END POLIO NOW CAMPAIGN

The **END POLIO NOW** campaign is once again one of Rotary's top priorities in the coming year. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation have extended their partnership with Rotary during the critical endgame phase of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative. Thanks to this partnership our contributions are matched two for one—\$25 becomes \$75.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THIS WEEK'S PROGRAM

The **Golden 1 Center** is the newest Crown Jewel of not only Sacramento but of sports complexes throughout the world. The indoor arena, located in downtown Sacramento, sits partially on the site of the former Downtown Plaza shopping center. The publicly-owned arena is part of a business and entertainment district called Downtown Commons (DoCo), which includes 1.5 million feet of outdoor space which has a \$250 million 16-story mixed-use tower.

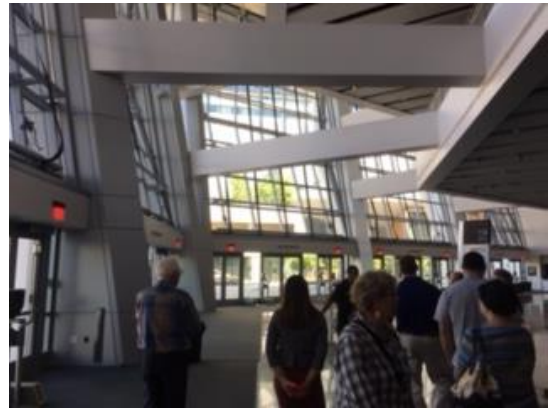
The arena, which replaced Sleep Train Arena as the home of the Sacramento Kings hosts concerts, conventions and other sporting and entertainment events. There are 34 luxury suites. Suite partners have access to three exclusive clubs on the premium level including two skyboxes that overlook the concourse and have a direct view of the outside. On Level 5, there are 48 loft-style suites. Normal capacity of the complex is 17,500 but expandable to about 19,000 to accommodate concert audiences.

The goal of the Golden 1 Center was to bring people together in an indoor/outdoor environment. The new Center reflects all that is great about Northern California by utilizing regionally sourced materials that range from glass to recycled aluminum to potentially precast concrete, composed of sand from San Benito and rocks of Sierra limestone that reflect the colors of the region. Additionally, Golden 1 Center utilizes only FSC-certified wood, an international standard of quality and responsible forest management.

The exterior of the building pays homage to Sacramento's nickname "City of Trees" with rounded aluminum that has a million trees patterned on it and a base of Sierra limestone to express local mountains.

The complex is 100% solar powered with 15%

coming from rooftop solar panels and 85% from a solar field in nearby Rancho Seco operated by SMUD and features smart temperature controls which harness the area's cooling Delta Breeze by installing five 40' x 30' window systems weighing 30,000 lbs. which open to allow that infamous breeze to flow through the complex. A bird buffer was also installed to keep bird and insects from infiltrating the indoors.



Installing solar power is part of the Sacramento Kings ownership's goal to have its new sports and entertainment center be the most technologically advanced arena in the country. This efficient and renewable source of energy eliminates 2,000 tons of greenhouses and earned the arena a LEED Platinum certification in late September 2016.

The main screens are 44 feet wide by 24 feet tall, crowned by 6-foot-tall message boards. The screens broadcast in what is known as "4K Ultra HD". In addition to the main scoreboard, two 25-foot-tall video screens are placed at the arena's main entrance facing the public plaza, and another 800 HD monitors broadcast the game to fans gathered in concourses, clubs and suites.

The new area is the most technologically advanced in the world with 650 miles of data cable which provides free wi-fi connections that are 17,000 times faster than the average home network. A rooftop platform with light pipes can be programmed by local artists and used to convey events in the arena to the public through

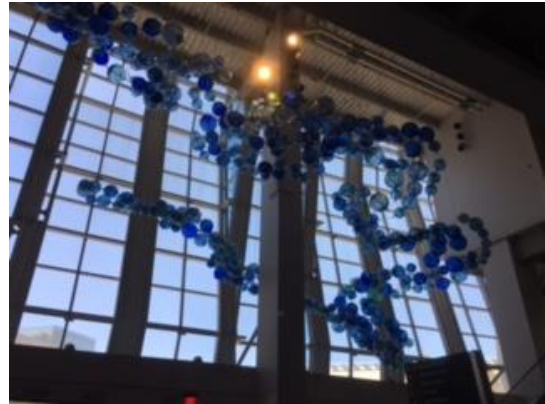
visually appealing light shows.

As part of a partnership between the Kings and the Sacramento Metropolitan Arts Commission, the Kings donated previously existing art located in the Downtown Plaza to SMAC and contributed \$5.5 million to the “Art in Public Places” program. Kings Owner and Chairman Vivek Ranadive led an effort to bolster the initial contribution with \$4 million dollars, securing the first publicly-owned and permanently displayed original sculpture by world-renowned artist Jeff Koons. The sculpture comes from his “Coloring Book” collection inspired by a child coloring over the lines of an image of Piglet.

