HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S MEETING

PP **David Stone** introduced **John McGinness**. **John** retired as Sheriff of Sacramento County in December 2010, after 31 years experience with the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department. He served in every service area of the Department and was a highly decorated veteran with a background in many high-profile assignments.

John served for many years as a member of the elite Sheriff's Motorcycle Detail where he was a training officer and team leader. He served as a CSI investigator, department homicide detective and spokesman. John promoted through the ranks and ultimately commanded the Centralized Investigation Division until he was appointed Undersheriff in March of 2001. He served as Undersheriff until elected Sheriff in 2006.

He lives in Folsom, California with his wife, **Peggy** and their two children.

John was a member of the Cameron Park Rotary Club many eons ago and enjoyed his time in Rotary until the demands of his job made it impossible for him to continue.

John holds a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Criminal Justice with a minor in Public Administration and a Master of Science Degree in Emergency Services Administration from the California State University, Long Beach, and is a graduate of the prestigious West Point Leadership Institute. He is an Adjunct Professor of Criminal Justice, Communications, Leadership and Professional Studies with the California State University.

John was appointed to the POST Commission by Governor Schwarzenegger in 2007.

You can now hear **John** every afternoon at 3:00 p.m. on Sacramento's top-rated News Talk radio AM 1530, KFBK as host of the **John McGinness Show**.

John began his remarks by stating, "I always appreciate Rotary-any organization that has as its motto Service Above Self I think serves as an incredible model or inspiration for the rest of society to follow. Certain situations are political in nature but I just like to go back and apply the Rotary ideology and philosophy to include the Four-Way Test as you look at the business of living life, treating others with respect and generally looking for the best outcome and the best solutions to problems that come up. This is an example of how Rotary works having visited so many different Rotary clubs throughout the state—you get a very diverse, cross-section of society coming together to find common ground, to share and to celebrate their difference."

Look at society right now. Some of the challenges we face in CA are the same or similar concerns which exist across the country. The statistical crime reporting patterns in the city of Sacramento where the numbers are skyrocketing show Sacramento has the worst crime rate in terms of increase of any medium to large-sized city in the nation. That is a sad reality. This statistic is not unique to Sacramento. Many cities in the

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State of CA are experiencing the same thing.

There was a period of time back in the 80s and 90s in this state when we saw violent crime skyrocketing. If you picked up the newspaper and read about some heinous act that someone committed against another person and if you were to follow up and the suspect was identified and arrested for the crime, it seems as though you would probably find that the overwhelming majority of the time the suspect was a known quantity-they were someone who was previously in the system. Someone who has done horrible things in the past. Once this person is caught, investigated, prosecuted, convicted and sentenced, the problem should be solved but it isn't. Because they are out on the streets again and they reoffend. And, it doesn't protect the victim in the manner in which the Criminal Justice System is supposed to in compliance to the Constitution and all laws.

As a result of an incident in southern CA where a young woman was shot and killed by a repeat offender she had no prior contact with, the Three Strikes Law was born. With some modifications from the original law, it has worked pretty well.

However, what would you expect would happen out of that when you look at other factors. You have an increase in population in the state. Unfortunately, if you pare down the people who represent the increase, it's not all productive people. It's not all people who are going to be compliant with the law. Is there some level of foreseeability? If we continue to warehouse these people in the same fashion as in the past, what can you anticipate? You will not have any success changing the outcome. What do you think happens to a person you incarcerate in the State of Unfortunately, they are warehoused with CA? people who share their propensity to do bad things to other people. If you do nothing to change that

dynamic while they are in custody, it very easy to anticipate that it's not going to get any better. If you take margin offenders and warehouse them with more significant criminal offenders, they'll come out more hardened, more skilled and more sophisticated.

The state prison system for the longest time has Department been called the of Corrections. John feels there is no more misnamed organization that could exist. This is not a reflection on the people who work there and do the difficult job they perform. There is no correction that takes place behind the walls of the state prison system. The problem is going to continue to get worse with the increase in the prison population because of such influences of Megan's Law, Three Because no politician wants to Strikes, etc. have his/her picture taken at the ribbon cutting of a new jail or prison, there will be no new jails/prisons constructed. John feels we do not do a good job in this State rehabilitating criminal offenders. There are many people who are now housed in our jails/ prisons that are the product third, fourth and perhaps fifth generations of families who have never been in compliance with the law. They never been have exposed to positive influences. It's, therefore, not surprising they end up in the criminal justice system. Because jails/prisons are self contained "cities" why not use the period of incarceration to teach the inmates a skill/trade which can be used on the outside.

There is an effort underway to put a measure on the November ballot that will make it easier to parole people. The proposal states that for non-violent inmates, they can be paroled very early. According to **John**, there is

a new definition of the word violent and he does not agree with its implications.

John feels we are at a critical time when we need more conversations, more dispensing of the typical monikers that separate us and a greater effort to truly come up with solutions to problems.

John then answered questions from the Rotarians.

President Gene then asked us to stand, raise our glasses and join him in a toast to *Rotary Around the World*.

The meeting was then adjourned.
