



HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM

President Patrick introduced Bill Wittich. **Dr. Wittich** is a speaker, consultant, and author in the field of leadership, motivation, and nonprofit management. For the past twelve plus years Bill and his wife Ann have traveled an average of 150 days a year. Their speaking schedule has taken them to all corners of the United States and through much of Europe. His doctorate is from the University of Southern California where he continues to serve as a mentor to graduate students in the School of Policy, Planning, and Development. Wittich has authored twelve books in the association and non-profit field. He is Past President of the Rotary Club of Laguna Sunrise in Elk Grove and an honorary member of the passport club.

They enjoy living in Elk Grove, where they enjoy cooking, collecting antiques, and learning about red wine.

Bill began by introducing his topic, "Stop Recruiting Start Attracting" witch is the title of one of his books. He than presented **President Patrick** with a copy of his book.



The following is a quote from **Bill's** Book "Stop Recruiting Start Attracting"

"Sometimes veteran Rotarians will start joking about those offending generations of members. Then the members start talking about their club being "an old white man's club." Each generation is attempting to maneuver others into seeing it their own way. They are trying to fix the other generation, rather than trying to understand generational differences. And then both sides are guilty. The irony is that when we say another generation doesn't get it, we don't get it either. My hope is that you will learn how to attract, not recruit new Rotarians. Our focus in this book has been on the two groups that I suggest you begin attracting into Rotary. That is the two younger generations and the Baby Boomer generation. They are very different generations and while the techniques of be similar, there attraction may differences to consider. What works to attract the younger group might be networking, social media and lower cost environments, while the Boomers attraction might be increased fellowship, community connections and the opportunity to do service. The younger generation may need a few changes in the club and the Boomers sort of fit right in with most existing clubs. The bottom line is clear. The younger generation might require a little change and the older generation must embrace this change. Maybe at times we need an interpreter to help to understand these issues to keep everyone on the same Rotary page. We need to understand generational differences to keep things from falling apart at times. At times neither generation understands the other generation very well. It sometimes appears that we have two different countries housed in one Rotary club. But one

grew up in the 1940's and the other one in the 1980s. They were taught differently in school, watched different events on TV and grew up in different neighborhoods. And these frustrations over small things in a club can lead members to start talking in stereotypes and that only makes things worse. "It's stereotyping that can actually lead to some very negative outcomes and generalizations," said Steven Rogelberg, professor at UNC Charlotte. Stereotyping can be difficult in a club as we try to find ways to work together on projects. We all know the labels. The Millennial lives their lives digitally. Gen Xers are cynical and not great team players, and Baby Boomers can't operate technology. Can you find members who fit these stereotypes? Of course you can. Can you find people who smash them to pieces? I know we can in every Rotary club. The truth is that people differ and it is our job to understands our members individuals, not as members of a generation. Maybe we need to stop wasting time blaming club issues on stereotypes and learn to appreciate the values in the generational differences sitting in those seats in your club. So lets get started with our attracting teams and fire those recruiting committees. As we said before in the words of Bob Dylan, "The times they are a changing." So lets get started changing!"

One of the points **Bill** talked about was the fact that clubs need to be looking at areas of "Age, Gender and Diversity" when we are looking for new members.
