From Seed to Scale

Brad Squires, the speaker chairperson introduced **Nick Kennedy**, the California State Record holder for his Giant Pumpkin that weighted an amazing **2,497 pounds**.

Brad met Nick last year when he advertised one of his giant pumpkins for sale. It weighed 2,036 pounds and Brad bought it to feed it to his cows. To get the pumpkin back to his farm, Nick and Brad

The 2024-2025 Rotary International presidential theme is "The Magic of Rotary" used a Sawzall (a reciprocating saw) to cut up the pumpkin so the pieces would fit in the back of Brad's truck. It took them about two hours to cut and load the pumpkin!! Brad confessed that as he was driving from Nick's farm to Orangevale, the tailgate opened and chunks of pumpkin fell out all over the road. He had to stop and pick up all the pieces before continuing his drive home.

Nick started his talk by playing a 2-minute time lapse Youtube video of a giant pumpkin growing from seed to its final size of 2,480 pounds. (If you want to watch the video, search for Northeast Giant Pumpkin on Youtube).

In the video you could really see the pumpkin growth take off. During the hyper growth period which lasts two weeks, Nick said his pumpkin grew by 66 pounds per day and increased 12 - 18 inches in diameter.

Last year Nick's pumpkin came in second in the nation to a grower, Travis Gienger from Anoka, Minnesota whose pumpkin weighed 2,749 pounds.

Originally the giant pumpkin seeds were developed by **Howard Dill**, a farmer in Nova Scotia. He was the grandfather of Giant Pumpkins and he bred the giants of the giants.

He started selectively cross pollenating his pumpkins in the 1970s. He controlled the process by using pollen from the biggest pumpkins to genetically modify his pumpkins. His first big pumpkin weighed 213 pounds.

On the website <u>GreatPumpkin.com</u> the great pumpkin genetics are traced from Mr. Dill's earliest

pumpkin in 1971 down to today. There is a lot of good information on the tree diagram. Controlled pollination and seed selection are very important.

You can buy "giant pumpkin seeds" at Home Depot but they will produce pumpkins only in the 75 pound range. If you want seeds, look for a pumpkin club. They usually meet up a few times a year. Or contact Nick and he will help you get good seeds.

The seeds from the winning pumpkins are highly sought after. Last year's winner ended up with about 600 seeds and he was selling them for \$500 each! Nick give his seeds away or donates them to a charity auction.

Last year, as an experiment, Nick took one of his seeds and threw it on the ground and didn't water it. Even with this mistreatment, a 120 pound pumpkin grew. That shows you how good his seeds are. To grow a giant pumpkin It takes good soil, a good location, lots of preparation, lots of space and lot of water.

You can't manage what you don't measure. For example, you can't manage the growth is you don't have don't know what is in your soil. He has his soil tested in the spring and in the autumn so he knows what micronutrients are missing and need amendments. Plan on having about 1000 square feet of growing area. The best time to to start growing your seeds is in March or April.

It takes a lot of water to grow a giant pumpkin. He was using 300 gallons a day toward the end of the season. Nick has the use of an old 25-acre farm in Citrus Heights that has a well so he has access to a a lot of water. He used hoop houses, shade cloth and mill fabric on the ground to keep the pumpkin dry. Mill fabric is a

woven material used in pulp and paper mills and is common choice for growing pumpkins because its strong, flexible, and allows water to drain.

Last year was a great year for growing. This year Nick has been plagued by challenges - extreme heat, insects such as spider mites, and the mosaic virus that is transmitted by bugs. He also has to contend with rodents and birds.



Last year, when it was time to harvest, he had 20 people helping him. He recruited a Big Lift and a special harness to lift the pumpkin 10 feet in the air and onto a truck. He took his pumpkin to Half Moon Bay for the Safeway World Championship Great Pumpkin weigh-in. Nick played the video of the weighing of his pumpkin and his 2,497 pound giant pumpkin beat the previous California record of 2,356 pounds.

The 2023 winner was Travis Gienger from Anoka, Minnesota and his pumpkin weighed in at a whopping 2,749.0 pounds! It is a new world record! Nick came in second place to Travis's pumpkin. The winner gets a prize of \$30,000 but that's not why Nick is motivated to grow giant pumpkins. He does it for his family and with his family. His son and daughter are so proud of dad's giant pumpkin.

After the meeting, Nick invited everyone to come out to the parking lot to see a giant pumpkin that his son grew. It weighs 300 pounds and it's in the back of his truck. His son grew it for a beauty competition. The giant pumpkins that are grown for weight are ugly pumpkins. This beautiful orange pumpkin weigh less but is picture worthy. His son won first place in the Sacramento County pretty pumpkin competition.

A bit of history on why Half Moon Bay is the Pumpkin Capital of the USA. Fifty-two years ago there were two towns claiming to be the pumpkin capitol - Half Moon Bay and a town in New York. The two towns competed to see who could grow the largest pumpkin. Half Moon Bay won and they've had the title ever since.



President Catrina thanked Nick for speaking to the club about his pumpkin growing. Nick said that he was exposed to Rotary through a good friend that is a Rotary club president in Texas. He enjoyed speaking about his passion. Catrina presented Nick with a custom wooden pen made by Rotarian Bob Kurtz.

Polio Update

Visiting Rotarian **Joe Scheimer** is on the Rotary District Committee for The Rotary Foundation He gave the club an update on Polio eradication. It has been a dismal year. In 2023, there were only 12 new cases of Polio in the world. But now there are now 46 cases of wild polio: 22 in Afghanistan and 32 cases in Pakistan.



I have set up a D5180 Raise for Rotary Fundraiser for PolioPlus. My goal is to have Rotarians & friends of our district contribute \$75,000 for the fight to end polio. There were positive soil samples for the polio virus in Gaza so Rotary knows the more polio cases will come from there. The WHO and Rotary were successful in vaccinating 640,000 children under the age of 10, but it will have to be done again in 4 to 6 weeks. Rotary has donated \$500,000 to that effort, and will probably have to do it again.

We need to keep funding this war against polio. We can't let 39 years of our efforts to eliminate polio to be abandoned. Last year Rotary planned to raise \$50 million for polio eradication. Rotary came

up \$6 million short. The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints donated \$5 million and Rotary International made up the last \$1 million from operating expenses. Bill Gates put in \$100 million.

Our District has set a goal to raise \$75,000 by October 24, World Polio Day. Joe will be joining 200 other bike riders for a Ride to End Polio Ride in Arizona. Joe handed out flyers with information about making a donation to eradicate Polio.

Bill Wagner reminded the club that 17 members made a pledge last year to donate \$100 every year until Polio is eradicated. Bill said that only one person has fulfilled that pledge this year.
