Dennis Sarkisian reported that a lot has been accomplished and more is planned. Coming up is helping with the Winer Sanctuary, a bike trail clean up and the Rotary House yard cleanup on Saturday, February 17th.

It's time to schedule the spring Joe Surra Track cleanup and the Joe Surra sign needs to be put back up at the Louis Pasteur School. This could be a Big Day of Service project.

Dennis has spoken to **Audrey Smith-Wiberg** about helping with the Special Olympics event that she is involved with. We might be able to help with their Prom night.

The Rotary House Foundation is going to make a decision about replacing the fence and thinning out the overgrown plants so there may be some work projects coming up this spring.

Youth Service recognizes the importance of empowering youth and young professional through leadership development programs such as Interact and Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA).

Jeff Valtman is the chairperson but he was absent so Mike McKibben filled in for him. Mike attended the Interact meeting in November and December. There were 17 students in attendance in November. Pizza was served at the December meeting and 23 students showed up. Several students have asked for the speech contest applications.

The Interact club has participated in the Christmas Basket project, the American River Cleanup and the Orangevale Community Christmas tree lighting, all helped out boy Ely and his merry band of students.

Jeff has recruited 50 students from the high school clubs such as ROTC and the SCORE nursing program to volunteer at our Crab Feed.

Dennis Sarkisian said the club received 17 classroom grants totaling over \$13,000. The teachers were notified to make the purchased and they will be reimbursed. They have until January 31 to submit their receipts.

Dave Shepard said that there hasn't been much traction on getting students to apply for the ROP scholarship. Most applications are received from Nursing students. He said that Casa Roble has one of only two auto shop programs in the district. Jeff arranged for automotive vendor to bring their tool truck around to the automotive program. Jeff used that occasion to let the students know that they can apply for the ROP scholarship.

Club Service focuses on making the club strong. A thriving club is anchored by strong relationships and an active membership. Don Russell is planning more Dine Arounds. He is always looking for places to visit. The Pitch and Fiddle has been requested again. The Cliff House has changed hands but he needs someone to go there to check it out before it becomes a Dine Around location.

The Cocktails, Candles and Cotton Candy party is coming up and will be hosted by Diana Newman. Don is looking for more suggestions for social events such as a BBQ or a pizza party. The club's anniversary is coming up and he needs the member's input about going to a restaurant or holding the party at someone's home.

Vocational Service calls on every Rotarian to work with integrity and contribute their expertise to the problems and needs of society. **Rob Auernig's** passion is scheduling speakers for the weekly vocational talk. He sends out the reminder to the speaker on Monday and every speaker has been prepared.

The Vocational tour to the Sierra Nevada Brewery was informative and enjoyable. Rob is looking for suggestions for the places to visit for a vocational tour.

Rob would like help finding candidates for the People of the Year Awards. Give him suggestions for a teacher, policeman and fireman of the Year.

International Service exemplifies our global reach in promoting peace and understanding. We support this service avenue by sponsoring or volunteering on international projects, seeking partners abroad, and more. **Bryan Daniel** said he was watching the news on the war in Gaza and he saw Shelter Box Tents in the background. There is always money budgeted to give to the Shelter Box project.

Jim Buntin has a contact in Guatemala that we have helped in the past with school supplies. Bryan will allocated \$500 after he works with Jim.

Phyllis Macdonald gave the name of a microcredit organization where we can donate funds. Bryan learned of woman in Guatemala that is trying to raise \$500 for a tiller that she can use to improve her land for growing crops.

Food Bank Summary for January 5th

Dennis Sarkisian sent this summary:

Thank you for serving at the **Orangevale-Fair Oaks Food Bank** this chilly, but thankfully sunny first Friday in January. In addition to bagging and boxing lots of grocery items for future distribution, we had the privilege of providing groceries to 95 appreciative families in need (246 individuals). Five were new sign-ups. After greeting one man who drove up this morning, he told me he was really hungry and looking forward to getting his allotment. Thanks again for your ongoing service and making a difference in our community.

Vocational Talk

The Vocational speaker is none other than our own **President Don Morris!** He has been practicing law for 38years and he getting good at it!



Don went out on his own in 1991 working in corporate and estate planning and his work eventually morphed into working exclusively Wills and Trusts. He helps plan for a lifetime and after a person is gone. Having a will and trust makes it easier on your family and benefactors.

Without a will and trust, Probate is slow and expensive. Right now in Sacramento it takes 5 months to get a hearing so an executor can be assigned. An attorney who works on a probate case gets paid on a percentage basis.

For example, if a person dies and leaves only a bank account with \$500,000, then the attorney gets paid \$13,000. Don was had a client who was an only son of a woman who died. She had \$235,000 in a bank account and Don will get paid \$7,600 of the money as a result of his probate work.

If you have a will and trust, there is no need for probate and the unnecessary attorney costs. Another advantage of a trust is that people can step to help when the person with a trust becomes incapacitated.
