HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S MEETING

PP **David Stone** introduced Rotarian **Sam Morgan. Sam** joined Rotary on April 21, 1997 and was loaned the classification Equal Employment Opportunity Consultant.

She was born in Nashville, TN; and by the time she was 14, she had lived in eight different states and two countries in Africa. Her dad was in the Air Force and they were relocated to different duty stations on a regular basis. The family eventually settled in Sacramento.

Sam graduated from CSU Sacramento with a degree in English and began working as a Research Assistant in 1975 for a company owned by **Dick Biddle**. The company specialized in employment discrimination issues and the job was supposed to be parttime. However, from day one, it was full-time; and when she retired in 2001, she was a Principal Consultant for the company. During her tenure, she helped companies throughout the U.S. develop affirmative action plans as well as implement improved employment practices to minimize the likelihood of and defense against charges of discrimination in hiring, promotion, discharge and salary structure — just to name a few.

Over the years, she developed expertise in job analyses, creating employment qualification tests, application forms, interviewing techniques, performance appraisals and conducted hundreds of training seminars for supervisors in how to use lawful employment practices.

Her most rewarding project was overseeing the merger of two major newspapers in San Diego which necessitated the termination of hundreds of employees; but to her credit, not one formal complaint or lawsuit was filed in connection with the layoffs.

Today, the company is still in operation and in the very capable hands of **Dick's** son, **Dan** who is President and **Erik Nooren's** son, **Patrick** who is Vice President.

Sam and Dick love to travel and have visited almost 70 countries. Her other interests include bridge, genealogy and singing. She is a member of the group-Rancho Murieta Voices.

Sam assumed the role of Club Historian early on in her Rotary career and she and her helpers have saved our club mementos from the less than ideal environment in which they resided in our many different storage facilities. She has created archival albums beginning with our Charter in 1959 through 1979. The remaining memorabilia are stored in boxes in her home office awaiting their turn being archived.

On March 12th, the club celebrated its 57-year anniversary. Through **Sam's** efforts, she has put together a retrospective of our service to the community and around the globe.

HERE'S HOW OUR CLUB BEGAN:

In 1958, **Stan Shaffer** and **Andy Smith** were members of the North Highlands Chamber of Commerce.

Stan suggested to **Andy** that North Highlands needed its own Rotary Club. **Andy** had no idea what Rotary was, but he learned and became interested.

The necessary papers were filed. The Rotary Club of North Sacramento was our sponsor. On March 12, 1959, our club was chartered by R.I. as the Rotary Club of North Highlands.

We had 23 members with **Stan Shaffer** and **Andy Smith** being among them.

Andy's Year as President 1961-1962

We had 28 members. We helped start the North Highlands Memorial Day Parade and built a float for the parade.

- Installed a BBQ at Strizek Park.
- Held Career Day at a local high school.
- Had a Christmas Program for community kids.
- Prepared and delivered Holiday food baskets and gifts for 50 families.

Other Projects in the Early Years

- Planted trees on Watt Avenue.
- Purchased wheelchairs for the Easter Seal Society.
- Collected cans of food for the needy.
- Worked with the Chamber to paint and fix up businesses along Watt Avenue.
- For six years the club supplied and decorated a huge Christmas tree erected at Watt Avenue and Roseville Road.
- **Andy** would go into the woods and cut a suitable tree, never less than 25 feet.


- First few months: **Dansio's** on Auburn Blvd in the Foothill Farms area.



The meeting was then adjourned.




