American River Parkway Foundation



Speaker-chair **Brad Squires** introduced **Julia Cassil** from the **American River Parkway Foundation** and noted that she is the first person to speak to our Rotary club this year! Julia is the Volunteer Coordinator for the Foundation.

The Foundation cares for the portion of the American River Parkway that runs from Lake Nimbus to Discovery Park at the confluence of the American River and the Sacramento River. It spans

23 miles, covers 4,800 acres and has 46 miles of paved trails (north and south side) on the parkway. It is considered one of the nation's premier urban natural parks.

Julia said the Foundation headquarters is located in the William B. Pond Recreation Area on the American River Parkway.

The American River Parkway Foundation (ARPF) is a Sacramento 501(c)(3) nonprofit charitable organization whose mission is to lead and inspire the community to conserve and nurture the American River Parkway as a unique, accessible resource for everyone to enjoy.

Julia gave some interesting facts about the Parkway. It is a federally designated a wild and scenic river. More than eight million people visit the Parkway every year compared to the four million visitors that go to Yosemite every year! The Parkway generates \$364 million annually to the local Sacramento economy. And did you know that the Sacramento County drinking water comes from the American River?

The Foundation works with the county to preserve and protect the Parkway. The county owns the Parkway but the Foundation is involved with the daily preservation and protection of this valuable resource.

One way we work with the county is during the Spring Cleanup of the Parkway. Last year 99,000 pounds of garbage was removed by 8000 volunteers. This year the Spring Cleanup will be held on April 13 from 9am to 12noon. It will take place at multiple sites.



The Great American River Clean Up (GARCU) will be held on September 21 and it is part of a state-wide cleanup effort. There will be 1200 volunteers working at 23 locations on the Parkway.

President Don told Julia that our Rotary club cleans up a mile along Lake Natomas and we coordinate with the Friends of Lake Natoma. She was glad to learn that. She said the part of the trail that we clean up is state owned, not county owned.

The Parkway is used by walkers, runners, bike riders, equestrians, and dog walkers. The Foundation volunteers work with the county to maintain the 30 miles of multiuse trails. The dirt trails are pruned and mowed so they measure six feet wide and eight feet tall (for horse riders). Team Rubicon, made up of veteran volunteers, handles the heavy work such as using chainsaws and hauling.

Volunteers help the Foundation staff to rid the Parkway of invasive plants (non-native plants). They obtain the necessary permits from the County for removal of species such as Yellow Star Thistle. No herbicides are used; the plants are removed by hand. In 2023, 115,000 invasive plants were removed.

The Foundation headquarters sit on a one-acre parcel in the William B. Pond park. Beside the building is a demonstration Native Plant garden which helps people identify and incorporate native plants into their yards. It is also a teaching garden and on Tuesday mornings, people can come to the garden to learn about weeding, mulching and planting.

To park your vehicle at any of the parking lots along the Parkway you need to pay for a day pass (\$7) or purchase a year-long parking pass. The pass is required by the county and is available for purchase at the Foundation office or at thirty other vendors in the county such as REI. The standard vehicle pass costs \$70 and there is a discount for seniors.

The Parkway is dog friendly but cleaning up after your dog is required. The Pup in the Park is an awareness program which provides Mutt Mitt stations along the parkway. Business and organizations can sponsor a bag dispenser for cleanup and disposal of dog waste. There are currently 18 stations, each with a sponsor's name posted at the station.

The type of people who visit the Parkway can be affected by income and education level. This is why the Foundation works with the county to operate a free outdoor education program called SCOE - Sacramento County Outdoor Education. The Foundation's fundraising provides money for the schools to transport the students to the River Bend Park. SCOE provides the teachers with a curriculum. The goal is to have 30 field trips a year and increase the reach of the Parkway to the people who haven't visited the Parkway.

There are several special events planned this year:

- Spring Clean-up (April)
- Bike Fest (May)
- Summer Solstice (June) a fundraiser and dinner in the Parkway
- Great American River Parkway Cleanup (September)
- Howlin' on the Parkway (October)
- Run the Parkway (November) a 20-mile benefit run is a benchmark for runners who want to get into the CIM

Vocational Talk

It was **Diana Newman's** turn to be the Vocational speaker and she told us that the cold weather we're experiencing reminds her of the nine years she lived in Truckee with her then husband. It gets cold up there and she remembers when it snowed on the 4th of July!

When the couple bought their home, it came with a snow blower. Diana loves to garden and she had experience using a rototiller. So after one bad experience, her husband gave her the job of snow blowing.



The tines (blades) on a snowblower cut into the standing snow like an auger and throw the snow out a chute. The chute can be aimed in such a way that the snow can be built up in a pile beside the driveway.

While living there, Diana had two large Rhodesian Ridgeback dogs, one weighed 110 pounds and the other weighed 150 pounds! A large dog equals a large "dog pile". Two large dogs equals two large dog piles.

Diana always let the dogs out the back door to do their business. Her husband let them out the front door. With a snowy front yard and driveway, it's hard to know where the dog piles were located under the snow.

Diana was snow blowing and trying to aim the snow chute at the side the driveway but that's not easy and sometimes snow and dog piles can accidentally end up in the pine trees. Oops!

Now what goes up must come down. During the spring thaw, on tax day in April, when the snow dropped out off the trees, so did the piles. And it was dog poop raining down in Diana's yard and her neighbor's yard!

Cold mornings in Granite Bay where Diana lives now aren't as cold as Truckee and so there is no more plowing driveways and streets in her winter. But they reminder her of the best memories!!
