
Richard Hansen had a club anniversary and offered to make a donation of \$10.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM

PP Marilee Monagan introduced Steve and Susie Swatt. Steve is a former public affairs executive who spent 25 years - mostly as a political – for the San Francisco reporter Examiner, UPI in Los Angeles, and KCRA Channel 3 here in Sacramento. Throughout his career, he covered dozens state and presidential of elections, as well as the daily business of legislating at the State Capitol. He has earned numerous awards including a Northern California Emmy and an Edward R. Murrow award for overall excellence. He has also taught political communication at Sacramento State. Susie Swatt has worked in key policy and leadership positions at the State Capitol and at the Fair Political Practices Commission, where she was awarded a prestigious ProPublica award for investigative governance. She currently sits on the National Advisory Council Institute of Governmental for the Studies at UC Berkeley. Several years ago, Steve and Susie co-authored Game Twelve **Elections** Changers: that Transformed California, which won the Historical California Society book award. Now they are back with a new and timely book called Paving the Way: Women's Struggle for Political Equality in California. With March being Women's History Month throughout the United States, their presentation is particularly timely.



Paving the Way: Women's Struggle for Women's Political Equality in California weaves into a 170-year historical narrative the dramatic personal stories of dozens of mostly unsung and long-forgotten women who challenged traditional concepts of femininity California's helped shape landscape. With a foreword by California State Librarian Greg Lucas, Paving the Way takes us from the post-Gold Rush era and the decades-long fight for suffrage, through the turbulent and transformative 1960s and 1970s, into today's #MeToo movement. With a perspective shaped by a combined 150 years experience in journalism and public policy, authors life the bring to the grit, determination and resilience of these trailblazing women.

Since 1912 California women have run for legislative and congressional statewide, political office more than 3,800 times. The first four successful women were elected to the State Assembly in 1918. In the next 50 years, women ran more than 500 times. The most dramatic surge in female candidates started in the 1970s and has continued to increase.
