as the President of the Sacramento Chapter of the National Alliance for Mental Illness. As such, she spearheaded the efforts to start a walk for mental health, conducted police trainings and taught family-to-family classes.

Over the past 15 years, **Heidi** and her husband have also volunteered with Front Street Animal Shelter, fostering 64 dogs during that time.

A native of Pennsylvania, **Heidi** also lived in Delaware, Massachusetts and Michigan before moving out west. **Heidi** is a graduate of UC Davis where she earned a bachelor's degree in Political Science-Public Service. She also earned her master's degree in Public Administration from USC. **Heidi** and her husband have lived in Sacramento for over 25 years.

SMUD has a list to choose from, when you purchase or lease a new plug-in electric vehicle (pre-owned vehicles are not eligible):

\$599 incentive to charge free for two years (approximately covers the average cost to charge your plug-in electric vehicle for two years), or a 240 Volt high-powered electric vehicle charger (see charger details here)

Follow these steps to get started with solar today. **Step 1: Run the numbers**

Our Solar System Estimator combines satellite information about your rooftop together with your current monthly bills to lay out a cost-benefit analysis.

Step 2: Make your home energy efficient

Make sure the energy you make from solar isn't wasted. Discover ways to save energy and earn rebates.

Step 3: Select a contractor

Once you commit to solar, it's important to choose the right contractor. See our tips below. Once you select a contractor, they will need to complete an online application.

Step 4: Approval and installation

- SMUD reviews and approves the application
- Your contractor obtains permits, installs the • system and has it inspected
- SMUD does a final safety inspection and meter • installation

Residential Renewable Energy

Join SMUD's Greenergy program and we will meet up to 100 percent of your electricity needs with power made from renewable resources like wind, sun and biomass.

SMUD offers two levels of participation in

Greenergy.

Either **\$3 more a month** which will provide you with energy from 50% renewable energy sources or

\$6 more a month which will provide you with 100% renewable energy.

Time-of-Day (5-8 p.m.) Rate

This rate is now the standard rate for all residential customers.

What is Time-of-Day?

On the Time-of-Day (TOD) Rate, you pay different rates for electricity based on the season and the time of day that you use it.

Rates are lower during off-peak periods because it costs us less to produce or purchase electricity. Rates increase as demand and cost for electricity increase, especially during the summer months. Peak hours are only three hours -5 p.m. to 8 p.m. - Monday through Friday. All other hours, including all weekends and holidays are off-peak. TOD Rates help you control your electric bill when you:

Shift your electricity use to lower-cost offpeak times

Use less electricity during the 5 p.m. - 8 p.m. peak hours

Reduce your overall usage

Why the change to Time-of-Day Rates? Time-of-Day Rates better reflect the actual cost of providing service. And with clean energy, timing is everything. For example, electricity costs 2 to 3 times more on weekdays between 5 p.m. and 8 p.m., especially during the summer, when demand for electricity soars. Reducing electricity use during peak hours will help keep our energy clean and our prices among the lowest in California. These rates will also help us avoid or delay building new power plants and reduce the need to buy electricity from more expensive, less environmentally-friendly sources.
