SPEAKER:



Diane Cralle introduced our District Governor Sidney Smith who has a long list of accomplishments including graduation from Cal State, being a Radio Broadcaster, coaching football and knowing Krav Maga. He joined Rotary in 2002, and worked his way up to DG.

Sidney Smith started out by thanking his team especially Marilyn Kagan.

He wanted to discuss the power of the second question by telling us a story about helping people when he was younger. His Dad was a police officer. One day he had a domestic violence call, and he discovered the family had no food. He gathered his family to bring

food to the family. Sidney learned a valuable lesson from his dad.

When he was in New York to help with logistics after 9/11 (serving coffee and snacks to the workers clearing ground) he heard a homeless woman shouting "I'm hungry." But noone





seemed to be paying attention to her. Sidney had just gotten himself a nice pastrami sandwich, and decided he would help. When he offered her the sandwich, she asked "what kind is it?" Rather than being offended he found out she was allergic to eggs and was asking because she wanted to make sure there was no mayo. The power of the second question revealed: she wasn't ungrateful, she was concerned for her health.

He wants us to remember that second question when looking for new members.

First: Target. Don't just target perceived wealth. Ask anyone who seems to want to help. The guy working at the Foodbank in his dirty shirt and pants, might be the unassuming guy that donates \$250 for Covid help.

Second: Message. Be on message about what Rotary does and that it's fun, too.

Third: Frequency. Not everyone is alike and there are a lot of different view points. Don't dismiss someone because they have a different frequency than you. To be effective you have to play whether we agree or disagree.

Fourth: Sustainability. Celebrate what we have and who is at the table and in the room.

Fifth: Consistency. Delivering on the promise. Go place you never would have gone. Meet people you never would have met. Do things you never would have done.

He reminded us that the Foundation Dinner is celebrating those who have given. The Cost is based on the place and the dinner. It's a night to dress up and be fancy.

The District newsletter is being done by video to try out new things. They have an instructional video on how to film a

video for the district newsletter. Some of the basics are to film with you phone sideways, try to keep a straight angle and uncluttered background. Make sure the sound is clear. Keep Rotary in the picture.

Remember that if you want support for your pet projects, support other's pet projects.

Sidney's membership goat is to grow the district by 14%.

Sidney has a "Creating Hope Award" for those striving to create hope in their community. The award was given to a couple who support many efforts to help those in need, including by helping at the Food Bank, collecting clothing for underprivileged school children, and organizing the christmas basket programs for years.