Another unique piece of artwork adorning the new Golden One Center is a work by Bryan Valenzuela, a rising local artist. His sculpture is comprised of two separate channels that cascade through the southwest atrium. The piece consists of 400 individual hollow blown-glass, translucent spheres in an abstract design depicting the confluence of the Sacramento and American Rivers.

The Center for Sacramento History has brought in six neon signs which hang throughout the building to liven the historic art scene.

The Tower Books was an icon in Sacramento for many years. The sign below is one of the many neon signs depicting our history.



Perhaps the most talked-about sustainability feature of the new arena is its so called “farm-to-court” commitment to source 90 percent of its food from within 150 miles.

The Kings are committed to turning food scraps into fertilizer that will go back to local farms, creating a local food cycle.

The food program strives to ensure none of that local food goes to waste. The arena donates 13,000 lbs. of food to the Sacramento Food Bank which feeds 11,000 local families. Used fryer oil, which is locally produced is converted to biodiesel by a local business. All of the vegetable and protein trimmings and scraps are recycled by California Safe Soil (CSS), a Sacramento area firm which “digests” the material into compost which is then given to local farms to enrich the

soil. Farmers report a 30% increase in production as a result of using the special compost.

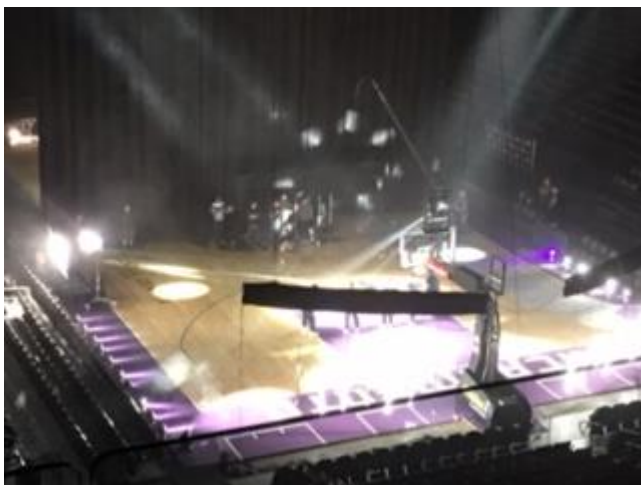
Another jaw-dropping feature of the new area are the lofts and suites. The Lofts are an original design never before seen in a sports arena. They're uniquely set to meet the needs of Sacramento's small and medium-sized companies, as well as larger families interested in a premium experience. Lofts feature lounge seating, access to private suite-level clubs, VIP parking, and a dedicated entrance into the arena.

The Suites are twice as big as those in Sleep Train Arena. Suite owners also have access to three exclusive clubs on the premium level, including two lounges that hang above the concourse.

The Lofts and Suites have access to a concierge service team to a fully-stocked kitchen and bar.

Watching a game, concert or event from one of these venues would definitely be an incredible experience.

Unfortunately, we didn't have access to the Court Floor as it was Media Day and the players were on deck for photos and interviews.



Our guides then took the group down to the Assembly Lounge. It has a casual, modern look. The space has a huge bar, firepits and stunning stone accents and a wide-range of seating options and very comfortable, your author might add.

We thanked our guides for the informative tour and headed back to work or for those who were available, to lunch at Sauced.

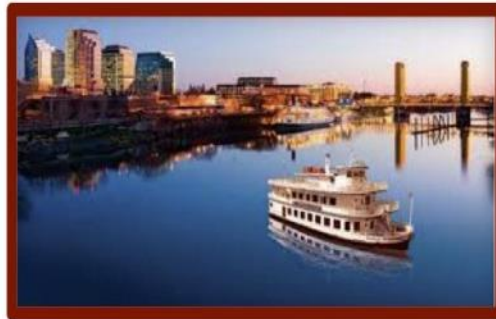

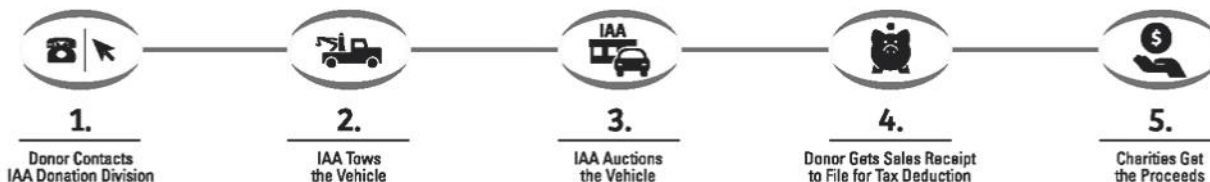
