HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S MEETING

Jordan Backhaus introduced Brenda Harden and Walter Dearmond with AARP.

Brenda Harden is the Project Director for AARP Foundation Senior Community Service Program for Sacramento and Stanislaus Counties with an office based in Sacramento and a satellite office in Modesto.

Brenda is responsible for managing 15 staff and supporting up to 160 program participants.

Brenda was born in Alabama and attended high school until the 11th grade when she was forced to quit school before graduating.

After marriage and raising her family, she relocated to Sacramento in 2000 and began a career with New Dimensions Learning Academy, a privately-owned, non-public, special education program, as a receptionist. After her first year, she was promoted to Administrative Assistant and was responsible for the school's Annual Recertification process through the Board of Education and participated in local school board meetings.

By the third year, **Brenda** was Administrator/ Principal and achieved a 90% graduating success rate for the next five years. Inspired by her students, **Brenda** eventually returned to school completing her GED and attending Sac City College with a focus on Business.

Brenda started her career with the

AARP Foundation in September 2014 as Assistant Project Director. In July 2015, she was asked to serve as Interim Project Director and was promoted to Project Director in January 2016.

Walter Dearmond is a success story of the AARP Foundation Senior Community Service Employment Program where he serves as an Employment Specialist.

Walter spent much of his life blaming everyone but himself for his life's path. Once he took responsibility for his actions, his life turned around and he is grateful for each new day. He said, "each day, I put my best foot forward." He thanked **Brenda** for her guidance and the opportunities afforded him.

The AARP Foundation SCSEP was created to make connections between older adults looking to return to the workforce and employers looking to benefit from mature, experienced employees. For more than 45 years, the program has provided workers over the age of 55 with opportunities to fill entry-level and middle-level positions with employers in their communities.

For those individuals who need to learn a skill Foundation provides set. the **AARP** community service and work-based training. Participants are placed in a wide variety of facilities including day care, senior centers, schools and hospitals. This on-the-job transitioned training can then be to employment outside opportunities the program.

For those employers looking to fill a position, they can contact their local *WorkSearch* office

or go to AARP website: www.aarpworksearch.org and provide a job description with skill requirements and AARP will find eligible candidates for them to interview.

WorkSearch offers a no-cost trial employment option through AARPs On the Job Experience (OJE) program. In this program, AARP matches employers with qualified job candidates and pay their salaries and worker's compensation for an agreed-upon training period — usually two to four weeks. The workers are paid directly from AARP at the same salary offered for the position.

The program's track record speaks for itself as evidenced by heir consistently high job placement rates.

Lots of great information for everyone with the exception of **Amy** and **Dominic** who have a ways to go before they quality for AARPs help.

Thanks, **Jordan**, for another great program.


